4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon,
5 ladies and gentlemen and welcome to the Board of
6 Police Commissioners meeting.

7 My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of
8 the Board of Police Commissioners. Serving with
9 me today is the Vice-Chairperson of the Board,
10 Commissioner Jessica Taylor, Commissioner Donnell
11 White and also Commissioner Toney Stewart.

12 Representing the Chief's Office today
13 with us is Deputy Chief Benjamin Lee. Sir, good
14 to have you here.

15 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Our Board
17 Secretary, Mr. George Anthony, I'm going to ask
18 if he will for the record introduce our staff
19 that's present.

20 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
21 Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony,
22 Secretary to the Board. We have present
23 Ms. Pamela Davis Drake who is our chief
24 investigator, Ms. Loletha Porter-Coleman who is
25 our director of Police Personnel, Ms. Celia Banks

1 Washington who is our attorney to the Board.

2 We also have Mr. Robert Brown, our
3 office manager; Sgt. Alan Quinn who's recording
4 our proceedings and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson
5 Court Reporting Service. That completes the
6 introduction, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
8 we greatly appreciate that. At this time, I'm
9 going to ask if Commissioner White would give us
10 our invocation for today's meeting.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. Let us
12 pause.

13 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN).

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
15 We appreciate that, Commissioner White. I want
16 to move for approval of today's agenda, just with
17 the caveat that we need to rearrange it somewhat.

18 We have a fairly busy agenda today and
19 so we have a closed-door session, a couple of
20 closed-door sessions for suspension without pay
21 that's scheduled and due to some scheduling
22 restraints I'm going to ask if we can move that
23 to the beginning of the meeting before we get
24 into reports and things like that so we can get
25 that taken care of when we have a voting body to

1 weigh in on that and the other voting issues, if
2 that's the pleasure of the body.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, I move
4 for approval of the agenda with the
5 aforementioned changes.

6 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
8 properly moved and supported. Any more
9 discussion? Hearing and seeing none, all those
10 in favor?

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
13 opposed? Motion carries. We'll also entertain a
14 motion to approve the minutes from Thursday,
15 October 11, 2012.

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
19 properly moved and supported. Any discussion?
20 Not hearing or seeing any, all those in favor of
21 accepting the minutes?

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
24 opposed? Motion carries. Again, before I go
25 into my Chairperson's report I would rather for

1 us to move straight into our suspension without
2 pay cases.

3 I'm going to ask if our Board
4 Secretary, George Anthony, will lead us into that
5 session.

6 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
7 Mr. Chair. You received two requests for
8 suspension without pay for closed-door sessions.

9 As a public body, your meetings are
10 subject to the Open Meetings Act. The Open
11 Meetings Act defines a meeting as the convening
12 of a public body at which a quorum is present for
13 the purpose of deliberating towards or rendering
14 a decision on a public policy, MCL 15.262(b).

15 The Open Meetings Act, however, does
16 allow a public body to call a closed session, one
17 limited to the public body and its invitees, for
18 specific purposes.

19 Only deliberations may be conducted in
20 closed session. All decisions must be made at a
21 meeting open to the public. While in the closed
22 session the Board makes no decisions. That must
23 be done on the record.

24 On Thursday, October 25, 2012 you will
25 be presented with a suspension without pay

1 recommendation for two officers, Police Officer
2 Rosaura Dominguez Badge 4688, and Sgt. Tanya
3 Hughes Badge S-781 through their respective
4 representatives DPOA attorney John J. Goldpaugh
5 for Officer Dominguez and LSA attorney Fred
6 Walker for Sgt. Hughes. They have requested
7 closed sessions for the purpose of contesting the
8 suspension without pay recommendation.

9 The closed session will be called
10 pursuant to MCL 15.268(a) of the Open Meetings
11 Act which states in part,

12 "A public body may meet in a closed
13 session to consider the suspension of
14 or hear charges brought against an
15 employee. A simple majority vote is
16 required to close a session for this
17 purpose."

18 At this point a motion is in order to
19 close the session.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Is there a
21 motion?

