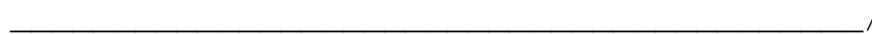

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good afternoon, ladies and
6 gentlemen, and welcome to the Board of Detroit Police
7 Commissioners meeting. So happy to have you here. Good
8 to see that you came out on this nice summer night to
9 enjoy what is going on in the community. My name is
10 Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police
11 Commissioners. I have serving with me tonight the vice
12 chairperson, Commissioner Jessica Taylor as well as
13 Commissioner Toney Stewart. I'm going to ask -- and
14 representing the Chief's office we have Deputy Chief
15 Benjamin Lee.

16 I'm going to ask if our Board attorney, Celia
17 Banks Washington will introduce our staff for you
18 tonight.

19 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
20 We have with us tonight Dalph Watson, director of police
21 personnel. I don't see Lieutenant Timothy Leach, our
22 acting chief investigator. We have Mr. Robert Brown
23 from our office. We have Officer Donakowski and as our
24 reporter we've got Wendy Boer. I don't believe that I
25 have missed anybody. I don't see Ken Cooper. He is

1 present through.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Madame
3 Counselor. At this time without moving any further I
4 want to invite to the mic Commander Chaplain Pastor
5 James Powell, pastor of Cornerstone Church. I'm going
6 to ask if he'll come and lead us in our invocation for
7 tonight. Good to see you, Chaplain.

8 PASTOR POWELL: Good evening. Let us look to
9 the Lord. Lord God, we praise you in the name of Jesus.
10 We thank you Lord God for such a beautiful day. This is
11 a day that you have made. Lord God, we just praise you
12 for all your tender mercy and your kindness upon us.
13 Lord, as we gather our minds together, Lord God, to
14 become one, I ask you Lord God just to bless this
15 meeting today. Look down upon our mayor, look down upon
16 our chief and look down upon the officers that serve us.
17 Bless this Commission, Lord God, give them wisdom, give
18 them understanding and bless us all that is here.
19 Strengthen us, Lord God. Help us to do your will, and
20 help us to love your city. We magnify and glorify your
21 name. And help us to serve one another, Lord God. In
22 Jesus name, amen.

23 AUDIENCE: Amen.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Pastor. At
25 this time, I wish to thank Mr. William Jones and those

1 who operate the facilities here at Focus Hope. Is he
2 here, Mr. Jones? Is there a representative of Focus
3 Hope here? Anyone, just come on up and just talk about
4 it for a little bit and the historical record we know
5 that across this country Focus Hope is known as an
6 entity that has trained many a young people and really
7 has been a source of hope for so many. And your name?

8 MS. SIMPSON: First name is Mary, last name
9 Simpson, volunteer on the Focus Hope campus for more
10 than 12 years, live in the neighborhood. And you have
11 already summarized the history of what's going on.
12 There are more than 40,000 meals served in the food
13 center weekly, mostly to seniors. We do service women
14 and children. There is a children's center, school on
15 the corner here, and it's open year round. We have four
16 or five different training sessions.

17 And we are begging for people. Can you pass
18 the hair test? Well, if you have been smoking it or
19 you're around folks who do smoke it, you ain't going to
20 pass the test. Okay. But the money is there. The
21 government has sent the money. But guess what? We need
22 them. We need them between 18 and 24. So if you got
23 someone sitting at home with the idiot box -- that's a
24 television, not the computer -- have them come down the
25 street to 1200 between nine and two and get tested so

1 that we can do better with what we have to work with
2 here in the City of Detroit. And get ready for the walk
3 October 12 I believe. Thank you.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mrs. Simpson.
5 We appreciate that update and that information. We want
6 to inform those of you who are here maybe for the first
7 time about the Board of Police Commissioners. The Board
8 of Police Commissioners was established by City Charter
9 back on July the 1st, 1974. We are a five member
10 commission. We are appointed by the mayor, and we are
11 confirmed by the Detroit City Council. We serve five
12 year staggered terms. And we may not serve more than
13 five years consecutively. We meet once a week, 52 weeks
14 a year. And all of our meetings are open to the public.

15 Our duties are to establish policy, rules and
16 regulations in consultation with the mayor and with the
17 chief of police for the Detroit Police Department. We
18 review and approve the department's budget. We review
19 and approve the department's promotions. We also
20 receive and resolve complaints concerning the operation
21 of the Detroit Police Department. We are the final
22 authority to impose and to review discipline of Detroit
23 Police Department employees. We appoint civilian
24 personnel employees. I'm sorry. We appoint the
25 civilian personnel director. I'm sorry. And we also

1 create an annual report that details our activities
2 throughout the year.

3 Our staff includes an executive secretary who
4 is on vacation right now. But he serves as secretary to
5 the board and attends all of our meetings. We also have
6 a chief investigator that we just recently hired. We
7 also have additional investigators. We have a board
8 attorney and other staff members as needed.

9 And so, we thank you for being here tonight.
10 At this time, I want to move through our agenda. And I
11 will entertain a motion to approve the agenda for
12 tonight, Tuesday, July 12th, 2012.

13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Second.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
16 and supported. Are there any questions? All those in
17 favor?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed, same
20 right and privilege. Motion carries. We also would ask
21 for a motion to approve the minutes from our June
22 the 28th meeting, 2012.

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

24 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Second.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved

1 and supported. Any questions? All those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
4 carries. There is a Chairperson's report that I wish to
5 put on the record tonight. As I stated last week at our
6 meeting down at 1300 Beaubien, there are some agenda
7 items that we want to move forward with in an effort
8 that we may bring things to a closure. I believe it was
9 about April, at our April community meeting of the Board
10 of Police Commissioners, the director of purchasing for
11 the City of Detroit, Mr. Andre DuPerry presented his
12 findings as related to a request for RFP bids for the
13 police authorized towing process. Mr. DuPerry informed
14 those at the meeting that Auto Return out of California
15 was the targeted company purchasing was negotiating with
16 to secure the RFP bid.

17 And in summary Mr. DuPerry recommended
18 supplying Auto Return Detroit ARD, which is an LLC,
19 between Auto Return and Detroit attorneys from Lewis &
20 Munday. Auto Return, which is a San Francisco based
21 company, with Baltimore County and San Diego clients is
22 proposed to have a three-year contract agreement with
23 two, one-year renewal options. Mr. DuPerry went on to
24 further say that this would be a business model
25 management only concept. No lots or towing contracts

1 will be included in the agreement.

2 Other significant facts that was brought out
3 during his presentation that night included that current
4 police authorized towers would have to pay Auto Return
5 \$75 per vehicle that they tow as relates to an
6 administrative and service fee. The fee was to be
7 collected on a monthly basis on actual tows. And those
8 police authorized towers who did not comply would have
9 been removed from the tow rotation list. Police
10 authorized towers according to the RFP was to submit an
11 abandoned vehicle report. He also covered the fact that
12 auction costs will be covered by the police authorized
13 towers. And it was estimated at that time to be around
14 \$5,000 per auction. The auction starting price was a
15 point of discussion. It was believed at that time that
16 the auction price of each vehicle would start around
17 \$200 regardless of the value of the vehicle.

18 The Board of Police Commissioners would also
19 need to support a tow rate increase from \$75 to \$150 to
20 offset Auto Return's administrative fee. It was
21 estimated that the annual revenue that this activity
22 would generate would be about \$2.5 million in total
23 based on 30,000 tows a year. The RFP management portion
24 would be about \$750,000, and the City's administrative
25 costs would be about 1.5 million dollars. After our

1 analysis as a Board and research on this issue, we wish
2 to present the following findings and recommendation.

3 As a result of the towing rules being
4 implemented on December 15, 2010, we have come in
5 compliance with 90 to 95 percent of the recommendations
6 from the latest tow audit that was conducted by the
7 Office of the Auditor General. The remaining 5 to
8 10 percent of the unresolved issues is obtainable
9 through implementation of a towing software system. It
10 is our belief as a Board based on our significant
11 progress in addressing long-standing rotational and
12 equity of towing opportunities within the system that
13 the current police authorized towers are operating more
14 efficiently and citizens are receiving better service
15 subsequent to the changes in the rules as evidenced by
16 the significant decrease in complaints regarding towing
17 at our weekly meetings.

