Coolidge Terminal Rehabilitation Project Overview

DDOT is proposing to construct a new bus maintenance, storage, and operations center on the existing Coolidge Terminal site.

The purpose of this public meeting is to:

Coolidge Terminal History

- The Coolidge Terminal and Maintenance facility is located at 14044 Schaefer Highway in Detroit.
- It operated transit service from 1928 until 2011.
- In December 2011, a fire destroyed part of the facility, halting operations.
- The City of Detroit's bankruptcy halted reconstruction plans and now DDOT is proposing a new construction project.





Coolidge Terminal to Replace Gilbert Terminal

- The Gilbert Terminal, located in southeast Detroit, stores and maintain the buses that were once at Coolidge, but can no longer do so.
- The use of the property is no longer suitable for DDOT and will be decommissioned after the new Coolidge Terminal is built.
- The buses currently at Gilbert Terminal will be moved over to the new Coolidge Terminal.

DDOT plans to construct a new bus maintenance, storage, and operations center on the existing Coolidge Terminal site.

The current site will be cleared, and all six existing structures will be demolished.




Coolidge Terminal Site Current Layout



DDOT is also using some adjacent properties owned by the Detroit Land Bank Authority.

The Detroit Land Bank Authority has agreed to transfer the parcels to DDOT.



The new facility will accommodate 24-hour operations and initially 144 buses, with the capacity to expand up to 216 buses in the future.

Three new buildings will be constructed during the project.


- Bus storage and coach services
- Fleet maintenance with parts storeroom
- Operations and Administration



- The new facility will be able to better service 40' and 60' buses, and service and charge buses using alternative fuel technologies.
- The site will also include a 245- space parking lot, dedicated mainly for DDOT staff including operators, maintenance, and operations and administration personnel.
- The facility is expected to be completed in 2024.

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Involvement

- FTA is providing funding for the project
- Serving as lead federal agency working with DDOT to assess the potential social, economic, and environmental impacts of this proposed project

National Environmental Policy Act of 1969
Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act
Section 4(f) of the USDOT Act of 1966

Alternatives

DDOT considered three alternatives to meet the current needs.

- Re-use of the existing buildings
- Re-use of some of the buildings, supplementing with new construction where appliable
- Full replacement of the Coolidge Terminal with all new construction.

DDOT determined that all new construction at the site is the preferred alternative and would allow DDOT to resume bus operations at this facility.

There will be no impact on any transit schedules.

Cultural Resources

Section 106 and Section 4(f)

- The Coolidge Terminal is considered eligible for the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) and protected under Section 106 and Section 4(f) regulations.
- The Project will cause an Adverse Effect to the historic property.
- Section 106 Consultation with interested parties and tribes has begun.
- Mitigation for the Adverse Effect will be identified as a commitment in the NEPA Environmental Assessment.
- The Environmental Assessment will include a Section 4(f) Evaluation.

Coolidge Terminal Site Public Involvement

- DDOT is in the design phase of this project.
- Additional public meetings will take place
 - The second meeting is expected in September and will focus more on the environmental impacts of this project.
 - A public hearing is expected to take place in November or December where additional details of the Environmental Assessment will be provided along with the opportunity for public comments.