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, I
23 move that we move into closed session to handle
24 the matters of personnel.

25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
2 properly moved and supported that we move into
3 closed session to handle the aforesated
4 personnel issues that are before us. Any
5 discussion?

6 Hearing or seeing none, all those in
7 favor of the motion?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
10 opposed? Motion carries. We will move into
11 closed session. This is not, of course, as you
12 know, the end of our meeting. We will come out
13 of closed session and continue our meeting after
14 we have deliberated. Thank you.

15 (Closed-door session was held off
16 the record.)

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, a motion
18 is in order to come back to public session from
19 closed session.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
23 properly moved and supported that we reconvene in
24 open session from closed session.

25 Mr. Secretary.

1 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir.
2 You met in closed session to consider the
3 suspension without pay recommendation of the
4 Chief. The first suspension without pay hearing
5 was in the matter of Sgt. Tanya Hughes Badge
6 S-781 and unless contravened by this body, the
7 suspension without pay recommendation will stand.

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Contravene.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, there is
10 contravention.

11 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So that means
13 the suspension without pay will not stand.

14 SECRETARY ANTHONY: And the second case
15 you heard the suspension without pay
16 recommendation for Police Officer Rosaura
17 Dominguez Badge 4688 and unless this Board
18 contravenes, that recommendation, the suspension
19 without pay recommendation, will stand.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Mr. Secretary,
21 there is no contravention, so the suspension
22 without pay will stand.

23 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
25 Again, I want to thank our audience for just your

1 patience. Certainly we needed to do that today
2 for scheduling restraints. There are a few other
3 issues that we need to talk about and discuss.

4 I want to ask if Chief Investigator
5 Davis Drake would come to the podium and give us
6 a brief update as to where we are with the
7 investigation of the situation.

8 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
9 Pamela Davis Drake, for the record, chief
10 investigator.

11 The team has pulled together all
12 policies that we feel are necessary for the
13 furtherance of the investigation and we're
14 currently reviewing those policies, sir, for the
15 formulating of interview questions.

16 We're currently also awaiting
17 additional information from the City at this
18 time.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Could you talk
20 to us a little bit just briefly about what is the
21 focus of this investigation?

22 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: The focus is on
23 policy and procedures and no allegations against
24 any individual, but the focus is on the policies
25 and procedures, sir, and if there was any breach

1 in policy, any deviation from policy, and if
2 policy is needed in certain areas.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Do you
4 have an estimated time of when you think your
5 team may be crossing the finish line, without
6 compromising, of course, the investigation?

7 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: Certainly. We're
8 hoping within the next two weeks.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any questions
10 from colleagues? Thank you, Chief Investigator.

11 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: You're welcome, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry, yes.
13 Can you just give us a Chief's report since
14 you're standing there too, please?

15 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: Sure. Our current
16 statistics, the total number of open cases 205.
17 We have 25 cases that were submitted from closing
18 and zero cases, once again, over 90 days.

19 This makes the seventh week that we
20 have had zero cases over 90 days. Because the
21 backlog has been eliminated we are concentrating
22 more heavily now on the quality of our reports.

23 To that end we've held two staff
24 trainings, one on effective case and time
25 management and the other on conducting canvasses.

1 Also the Federal Monitors have met with
2 us twice this week and have provided further
3 guidance so that we can continue to improve on
4 the quality of the reports that we produce.

5 The reduction in the deadline from 80
6 to 90 days seems to be working quite well. We're
7 seeing a notable improvement in not only the
8 timeliness of the reports, but also the quality.

9 We will be instituting again our
10 internal audit process which will review all
11 aspects of the cases including any audio and
12 video recordings and we plan to do that at least
13 quarterly, possibly monthly.

14 And I believe that's the end of my
15 report.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Also, Chief
17 Investigator, we have received your progressive
18 disciplinary recommendations for the staff over
19 at OCI.

20 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: Yes, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: What we will
22 do, we will take that matter up at our next
23 meeting. We still need some time to review all
24 of this, okay?