18 Therefore, the Detroit Police Department's
19 towing system is not in need of a management solution
20 but rather a software solution. After a great deal of
21 research, we are convinced there are significant
22 benefits to moving toward a comprehensive towing
23 software program. These are some of the benefits. DPD
24 Central Dispatch will no longer have to select the
25 appropriate tow company and call them on the phone

1 because all of this could be done by a computer. The
2 request for the tow can originate from the officer's
3 vehicle, which frees up dispatchers to handle other
4 calls that are coming in from the citizens.

5 Custom reports will be easily be able to be
6 generated and utilized. Release of vehicle holds can be
7 done in the system, saving registered owners a trip to
8 the law enforcement agency for the release of those
9 forms. Law enforcement has real time information as to
10 where the vehicle is and who the vehicle was released
11 to. Accountability of funds collected due to the city
12 and law enforcement agency will be transparent and very
13 easy to locate. Payment inquiry and payment posting
14 options also exist. Any information collected can be
15 shared with other agencies and city departments. And
16 all tow data could be used in a secure data system that
17 would be the property of the City of Detroit and not a
18 company out of state.

19 And we believe that a system -- we talked to
20 many vendors -- that a computerized system would not
21 cost the city a dime. The following is just a sample of
22 some of the information that can be captured from a
23 comprehensive towing software system. Information from
24 the origination of the dispatch through the release of
25 the vehicle to the public, voiceless dispatch which is a

1 typical way for tow results -- I'm sorry, for tow to
2 result in dispatch, a staff person to go out and
3 actually go out and get the car. It can actually also
4 record the reasons for a tow, the totaled vehicle
5 information, all the information is recordable,
6 (inaudible) the condition of the vehicle, all of that
7 can be captured by an informational system.

8 Mr. DuPerry in his presentation to the Board
9 indicated that Auto Return has seven years of experience
10 in this area. The combined experience of our current
11 towers is approximately 517 years. On average, each
12 police authorized tower has almost three times as much
13 experience as Auto Return does by itself. And one thing
14 the City of Detroit knows if it doesn't know anything
15 else, it knows that experience matters. We believe that
16 the 115 collective years of operating towing businesses
17 outweighs seven years of experience in securing
18 contracts from municipalities.

19 We do not have a management issue. The new
20 rules that we put in place back in December of 2010
21 address that. However, DPD would benefit from a
22 comprehensive towing software system. Therefore, this
23 Board is making the following recommendations.

24 Recommendation number one, that the Board of Police
25 Commissioners should adopt a resolution and send it to

1 the Detroit City Council recommending that they do not
2 approve the current Auto Return RFP bid. Recommendation
3 number two, the Board of Police Commissioners should
4 adopt a resolution and send it to the Tow Rate
5 Commission that it would increase the tow rate by \$75.
6 Of that \$75, \$60 will go to the city and \$15 should be
7 held for implementing a new towing software system. The
8 Board of Police Commissioners -- number three, the Board
9 of Police Commissioners should adopt a resolution and
10 send it to the Tow Rate Commission suggesting an
11 increase in the daily storage rate from \$8 a day to \$15
12 a day. \$10 would go to the tow company and \$5 would go
13 to the City of Detroit.

14 The resolution should also reduce the number
15 of free non charge storage days from three to one
16 24-hour period that coincides with the authorized tower
17 hours of operation. By implementing the following
18 recommendations, the City of Detroit will receive
19 \$2.1 million in revenues just from the towing increase
20 alone and an additional \$300,000 in storage revenues
21 because the average storage of a car is about two days.
22 And an additional \$450,000 in revenues will be raised to
23 offset a per car tow fee to implement a tow software
24 system.

25 The additional bonus of savings will come as

1 more sworn members will be released from tow related
2 duties to concentrate on real policing matters. We need
3 to get as many police officers on the street as
4 possible. We believe this approach is a win win win for
5 all parties and potential partners as we move this
6 process forward. That is my report this day on July 12,
7 2012. I'm going to ask if my members will adopt my
8 report and allow us to move forward on these agenda
9 items contained in my report.

10 COMMISSIONER STEWART: So moved. I will move
11 to adopt.

12 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And I second.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
14 and seconded that we adopt and move forward on the
15 Chairman's recommendations. Any discussion among the
16 Board?

17 COMMISSIONER STEWART: No.

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Hearing no discussion, all
20 those in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
23 carries. And we can certainly answer questions from the
24 audience during our open forum period at the end of the
25 meeting. Moving forward on the agenda, we're going to

1 ask that Deputy Chief Lee will come with his report
2 regarding the Tenth Precinct.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Through the Chair, we
4 do have a presentation from the Tenth Precinct.
5 Commander Love of the Western District is here, if you
6 will introduce the inspector of the Tenth Precinct.

7 COMMANDER LOVE: Good evening, Board. My name
8 is Commander Dwayne Love. I've just recently been
9 assigned to the Western District, which encompasses
10 Number 12, Twelfth Precinct and the Tenth Precinct. So,
11 I'm fairly new over here, just been over here a week so
12 far. And I'm looking forward to future endeavors over
13 here in the precinct. I have met some of the community
14 groups today, and I'm looking forward also to a shared
15 partnership with the community. And I've set up some
16 meetings already. And we are ready to roll with it and
17 hopefully we will have a good working relationship.

18 I'd like to introduce Inspector Nick Kyriacou
19 who will introduce his staff and do a short presentation
20 on the Tenth Precinct.

21 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Good evening, everyone.
22 Sergeant Cole, where are you at? Sergeant Cole is my
23 day special ops sergeant. He's also filling in for the
24 community relations sergeant spot in the absence of
25 Sergeant Emily Dukay (phonetic) who was injured

1 seriously in an on duty accident and is having a lengthy
2 recuperation from that. We had her back for a minute,
3 but she's had some complications. And we are, you know,
4 struggling through in her absence. Also where is
5 Officer Hornbuckle? I want to thank them for all their
6 hard work.

7 I have to start out with some statistics about
8 the precinct. Number 10 is approximately 8.254 square
9 miles according to the last time we figured it out.
10 Also, based on the 2010 census, we have approximately
11 52,000 persons within the confines of the precinct, 11
12 schools, seven elementary schools, two middle schools
13 and two high schools. But I believe City High is either
14 slated to or has already closed on Woodrow Wilson. So
15 we'll probably be down to one high school here shortly.

16 We have one mini station on Rosa Parks that
17 everybody knows about, approximately 39 churches and
18 165 businesses within the confines of the precinct. We
19 have a number of initiatives in order to try to reduce
20 crime and reduce response time within the precinct. One
21 thing the chief is pushing very hard is a (inaudible)
22 approach to crime that will be employed based on
23 patterns of crime, thresholds and problem areas along
24 with our normal patrol response and calls for service.
25 When appropriate, we employ surveillance in areas which

1 have a pattern of problems.

2 Also, in order to reduce response time, we're
3 making sure that the supervision is actively monitoring
4 response to calls for service to make sure that we are
5 responding properly and resolving matters as quickly as
6 possible and getting back into service. The supervisors
7 are also responding to runs in an attempt to make sure
8 that as those officers interact with the citizens,
9 they're doing so in the proper manner, professional
10 service be provided in responding to those calls. Also
11 on the back end, after we respond to the calls for
12 service, we are also trying to make sure to provide some
13 personalized service through community relations by
14 making sure that they respond to the complaints that
15 come in either by e-mail or by phone to the voice mail
16 there on problems that are not 9-1-1 emergency response
17 problems. They're things that we do address in a more
18 long term comprehensive manner; the abandoned vehicles,
19 you know, dumping, those sorts of complaints. We try to
20 respond to those and get personalized service as much as
21 possible.