25 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any questions
2 for Chief Investigator. Thank you, ma'am, we
3 appreciate your report.

4 MS. DAVIS DRAKE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We want to give
6 an update, a general update, as relates to the
7 search for a new Chief of Police. As you well
8 know, the new Charter that we are under operation
9 basically indicates that the Board of Police
10 Commissioners will conduct a search using a
11 search firm and we will hand that list over of
12 final candidates to the Mayor for the Mayor to
13 make his final selection.

14 We have started the process, we have --
15 and we'll talk about this in a moment -- we have
16 isolated some companies that we believe will be
17 excellent in this. We've spoken with them.
18 There were a couple of companies that backed out
19 because of conflict of interest issues and so the
20 companies that we have reviewed and spoken with
21 on behalf of the Personnel Subcommittee were very
22 very well qualified we feel and we'll make that
23 presentation in a moment.

24 But just to give you a process of how
25 this will flow from here, after the Board votes

1 today to or not to accept the companies that have
2 submitted proposals, we're looking at a two-phase
3 process.

4 One will be to cast the wide net in
5 order that they may go and actually do the search
6 for the candidates and the candidates, of course,
7 then will have to apply through the firm that has
8 been selected by this Board.

9 That firm will conduct initial
10 interviews. That firm will also do all editing
11 of resumes that may not reach or meet the
12 qualifications of the job descriptions that we
13 have. I want to pause for a moment to thank the
14 citizens because last Friday under the leadership
15 of Vice-Chairperson Commissioner Taylor we got a
16 great deal of feedback from the community as
17 related to what we wanted to see as relates to
18 qualifications and characteristics, and even some
19 of their plans for the new candidates and those
20 comments and suggestions are incorporated and
21 will be incorporated in the interviewing process.

22 After we get to the position where the
23 firm wants to submit to us a number of candidates
24 the Board will meet with those candidates, we
25 will finalize our list and send them through the

1 second process.

2 The second process will be a very
3 extensive assessment of each candidate and they
4 will be run through the paces of what they --
5 what their plans are, what their actions will be
6 as relates to being Chief of police in a major
7 metropolitan system. After they come through
8 that process, then the final list will be
9 forwarded over to the Mayor.

10 As we said last week, we believe that
11 this process should be done within 90 days is our
12 target we should be able to get a list of
13 candidates to the Mayor for his selection.

14 Again, it is not this Board's position
15 to select the next Chief, it's just this Board's
16 position to search for the candidates and provide
17 the final list that the Mayor can pick from.

18 Having said all that, I do want to make
19 a report from the subcommittee, from the
20 Personnel Subcommittee, and the report was that
21 there are two firms.

22 One is EMPCO which is located in Troy,
23 Michigan who had expressed an interest in helping
24 us with this matter.

25 The other company that we believe would

1 do a great job is TJA Staffing Services that's
2 located here in Detroit, Michigan. Just for the
3 record, should I read some of this in just for
4 the record?

5 For the record, I just want to read
6 just some of their qualifications and some of
7 their past history. TJA Staffing Services is a
8 full-time staffing service company. They have
9 been in business for more than 20 years.

10 They have searched for presidents and
11 vice-presidents and CEOs for clients throughout
12 the metropolitan Detroit area. They do customer
13 research and sourcing. Mr. Tom J. Adams is the
14 proprietor of that business and he has a very
15 long list of clientele that he has worked for,
16 again be it local HMOs, be it -- he's done some
17 previous work with the City of Detroit and he is
18 used to placing folks in \$100,000 plus positions,
19 those who make that money.

20 He just so happens to be a resident
21 also of the city of Detroit. Again, that's TJA
22 Staffing.

23 EMPCO, again as I said earlier, is
24 located out of Troy, Michigan. They will be --
25 we are proposing they would be in charge of doing

1 the actual assessment of the candidates.

2 What they specialize in is assessing
3 chiefs of police for various departments
4 throughout the metropolitan Detroit area and they
5 do work in 13 other states as well. They come
6 very highly recommended.