22 Also, with regard to more dangerous and
23 injurious crimes, we are trying to increase our closure
24 rate of non-fatal shootings. To that end, our
25 investigative personnel as has been the case for a while

1 are interacting with the Wayne County on call
2 prosecutors and notifying them of non-fatal shootings in
3 the event that we have a circumstance that would require
4 the use of an investigative Subpoena or we would need,
5 you know, the availability of search warrants and other
6 things to augment our ability to deal with these fatal
7 and non-fatal shootings and the investigation of them.

8 And also with regards to community relations,
9 we have been attempting to augment our block clubs a
10 little bit. We have Police Explorers. We've got a
11 pretty active group of Police Explorers. We weren't
12 able to get them here tonight to present the colors like
13 we usually do. We started pumping up a little bit. But
14 when we lost our full time community relations sergeant,
15 that kind of faded for a minute. But with Sergeant Cole
16 coming into the fold, we are going to get back going
17 forward on the community programs within the Tenth
18 Precinct.

19 A couple of our initiatives that we have on
20 going at Number 10, one of the more popular ones is the
21 senior citizens movie night, movie day. The first
22 Wednesday of each month at 11:30, we'll take them to a
23 movie. And that's done at a reduced rate for them.
24 Police Week activities that remain, we had a little
25 beautification day in the precinct out front this May

1 also. National Night Out is coming up. We'll
2 participate in that. We also have a back to school
3 initiative in the fall that we participate in. There's
4 a Halloween party in October and also something that we
5 participate in is Toys for Tots and also Cops for Tots
6 which is really a Western District initiative.
7 Inspector Alicia Carey spearheads that at Number 12,
8 very important project of her's. And also as far as
9 communicating issues within community relations, we like
10 to use our e-mail community relations monthly flyer to
11 let people know what's happening within and around the
12 precinct. That has been very helpful.

13 We try as much as possible to attend various
14 block club meetings. But there's an awful --
15 fortunately an awful lot of them within the precinct.
16 So we don't quite make all of them, but we try to
17 encourage people to come to our monthly combined
18 community relations meetings when possible. At least we
19 would hope that the block club can send a representative
20 to the monthly meeting so that we can communicate face
21 to face.

22 Crimestoppers, we always want to put that into
23 the mix here to remind people if they have any issues,
24 you know, that they see cropping up and want to
25 anonymously report a crime, be sure to dial 1-800 Speak

1 Up. And we have a couple of things that have happened
2 in Number 10 that we can't necessarily take credit for
3 as the police department but we are very, you know,
4 happy that they are going on. Right down the street
5 here at Woodrow Wilson and Oakman, the old Bell
6 building, a neighborhood services organization has
7 purchased that as people here know from Focus Hope. And
8 that building has languished empty for quite a while.
9 And I was lucky enough that I had a tour with some other
10 people from Number 10. They've put about -- if I
11 remember about 50 million dollars into that building.
12 And, you know, it went from being a vacant -- somewhat
13 of a kind of an iconic eyesore I guess you could call
14 it, and they should be -- from the last date I remember
15 they should be on the verge like this week -- it was mid
16 July was the projected time to start locating tenants
17 there. It's going to have 155 efficiency apartments,
18 staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

19 Part of the long range plan does involve
20 having medical clinics in there. And it's going to be a
21 variety of NSO clientele that will be brought into that
22 facility. And the idea of -- you know, I think the
23 initiative is called Home First. I can't remember the
24 exact phraseology of it. But the idea is that people
25 with substance abuse, crime problems and other issues,

1 the first foundation to getting them straight on that is
2 giving them a nice house to live in. Like I say, it was
3 about a 50 million dollar investment that was put into
4 that facility. And we are glad that we in Number 10
5 will try to help them make that a success as they open
6 it up.

7 Another thing that happened based mostly on
8 donations from the Lear Corporation is down there due
9 west of Williams Rec Center there at Rosa Parks and
10 Euclid on the back side, you got Williams Park. And I
11 don't know if anybody has had occasion to see that, but
12 they have put in about \$500,000 in value and a whole lot
13 of sweat equity into renovating that whole park.
14 There's some swing sets, barbecue grills and whatnot.
15 But especially in this time of year with the heat wave
16 that we do have, probably the biggest thing is that
17 built in water park. That has been very popular with
18 the kids you know. Nobody thought of it until the
19 temperature started creeping up around 100. So that's a
20 very big deal, much appreciated from the Lear
21 Corporation doing that. And that concludes my report
22 from Number 10.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Inspector,
24 Deputy Chief. Do we have any questions? Commissioner
25 Taylor?

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I have a question. I
2 heard you talk about non-fatal shootings. Can you
3 explain the procedure again?

4 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: What it is when we
5 mention the on call prosecutor, we have our normal
6 response based on our investigative personnel that
7 responds to scenes of non-fatal shootings after the
8 initial scout car responds there. But there's been --
9 and it's not unique to Number 10. So, the Wayne County
10 Prosecutor's Office has an on call prosecutor who if we
11 get an unusual circumstance that maybe we have a witness
12 that we know has information but they're withholding
13 that information, being other than forthright as far as
14 what they saw, we have the ability to use our
15 relationship with the on call prosecutor to have an
16 investigative Subpoena, which is a method of compelling
17 somebody, a reluctant witness, to help out.
18 Additionally, if we get the need for something like a
19 search warrant to go and try to get the fruits of the
20 crime, that relationship enables us if necessary in the
21 wee hours of the night at times for them to come out and
22 help us immediately at the scene. It's just another
23 investigative tool in the tool box.

24 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thanks again, Inspector

1 Kyriacou. This district, District Precinct 10 and
2 Precinct 6 is always near and dear to my heart. I grew
3 up in this district on Albert between Linwood and Long
4 and was actually a Police Explorer back in 1981.
5 Officer Heath and Officer Keith Woods were the officers
6 that were in charge at the time. So, I would love to
7 come and talk with the Explorers just to let them know
8 that the lessons they learn in that program will stick
9 with them for a lifetime. So we thank you, Sergeant,
10 and the community relations program and the other
11 officer for all that -- your terrific job that you all
12 do in a very challenging environment with limited
13 resources. And so thank you, sir, for your report.
14 Appreciate it.

15 At this time, we come to the part of our
16 meeting that we really enjoy and give us an opportunity
17 to honor and highlight those citizens who have done just
18 an outstanding job going over and beyond the call of
19 duty. And tonight is no exception. And so I'm going to
20 ask that Commissioner Jessica Taylor could call up our
21 honoree for tonight.

22 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's Miss Alethia Esther
23 Henderson.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Give her a hand as she is
25 coming.

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Resolution Honoring
2 Ms. Alethia Esther Henderson. Whereas Ms. Alethia
3 Henderson is a dedicated and committed supporter of the
4 City of Detroit Tenth Precinct. Her commitment to
5 business, service and leadership is exemplified
6 throughout the community; and whereas Ms. Alethia
7 Henderson, a woman dedicated to education, is a product
8 of the Detroit Public School System. In 1956,
9 Mrs. Henderson graduated from Northeastern High School,
10 where she received her vocational license in nursing.
11 Ms. Henderson furthered her education at Wayne State
12 University where she received her Bachelor's degree in
13 Sociology and her Master's degree in Education Guidance
14 Counseling; and whereas Ms. Henderson worked for
15 Highland Park General Hospital and North Detroit General
16 Hospital for eight years and later went on to work for
17 the Salvation Army and Metropolitan Hospital in the
18 alcohol detoxification and treatment unit. Later,
19 Ms. Henderson became a counselor for the State of
20 Michigan where she has assisted single mothers in
21 securing employment. Ms. Henderson worked for the State
22 of Michigan until her retirement in 1997; and whereas in
23 1965, Ms. Henderson was an active member of the
24 3700-3800 Vicksburg Block Club. She also served as
25 president on the New Hope Community Association board

1 since 2007. She works to strengthen her community by
2 gathering other blocks within her neighborhood to focus
3 on uplifting the area for a better and more attractive
4 community; and whereas Ms. Henderson has been a member
5 of the Tabernacle Baptist Church, located at 2080 West
6 Grand Boulevard since 1983. She has spent many
7 volunteer hours assisting with church events. She is
8 past president for the fellowship board called Group 15,
9 The Good Ethics Club, whose mission is to locate fellow
10 parishioners and provide them with knowledge of the
11 Bible through bible study; and whereas Ms. Henderson
12 attributes her strength, motivation and character to her
13 late grandfather Robert Walden -- an emancipated slave
14 in the 1800's. Ms. Henderson remains a loyal supporter
15 of the Tenth Precinct Community Relations Team and is
16 dedicated to the mission of partnering the police with
17 the community to build a healthier and safer
18 environment.

19 Now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit
20 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of the
21 citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police
22 Department acknowledge the giving spirit and community
23 service of Ms. Alethia E. Henderson. Her vision for
24 Detroit and its citizens is unmatched and highly
25 respected.

1 We thank and congratulate you, Ms. Alethia
2 Esther Henderson.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We have some more for you.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: On behalf of the Chief of
5 Police, I would like to present to you the Detroit
6 Police Department Certificate of Recognition to
7 Mrs. Alethia Esther Henderson, resident of the City of
8 Detroit, in appreciation for the following outstanding
9 service and cooperation. For your involvement in
10 community and services to the City of Detroit,
11 supporting our efforts in the community, demonstrates
12 spirit and commitment that is truly worthy of
13 recognition. Dated July 12, 2012, and signed by Chief
14 of Police Ralph L. Godbee, Jr.

15 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Spirit of Detroit award
16 is presented herewith as an expression of gratitude and
17 esteem of the citizens of Detroit to Mrs. Alethia Esther
18 Henderson in recognition of exceptional achievement,
19 outstanding leadership and dedication in improving the
20 quality of life. Signed by all nine members of the City
21 Council and dated for July 12, 2012. Thank you very
22 much.

23 MS. HENDERSON: I'd just like to express my
24 thank you to all of you Police Board of Commissioners,
25 to the officers in the Tenth Precinct, those in the

1 Twelfth Precinct. We went through some changes a few
2 years ago. We work with the Twelfth Precinct too. And
3 it's just a joy for me to be recognized by others. And
4 it's inspired me to continue to try the best I can to
5 add to our community. Thank you all for your
6 recognition.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We have another resolution
8 honoring Commander Kenneth Bryant Williams who is
9 retiring. I'm going to ask if Vice Chairperson
10 Commissioner Taylor will read the first whereas and the
11 resolved.

12 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay. Resolution
13 Honoring Commander Kenneth Bryant Williams. Whereas
14 Commander Kenneth B. Williams retired from the Detroit
15 Police Department on June 1, 2012, after completing
16 25 years of dedicated service to the Department and to
17 the citizens of Detroit; and whereas Kenneth B. Williams
18 was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on April
19 13, 1987. Upon graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan
20 Police Academy, Officer Williams began his career in law
21 enforcement at the Eleventh Precinct. He also served at
22 the Law Department Police Section, Protective Service
23 Section, and Headquarters Bureau; and whereas Officer
24 Williams was promoted to the rank of Sergeant on July
25 24, 1998, and assigned to the Tactical Operations

1 Section, the Office of Chief of Police Section, and
2 reassigned to Tactical Operations Section; and whereas
3 Sergeant Williams was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant
4 on February 6, 2004, and reassigned to the Tactical
5 Operations Section. During this period he also served
6 at the Eleventh Precinct, Office of Homeland Security,
7 Tactical Operations, and Western District; and whereas
8 Lieutenant Williams was appointed to the rank of
9 Commander on December 3, 2007, and assigned to the
10 Northwestern District. Other assignments included
11 Central District Central Events, and the Central
12 District, where he served until his retirement; and
13 whereas Commander Williams' leadership and law
14 enforcement skills have been recognized and honored by
15 various Departmental awards, including (1) Chief's Unit
16 Award, (1) Chief's Merit Award, (1) All Star Baseball
17 Award, (1) Rosa Park Award, (1) Super Bowl Award, (1)
18 Life Saving Medal, (1) Commendations, (3) Departmental
19 Citations, and numerous and Letters of Appreciation; and
20 now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit Board of
21 Police Commissioners, speaking for the citizens of
22 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department, awards this
23 Resolution in sincere appreciation and recognition of
24 Commander Kenneth B. Williams for his 25 years of
25 outstanding service and commitment to the City of

1 Detroit and its citizens. His tireless efforts and
2 faithful public service merit our highest regards and
3 best wishes for continued success.

4 We salute and congratulate you, Commander
5 Kenneth Bryant Williams.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I move, brother fellow
7 members of this Commission, that -- I'm sorry. I will
8 accept a motion that the Resolution honoring Commander
9 Kenneth Bryant Williams and Resolution honoring
10 Mrs. Alethia Esther Henderson become part of our
11 permanent archives for the Board of Detroit Police
12 Commissioners.

13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Second.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
16 and supported. Hearing no questions, all those in
17 favor?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
20 carries. Thank you, ladies and gentlemen. Again
21 congratulations on just an outstanding job. Growing up
22 in the city, I know that it is members and citizens like
23 Sister Williams -- I'm sorry, like Sister Henderson who
24 literally make this city go. It's really not about the
25 folk downtown. It's about the folk who live in the

1 neighborhoods. It's about the folk who do their job.
2 We thank you. We thank you day in and day out. It's an
3 outstanding job.

4 We have a couple of policy directives on our
5 agenda. And we want to move through those at this
6 particular time. Good evening, sir.

7 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Good evening, Commissioners
8 and Deputy Chief Lee. Lieutenant Mark Bliss, planning
9 and accreditation. We handle all the Detroit Police
10 policies. There are two up today for approval. The
11 first is secondary employment, 103.5. Commissioner
12 Warfield, you brought up a -- when it was presented, you
13 brought up a question regarding notifying the employer
14 of the availability of citizens complaint reports being
15 done. I spoke over with the Office of Secondary
16 Employment. And they are going to inform all the
17 current employers of that option to do a CCR if there's
18 any issues and any new employer coming in, they are
19 going to have the pamphlets or information given to them
20 so they know ahead of time when they apply for that. So
21 that has been addressed, sir.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Excellent. Thank you.

23 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Secondly, the detainee
24 registration 305.2. When we posted it on the city
25 website, there was a problem with one of the links, and

1 it was not linking to the directive. Because of that, I
2 recommend that at least for a week to two weeks, we hold
3 off on approval of that just to make sure that everybody
4 gets a chance to see it since they couldn't see it prior
5 due to that. It was a technical glitch.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Sorry. Is your
7 motion, Lieutenant, that we not vote tonight on
8 Directive 201.11 and 305.2?

9 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Actual, the 201.11, that's
10 actually a new directive coming out. The one that I
11 would like to be held off is 305.2. But 103.5,
12 secondary employment, has been out, has been posted. So
13 that one can be voted on for approval. But the 201.11
14 hasn't been presented to the Board yet.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Again, the main change in
16 that one, is that the giving out of the pamphlet
17 information regarding --

18 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Yes. It has been
19 addressed.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Great. Having said that,
21 members, what is your pleasure concerning Policy
22 Directive 103.5?

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Move that we accept it.

24 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Second.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved

1 and accepted and supported that we accept Policy 103.5
2 as it has been presented to us for our manual. Is there
3 any discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER STEWART: None.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Hearing or seeing none,
6 all those in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
9 carries. Thank you, sir. Appreciate it, Lieutenant.

10 LIEUTENANT BLISS: There was on the agenda for
11 the 201.11 which is the brand new directive. That's
12 going to go up -- it's going to be -- it's actually in
13 your office. It has been posted and also on the website
14 for review by the community. It is a brand new
15 directive to come out. It's basically based on the use
16 of force reporting which is mandated for our Consent
17 Decree.

18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. So, this does have
19 of course Consent Decree implications, right?

20 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Yes, it does.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Is this a modified version
22 of something we already have or is this brand new?

23 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Well, there was -- in a
24 sense it's both because the use of force investigation
25 came out in 2005 as a training directive. And

1 throughout the years, it has been slowly modified based
2 on feedback from the monitor. What we did is we took
3 all of that and we put it into one directive that goes
4 in the manual. Training directives don't go in the
5 manual per se. They are separate from it. They are not
6 written directives. This we took ever teletype that
7 came out through the department and we looked at all the
8 training directives, and then we also spoke with -- all
9 of the staff that really deals with use of force, deals
10 with CRIB, with the monitors. And we got a lot of
11 feedback. And we took care of a lot of issues in order
12 to make this almost like the ball (inaudible) policy for
13 the manual that any member who wants to know about
14 initially use of force and detaining reporting
15 investigation can go to this initially, and it will give
16 you direction or where else to go in order to solve any
17 questions that you have. But it took almost basically
18 with the research and the meetings close to a year to
19 put this together, just going through things. So it is
20 a significant directive, very significant.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We will bring this back in
22 about 30 days.

23 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Yes.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: One more thing to ask is
25 that the members of the Board, especially our board

1 attorney, take a close look at this because certainly it
2 has implications for our investigators over at the
3 Office of the Chief Investigator when we get complaints
4 of force because we know that there has been questions
5 about what can we investigate as relates to force, as to
6 what goes over to internal affairs. So, I'm just going
7 to admonish our Board and our attorney to read through
8 this carefully. And we will bring it back in 30 days.

9 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Yes. Obligations have been
10 actually put in there. And we took them into
11 consideration that now that CCR police reports are done
12 through the MAS system, so that policy is implemented in
13 here for your use, sir.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay, great. Any
15 questions for Lieutenant Bliss from the members?

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I don't have any.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
18 Appreciate it.

19 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Thanks.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right. Have a good
21 night. We have one final voting issue on our agenda
22 tonight, and that is a grant request on behalf of the
23 Department. I'm going to ask if Vice Chair Commissioner
24 Taylor would read that grant request for us, please.

25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay. Request

1 permission to accept a disproportionate minority grant
2 entitled First Contact for the award year 2012 through
3 2013, CFS contract 12-04-148, the County of Wayne,
4 Michigan, acting through the Department of Children and
5 Family Services has granted the Detroit Police
6 Department \$102,542.96 with no cash match to fund a
7 police officer position, salary and fringes, to work as
8 a liaison officer within the First Contact Grant. A
9 drop-in center and a juvenile assessment center will be
10 developed where DPD officers can bring youth that have
11 been detained for ordinance violations.

12 The liaison will work with DPD and
13 non-department personnel to insure the success of the
14 project. Duties include demonstrating working knowledge
15 of DPD policy and procedures and disproportionate
16 minority contact tenets; demonstrate knowledge of the
17 First Contact program by being able to thoroughly
18 explain the program to parents, youth, DPD patrolmen and
19 other law enforcement personnel; consistently make
20 rational and reliable recommendations regarding the
21 First Contact Program; attend DMC steering committees;
22 provide monthly activity reports, etc cetera. The grant
23 period would commence on April 1st, 2012, and end on
24 March 31, 2013. If approval is granted to accept this
25 funding, Commander Robin Innes of the Criminal

1 Investigation Bureau would serve as the project
2 director. The appropriation number is 13545. I'm
3 requesting the Board's permission to accept this funding
4 and seek approval of the honorable Detroit City Council.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: What is your pleasure?

6 COMMISSIONER STEWART: I move to accept
7 this -- the department accept this grant.

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been property moved
10 and supported that the department will apply for this
11 grant and accept it. Any discussion? Any questions?

12 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No questions.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
16 carries. Thank you, ma'am. Thank you, sir. There are
17 several announcements that we want you to know. First
18 of all, next Thursday, our meeting will take place at
19 3:00, but it will not be at 1300. It will be at the
20 Central District, which is 7310 Woodward. And that is
21 due to the Detroit Tigers game that same day. We try to
22 move those meetings when we know the Tigers are playing
23 so that you won't have to pay inflated parking fees.

24 So, next Thursday, July 19, at 3:00 p.m., at
25 the Central District right on the corner of the Woodward

1 and the Boulevard. Also want to apprise you, those of
2 you that are civic minded, that there is a public safety
3 hearing, committee hearing, for the Detroit City Council
4 that will take place on Monday at 10:00 p.m. At that
5 meeting, we will be talking about the issue -- 10:00
6 a.m. I'm sorry. Did I say p.m.? If you were in
7 church, I would say I was just testing your hearing. At
8 10:00 a.m., at 10:00 a.m. on Monday morning. That
9 particular hearing will be talking about the issue of a
10 public safety millage.

11 We have put forth a proposal to raise about 50
12 to 56 million dollars that will go to put upwards to 500
13 more officers on the street. And so, the public safety
14 committee then makes the recommendation to the general
15 body of the Detroit City Council to vote on it. And so
16 at that meeting we will ask them to vote to approve this
17 to go to the general body of the Detroit City Council.
18 And so, we believe there should be debate about this.
19 We believe there should be discussion about this, that
20 the voters should be able to vote in November if they
21 want to increase the level of security that they have in
22 the City of Detroit.

23 For those of you who can come out, again
24 that's Monday at 10:00 a.m. at the Detroit City Council
25 meeting room. I also want to announce the command

1 accountability meeting will be held on Tuesday. What is
2 that date? The 17th. Thank you, Tuesday, the 17th. We
3 have the new location of -- typically we hold those at
4 Wayne County Community College downtown. On Tuesday, it
5 will be held at the Wayne State University at the
6 community auditorium. And this is a very important
7 meeting too because at this particular meeting, you hear
8 from all of the various commanders of the Detroit Police
9 Department from precincts and districts throughout the
10 entire system. The Chief is there, all of the
11 department brass is there. And our federal monitors who
12 monitors the Detroit Consent Decree will be there as
13 well. And you can get an update on how the Department
14 is doing with the Consent Decree and what's going on in
15 various areas throughout the entire department,
16 throughout the entire City of Detroit. Again, that is
17 Tuesday at Wayne State University, 10:00 a.m. in the
18 community auditorium. And I guarantee you if you show
19 up you will not be disappointed, very important meeting
20 there.

21 Finally, there is a Detroit Police Department
22 family and community day which will be held on
23 Wednesday, August 1st, 2012. It will take place right
24 at the Belle Isle Casino. And that will be from 10:00
25 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. They will have a petting zoo there,

1 tumble bus, static displays. Canine units will be there
2 displaying what they do. Boat rides will be there, hot
3 dogs, hamburgers, potato chips, just a number of great
4 activities. There will be a DJ there, lot of games,
5 prizes. So, the whole family ought to come out. Again,
6 that's on Wednesday, August the 1st, 2012, at 10:00 a.m.
7 to 6:00 p.m. at the Belle Isle Casino. Again, that's
8 the Detroit Police Department family community day.

9 When I was growing up, we used to have the
10 field day at Tiger Stadium. Well, this is the field day
11 you know at Belle Isle Casino. Those are the
12 announcements that I have for tonight.

13 At this time, we want to open up oral
14 communications. If you wish to address the Board of
15 Police Commissioners, you may come to the mic, to the
16 podium right here. Please state your name for the
17 record. And if you spell it for us, it will help us to
18 get it correct. And we ask that you will abide by our
19 two-minute rule so we can get as many comments in as
20 possible. And our office administrator, Mr. Robert
21 Brown -- wave your hand, Robert -- will let you know
22 when you're approaching the two-minute limit. And we
23 just ask for the respect of everyone that's here that
24 you abide by those two minutes. Thank you. You may
25 come at this time.

1 MS. PANNELL: Good evening. Sharon Pannell.
2 My concern is the Second and Fourth Precincts has split.
3 And I wanted to know about the community relations
4 sergeant in the Second because I heard they don't have
5 one. And I need to know where will we have our meetings
6 in September? Do we still go on Fourth Street or will
7 we go on Lesure?

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Miss Pannell.
9 Deputy Chief?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Deputy Chief Lee. Through
11 the Chair. See me after the meeting and we will clarify
12 that. I'm sure they should have equal community
13 relations groups in both precincts. And if not, they
14 will be consolidated at the Southwest.

15 MS. PANNELL: Thank you.

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Pannell.

17 MR. THOMAS: Good evening.

18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening, sir.

19 MR. THOMAS: To the Commission and police
20 staff. My name is Charles Thomas, president of Bellmont
21 Community Council. And I am speaking on behalf of the
22 Northwest Coalition of Councils, which consist of
23 myself, Bellmont, Bethune, Blackstone Association,
24 Cadillac Association, Grand River Greenfield
25 Association, Northwest Community Association and Stan

1 Association. And what our concern is, we are trying to
2 stabilize the city. We know about the rebuilding and
3 restructuring. But we have to be able to stabilize that
4 which we have to maintain and build off of that. And
5 what we want to do is to refurbish a building that's
6 been in commission for over 40 years that recently has
7 fallen on economic bad times. And that building is
8 15749-51 Grand River. And we need assistance for the
9 cleaning up of that building, structural improvements
10 internally and externally. We know that's not your
11 primary concern. But the use for the building would be
12 educational training, the redevelopment, youth support
13 program, senior citizens assistance program. And our
14 main concern to you is that we would like to have police
15 presence by having a mini station at that location. And
16 15 years ago, it used to be there. With the recent
17 moving of community access centers, the community does
18 not have accessibility to information that needs to be
19 disseminated and to be able to receive the goings on of
20 what is pertinent and prominent in the community.

21 So what we would like -- I would like to leave
22 maybe five copies with the appropriate people and they
23 would get back with me into how they can assist us in
24 making sure that the mini police station can be there.
25 And we are going to try to make sure that there's not a

1 lot of cost involved because that was the reason why
2 they closed down the other centers. But we do need your
3 presence there.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Thomas, for
5 your comments. A few things. There is a person that I
6 saw from Detroit City Council. Where are you? See him
7 back there with his hand up? You definitely want to
8 talk to him tonight, okay, before you leave talk to him.
9 And then Deputy Chief Lee?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Through the Chair, I
11 will have him talk with DC Melvin Turner. Although we
12 are not able to man the mini stations now, we do take
13 into consideration if they wanted to be a sub station
14 where the equipment is there that we can actually come
15 in and do our reports from time to time, we will
16 entertain that. And you can just talk with DC Turner
17 after.

18 MR. THOMAS: We got connected tonight.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you again,
20 Mr. Thomas.

21 MS. VANCE: Good afternoon. My name is
22 Bridgett Vance. And I'm the community safety
23 coordinator for the community known as Central Woodward
24 north end. That area covers from I-75 over to Linwood
25 and from 94 to Oakman where we are working with a youth

1 group. We are working with Lieutenant -- I'm sorry,
2 Inspector Nick, Commander Love in the Tenth Precinct
3 with our youth over there. We have a safety station
4 where youth -- these youth that you see here working
5 today are there. They are being trained on auto theft
6 prevention. They are going in the community making that
7 research available to residents within the central
8 Woodward north end area. Those youth are also working
9 inside of Central High School to create a safe
10 environment by creating a place where young people can
11 come and report various incidents that may be happening.
12 We are working in partnership with the Tenth Precinct as
13 well as Central District around these issues, very very
14 closely with Commander Turner and some of your other
15 officers over here.

16 And I just wanted to make sure that they are
17 recognized for working with us and really going above
18 and beyond to make sure that these youth are involved
19 and engaged in the effort.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Absolutely. Hold on one
21 second before you leave, Miss Vance. First of all, I
22 have met your young people before the meeting. And just
23 we do take our hats off to them just for an outstanding
24 job and for you to be getting them involved.

25 MS. VANCE: Skillman and Bliss. They are both

1 being funded by that effort. Thank you.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions for
3 Ms. Vance? We do want to get some information from you
4 later. So if you can hang around just a little bit or
5 Commissioner Taylor will see you before you leave out,
6 okay?

7 MS. VANCE: Thank you very much.

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you to your young
9 people. Just an outstanding job. Thank are for the job
10 that you're doing.

11 MS. VANCE: Be on the lookout for them this
12 summer. They are also being employed by us for six
13 weeks to do various projects in the community with the
14 residents.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Outstanding job.

16 MR. SCOTT: Ron Scott, Detroit Coalition
17 Against Police Brutality. Before I make my comments, I
18 just wanted to give kudos and a shout out to
19 Commissioner President Warfield for working hard to get
20 a number of young people employed this summer. How many
21 do you have?

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We actually have 172 young
23 kids working in our program.

24 MR. SCOTT: Because we know that as we talked
25 about public safety, that one of the key elements of

1 public safety is public employment, to have some money.
2 And so, within that context, you know, I have to take my
3 hat off to you. I want to raise a question because we
4 are in a time where we are talking about possibly Public
5 Act 4 and many other things that are eroding the economy
6 of the City of Detroit. And while I as much as anyone
7 else in our organization, we are concerned about public
8 safety and how it's rendered by the sworn officers.

9 But what I am concerned about is the question
10 of many different law enforcement entities entering into
11 the city and the fact where there's no memorandum of
12 understanding where there is a statute in relationship
13 to the independence of the Detroit Police Department.
14 I'm speaking specifically about MSP and the Wayne County
15 Sheriff's Department. While one would say it's a good
16 thing to have their support, the question arises in
17 relationship to the federal Consent Decree and other
18 matters and to this body as to what your responsibility
19 is when other entities come in in relationship to their
20 presence on the turf of Detroit. So I'd like to know,
21 since they are here, how did they get here? What's
22 their relationship, and what will be the oversight
23 responsibility of this Commission?

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Scott. And
25 that's an excellent point. And I'd add one more entity

1 to that. I would add the Detroit Crime Commission to
2 that as well.

3 MR. SCOTT: Absolutely agree.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm going to ask if our
5 staff could reach out to those entities as well as with
6 DPD that we may in one of our meetings do a presentation
7 on the inter workings of these agencies, how they cross
8 over, what are the boundaries that they have, what are
9 the responsibilities and how does that impact -- you're
10 absolutely right -- this Board and the independence that
11 the Detroit Police Department has. And so I'm going to
12 ask our staff if we can do that. I don't know if,
13 Deputy Chief, if you have anything -- any comments to
14 make on that issue?

15 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, I do
16 believe that for the fireworks, we did have the
17 interagency MOU's that were in place when they came in.
18 I know there was something that was done by Council, the
19 Sheriff's and their involvement in the city as well as
20 the state police. They're coming -- they are part of a
21 group that's already here. So they are just adding
22 personnel to that if I'm not mistaken.

23 MR. SCOTT: What I'm concerned about is the
24 question of their latitude in terms of law enforcement.
25 The television reports that I saw, they specified that

1 they were going to be doing those things which I thought
2 Detroit was doing. And inasmuch as the Board has said
3 that on Monday, they were going to go before City
4 Council to try to get additional officers, it seems to
5 me that the independence of this city -- and in the 1909
6 Charter -- was specified by the independence of policing
7 and fire. We lose those, we lose our city. That's my
8 opinion.

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Scott, I do not
10 disagree with you on that at all. And I think it is an
11 issue because without question, you know, and those who
12 are sitting here know, we are living in a day and a time
13 in which our City Charter, the rights of our public
14 officials to govern are being challenged on every hand.
15 And, you know, if we don't understand what is happening
16 in the past, our history, we are already in the trap to
17 repeat that. So, that is something we will look into to
18 get a clear understanding because again it speaks to our
19 autonomy and home rule, our ability to govern and make
20 the decisions for ourselves.

21 MR. SCOTT: Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

23 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon, my name is
24 Yolanda McCants. I'm the vice president of the
25 Northeastern District community relations council. And

1 I'm also a member of the Detroit Police Citizens Academy
2 alumni. And I'm here today because our group, if they
3 would stand with me please, we used to have a program
4 where we would go out to the District and set up a table
5 for information to help the officers out prior to an
6 incident that happened at one of the stations. We've
7 been kind of lax in going back into the stations because
8 of the virtual precinct. And I have some concerns. And
9 one is those phones, the ones that's in the lobby of the
10 stations that we cannot get weekends and after 4:00.
11 There is no sanitation on those phones. Those phones
12 are scary. Those phones are filthy. Is there any way
13 that we can find out how after 4:00 that there's some
14 type of box for sanitized napkins or something to wipe
15 those phones down? And even during the day, when we
16 have to go inside of the station, those phones are the
17 same way. And I'm not just talking about Northeastern
18 District. I have been to several other districts just
19 to see if the same thing was going on. And it is. So I
20 don't know who I'm supposed to see. But we need some
21 answers to these telephones and especially after I heard
22 they had bed bugs on the bus. I don't want nobody to
23 say I got some kind of something from our district.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. McCants.
25 Deputy Chief?

1 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Deputy Chief Lee. We kind
2 of discussed that a little bit last week. The two
3 people that ultimately would be responsible for that
4 have retired. But I will make sure that the commander
5 who is over that particular unit, facilities, will take
6 a look at that and see what we can do in terms of maybe
7 some wipes just like you do in the grocery store, you
8 pull taut and just wipe.

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We will definitely get
10 back with you to let you know what the progress is,
11 Ms. McCants.

12 MS. McCANTS: Thank you very much.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you for bringing
14 that to our attention.

15 MS. HATCHER: Good evening. My name is
16 Evangelist Dora Hatcher. Just to piggy-back on what
17 Miss McCants said, I just have a recommendation. I
18 don't recommend wipes because people will take them
19 home. But there is a container that you put on a wall,
20 the foam. They won't take that home. So we won't have
21 that excuse for not being able as Miss McCants did not
22 say, to have ear juice on the telephones. And she had
23 said also that she went in one of the stations, there
24 were ants on the table. So we know that all people are
25 not very clean. So, I suggest instead of the wipes, the

1 foam. Thank you, and be blessed.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Evangelist
3 Hatcher.

4 MS. JACKSON: Hi. Kim Jackson, president of
5 Northeastern District community relations. I just want
6 to say how disappointed I am that our officers, our
7 firefighters, our teachers and our EMS workers are
8 getting screwed by and by. Without those four entities,
9 there is no city. And to have those type of cuts and
10 those type of -- I mean, it's mind boggling. And then
11 we expect them to go out and act like everything is
12 okay. It's not okay. It's not okay with me. And I'm
13 not part of them. So I guess it's just, you know, I
14 mean it's only so much I know that you guys can do. But
15 I think it's more of a frustration. It's more of a
16 frustration with me to know that they are working with
17 nothing you know. I mean they are getting paid nothing.
18 It's just -- it's a mess all the way around.

19 And I don't know what needs to be done in
20 order to get this moving forward because we are going to
21 the wayside. I mean, it is ridiculous. Every day is
22 something going on, bodies being found, bodies being
23 burned, bodies in dumpsters, houses on fire, garages on
24 fire. We don't have enough people to even respond.
25 Where does it stop? Where does it stop? Where do you

1 guys recognize these men and women who put their lives
2 on the line every day, when do they get recognized? I
3 just think something needs to be done. And I think this
4 body maybe can help do that.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, Miss Jackson, first
6 of all thank you. It's always good to see you. As you
7 may or may not know, this body passed a resolution a few
8 months ago supporting that public millage that would put
9 up to 500 officers on the street in addition to the
10 levels that we currently have right now. And that's
11 what we are going to City Council, to the public safety
12 sub committee to talk about on Monday, getting them to
13 support that measure to put it on the ballot so that the
14 citizens of the city can vote on that. I mean, we feel
15 the exact same way that you do, that we do not have
16 enough officers on the street. We are not even working
17 with the skeleton crew any more in my personal opinion.
18 So, we are in need of more bodies on the street clearly.

19 MS. JACKSON: I mean firefighters and EMS
20 workers need to be included in that as well.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: They are included. I want
22 to say that to you, it's a public safety millage, not
23 just a police department millage. So there is money
24 that will be in there for EMS as well as for fire. So
25 if you all come out on Monday at 10:00 and let City

1 Council know that we need your support, that would help
2 a great deal. Thank you.

3 MS. JACKSON: Thank you.

4 MS. STOKES: Good evening to the Commission.
5 My name is Alvin Stokes. I'm the chairman of the Tenth
6 Precinct community relations. I want to first of all
7 welcome you to the Tenth Precinct. It's an honor and
8 pleasure to have you here. When we finish, we have
9 refreshments over at the table. But I want to take my
10 hats off to our men and women in blue. Although they
11 are overworked and short staffed, they are still working
12 hard for us, the citizens. And for that, we say thank
13 you. We like to recognize them every chance we get.
14 The young lady before me asked where does it stop.
15 Well, it starts with the community. It starts with the
16 block clubs, with the associations, with those that are
17 looking out for the citizens, for the seniors, for the
18 youth. It starts with us. We can point fingers. But
19 as we point one, there's three pointing back at
20 ourselves. We need to look in the mirror and say what
21 am I doing to better my community? And when you can
22 stand up and say I'm doing my share, then you can do
23 your share and be proud of the City of Detroit.

24 I have been here all my life. I'm not looking
25 to go anywhere. But I'm going to do my share to help

1 any and every one that I can. Thank you.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Stokes.

3 MS. DAVIS: My name is Mary Davis, and I'm a
4 part of the block club in the Tenth Precinct. Part of
5 our problem is some of us need to do as I have done. I
6 came back from Boston, Massachusetts. I came home.
7 There is all kind of talk. It's not that we didn't hear
8 it in Boston. It's not that I wasn't aware of it from
9 my family. This is home, not out in the suburbs, not
10 anywhere else but here. As soon as we knew of a block
11 club, we went and joined. I am therefore committed to
12 being where you ask us to be, to speak when we need to
13 speak, to say what's on my heart and to beg my fellow
14 Detroiters, why don't you talk to your relatives and
15 your friends, bring them back in the city?

16 I heard you say that you rotate on five-year
17 basis. This is my personal comment. I don't know who
18 is coming up on five, but I hope it's one of you who is
19 really for the City, and may I strongly suggest that if
20 you leave the Commission, why don't you try politics.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Miss Davis.
22 Thank you.

23 MS. SMITH: Good evening to the Commissioners.
24 Deputy. Good to see all of you again after a month
25 absence. I have been hearing some pleasant things, and

1 then I've been hearing some negative things. Oh, I'm
2 sorry, Bernice Smith, member of the 300, Detroit 300 and
3 a precinct delegate in the mid town. First of all,
4 there's some good news that I want to present to the --
5 not only to you and the public also. A week ago I was
6 looking at the TV. I forgot what station it was. It
7 was one of the off stations. Commissioner Warfield, you
8 was on. It was over 33 police officers that was being
9 rewarded with commendations by the Chief and you and
10 Logan. I thought that was a wonderful program. And I
11 think more Detroiters should see the good that the
12 police officers are doing and how they have put their
13 lives on the line. As we all know, we don't have
14 enough. We know that. But the fact is that was a
15 wonderful program. And I really thoroughly enjoyed it.
16 And I wish -- because I spoke with the Chief this
17 morning in regards to it on the air because you know I
18 speak every morning in regards to letting the public
19 know to get a rerun on it. And I was going to leave
20 that up to you to see that, you know, that it's on the
21 air again because I think then the public will have a
22 broader view of what the police is doing out here and
23 how they are being threatened. They are being shot at,
24 whether we know it or not. You'd be surprised how many
25 police are being shot at every day just about. This is

1 what happened over on 94. The police driving along and
2 here this man shooting at somebody else because they got
3 his car. What's wrong with people? If your car is
4 insured, let them have the car. Your life is more
5 important.

6 I talked with Representative Womack the other
7 day when I asked him, why did you make that statement
8 you're not going to have my car? You got it insured.
9 Give it to them. Your life is more important. So I
10 tell everyone, when you're at a gas station, be careful.
11 When you're at the gas station, look at your
12 surroundings. And try not -- women, to go at night.
13 Try your best not to get any gas at night. Don't be out
14 at no 2:00 or 3:00 in the morning. I do commentary on
15 Angelo's show. And every morning he is talking about
16 women at the gas station or out sitting in their car at
17 2:00 and 3:00 in the morning. What are you doing out at
18 that time of morning?

19 So, therefore, I say to the women in this city
20 over and over again, especially the women -- because I
21 am a senior myself. But the fact is, we must be careful
22 of our surroundings and our bodies because we don't know
23 what's going to happen to us, all right? And again, I'm
24 glad to see all of you again. And I will be back. And
25 I just want to let you know keep up the good work and

1 hopefully that budget will allow us to have more police
2 on. But you're shaking your head no.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Not this budget.

4 MS. SMITH: Well, I know we are short because
5 McKinney did make a statement that he had 4,000 where
6 you're down now to 3,000. So, I know there's a shortage
7 in the police department being what's going on with the
8 police department. I just want you to be aware that we
9 do need you out there. And I want all of them to be
10 careful in their duties and being out there in the
11 public because it's getting worse. It's not getting any
12 better. So we just have to be careful. And Brown,
13 thank you very much for me not looking at you today.

14 MR. CAMPBELL: Good evening everyone.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Make sure that we are
16 listening to everyone, give them our undivided
17 attention.

18 MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, sir. I appreciate that,
19 Commissioner Warfield. So, to the Detroit Police
20 Commission, to the citizens of the Tenth Precinct, my
21 name is Dustin Campbell. I used to cover this area.
22 Toney, I see a friendly face up there. So greetings on
23 behalf of Wayne County Commissioner Alicia Bell. She
24 made it a point for me to come by here today to invite
25 the Police Commission and the citizens of the Tenth

1 Precinct to come and join her at the park for a picnic
2 on Thursday, July 19, 2012, at 5:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m.
3 The site will be at Warrendale and Edward Hines Park.
4 That's located at 23300 Warren Avenue, between Telegraph
5 and Outer Drive. It's food, it's free and it's fun. So
6 please call and RSVP. The phone number that you can
7 call to RSVP is 224-0936. So, we really hope to -- I
8 left some information on the table. As you exit today,
9 you can pick it up. And contact the office if you have
10 any questions. And we just hope to see you all there.
11 Okay? And I'm a Detroitter through and through. So we
12 love the boys in blue, all right? So God bless you all.
13 We know it's strenuous work. But you're in our prayers.
14 And we know that you're doing the best that you can
15 given what you have to work with. So, we are going to
16 continue to fight and be good neighbors, look out for
17 each other. Take care and clean up our own
18 neighborhoods. And we continue to depend on you all for
19 protection. Thank you.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Campbell.

21 MS. NICKERSON: I am Mrs. Nickerson from
22 Russell Woods/Sullivan area association. And I'm here
23 to invite all the people who think we need more police
24 and more firemen to do something about their children at
25 home so that they can grow up to be firemen and

1 policemen. So I encourage and invite you to get
2 involved in those kids' lives so that we have the proper
3 people to do these jobs. It's our fault that our city
4 is the way it is because our children take and give
5 nothing. Okay. These young people tonight we're
6 certainly very proud of. But most of them are taking,
7 not giving.

8 I also came to invite you all to the Russell
9 Woods/Sullivan area Jazz in the Park on July 22nd, from
10 6:00 to 8:00. We'd love for you all to be there. It's
11 a lovely community affair that doesn't make the paper
12 because nothing ever goes wrong. So, that it doesn't
13 make the paper. But there are 500 to 600 Detroit
14 citizens who have a good time on a Sunday evening. And
15 nothing happens. So it doesn't make the paper. So,
16 come join us and talk about it.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: What's the location again?

18 MS. NICKERSON: Russell Woods Park. It's at
19 Fullerton and Broad Street. Bring your own chairs. You
20 can't cook in the park. We'll expect you all. And take
21 care of your kids. Make them behave. Let them stop
22 taking dope so they can pass the test and get -- make
23 them get their GED.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mrs. Nickerson.

25 MR. HENDERSON: All right. Commissioners,

1 good evening. My name is Donald Henderson, son of
2 Alethia Henderson. I want to come and invite everybody
3 out to a DMAMEA event, that's Detroit Metro Area
4 Musicians and Entertainers having a jamboree July 30th,
5 2012, 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. out at Belle Isle. So,
6 kids are free. The jam sessions, concert starts at
7 3:00. There will be horseback -- well, pony rides.
8 Bring the family. \$10 donation. You can snack all day,
9 dinner served at 6:00. Come out and have fun. If you

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Spell that again, please.

13 MR. HENDERSON: Sure. It's D-M-A-M-E-A.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Say it again.

15 MR. HENDERSON: Darrel, Michael, Allen,
16 Michael, Earnest, Allen.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: There you go. Thank you.

18 MR. HENDERSON: Thank you.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Thank
20 you. Are there any more comments? Hearing or seeing
21 none, I want to thank all of you. We will close that
22 portion. We got one more. All right.

23 MS. BRYANT: Good afternoon, everyone. My
24 name is Dorie Bryant. As a matter of fact, I work for
25 Focus Hope. I had to do a little over time today. But

1 I was determined to be here to be able to get out what I
2 need to get out. My group is -- stand please -- Detroit
3 Police Citizens Academy Alumni Association. We have
4 gone through the Detroit Police Citizens Academy and
5 graduated and formed an alumni group. And what we do is
6 better relationships between the police department and
7 the community. We stand behind our police 100 percent.
8 We support them in every way possible.

9 We also have to let them know what's happening
10 with the community and how the community feels. I'm
11 sure you have heard this. But of course we want to try
12 to drive it home because it's such an important
13 important issue that we keep hearing from the community.
14 So we must share that with you. There is a real real
15 dangerous precedent being set with what's going on with
16 our precincts being closed early. We have all felt it.
17 I'm sure we all have feelings behind it. We understand
18 some of the reasons for it. But it's not really working
19 well. So, what I would like to know is are there things
20 being put in place or is there something that's going to
21 be changed to make this any different, to make this
22 change that we are going through with the police
23 department a better feel for the community and more in
24 line with the safety issues of the community?

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Deputy Chief? And then I

1 will comment on it.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Deputy Chief Lee
3 through the Chair. In terms of a safety issue, we --
4 the virtual precincts have added more officers to the
5 streets. And we are not closed in the sense that the
6 doors are not open for the public. If the public comes
7 in and has to come to the precinct, those doors will be
8 opened at any time. That's 24 hours, seven days a week
9 no matter what it is you need to come in there for. If
10 the volunteers in terms of Detroit police citizens have
11 the access to be able to still come in and do some
12 community type things, maybe answer phones or something
13 like that within the precinct, I'm sure that we can work
14 through that and make that happen.

15 MS. BRYANT: Absolutely. We definitely have
16 what's called our courtesy greeters. We have worked in
17 the precincts. But since the changes have come, it has
18 changed what we do. What we did was try to give a
19 friendly face to each of the precincts, to be able to
20 greet the community when they come in and be able to
21 help them navigate within the precinct. That has
22 changed. But we are ever available as I said we totally
23 100 percent -- Sergeant Carey knows, DC Turner knows.
24 We are supportive 100 percent. But we want to let you
25 know what's going on in the community because we try to

1 bridge that gap between the police department and the
2 community. So we have to let you know what's going on
3 in the community so we can work on that. Okay.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. At this
5 time, we will close this section of our meeting. And we
6 will get ready to adjourn. Thank you to all of you for
7 coming out. I appreciate you and all the announcements.
8 And we ask that you stay for fellowship that the Tenth
9 Precinct, that they have provided refreshments. At this
10 time, I'll entertain a motion for adjournment.

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

12 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Second.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
14 and second. All those in favor?

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Meeting adjourned.