7 They have tested over 5,000 candidates
8 using over 400 examinations annually, and they
9 have worked with over 500 different agencies.
10 This is their specialty and this is what they do.

11 And so this is my subcommittee report
12 for the personnel that we go with these two
13 companies. Again, the two other companies, two
14 backed out because of conflict of interest issues
15 and one company we felt would not be able to
16 support our needs.

17 And so I'm opening it up to the floor
18 for conversation and discussion or a motion.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, prior
20 to a motion can you speak to the budget
21 implications?

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely and
23 I thank you, Mr. Commissioner, you bring up a
24 very good point. One of the things that we did
25 when we were on -- in our meeting last week in

1 San Diego -- we were out there for a national
2 convention -- we reached out to the Detroit
3 Public Safety Foundation and we reached out to
4 them and asked them if they would be interested
5 in sponsoring this search, in other words paying
6 for it and financing it.

7 They're in the process of reviewing
8 that for us right now, and it looks like this is
9 something that they are seriously considering.

10 I cannot say to this body that they
11 have signed on completely yet because they're
12 waiting for us to vote on this first before they
13 make that decision, but I do know that they're
14 doing their due diligence and waiting on us.

15 So potentially, potentially, this
16 particular search will have minimal if any cost
17 to the City of Detroit. Having said that, we're
18 looking at if the City did take on this cost,
19 we're looking at in the neighborhood of about
20 \$60,000 to \$63,000 to complete this process.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, forgive
22 me if I overlooked it, but within somewhere of
23 the proposals is there a bottom line number to
24 which each proposal represents?

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely,

1 yes, sir. For TJA Staffing and Associates -- I'm
2 trying to get to that page -- I think it's on
3 Page 8 in your -- I think it adds up to about
4 \$43,000 for their fee, it's on Page 8.

5 And for EMPCO, theirs is approximately
6 -- and theirs is dependent on the number of
7 candidates that go through the assessment phase
8 -- but there is -- we're estimating that that
9 process will cost somewhere between \$20,000 and
10 \$26,000 at the most.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Are there other
13 questions? So if there are no other questions, I
14 will entertain a motion.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, as I'm
16 looking through this -- I'm looking through both
17 of these proposals as a wealth of information, so
18 am I under the assumption that a motion today
19 would be to approve one of these proposals to
20 move forward with this company as it relates to
21 the search?

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir. The
23 motion today will be to allow us to hammer out a
24 deal with both companies that we may sign a
25 contract and come to an agreement with our terms.

1 We have not sat down and negotiated any terms or
2 agreements, but a vote today would give us the
3 opportunity to sit down and enter into full
4 negotiations and move forward with the companies.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And it's
6 neither/or, correct?

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Both, it's both
8 because the one company will actually do the
9 assessment and let me explain that too for the
10 Board.

11 It's stated that it's somewhat of a
12 conflict of interest for one company to do both
13 the search and also the assessment because you
14 have greater transparency when one part of the
15 actual search is being done by one company and
16 then they pass the information on and then the
17 grading, the actual grading, the actual testing
18 and assessment, is done by a completely different
19 agency and then I think you have greater
20 transparency and trust in the entire process.

21 So it's not either/or, it's actually
22 both. And so the numbers that we gave earlier,
23 the round figures were for both companies.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So the budget
25 impact for this endeavor is about \$68,000 and not

1 --

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I think it
3 would be closer -- actually I think it's closer
4 to \$60,000. Okay, again, we have not sat down
5 with negotiations, but when we're talking with
6 them on the phone it seemed like it would be
7 closer to \$60,000.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And just one last
9 point of clarification, Mr. Chair. If you
10 could, again revisit the search for the companies
11 as it transpired. I believe there were a number
12 that were deemed conflict of interest and the
13 like, so if you could just revisit that again,
14 please.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: What I don't
16 want to do, only for the record sake because some
17 did not want to present their names --

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Not company names,
19 just in terms of --

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: There were two
21 companies -- thank you -- there were two
22 companies who wished not to submit proposals as
23 we reached out to them for conflict of interest.

24 One of the conflicts of interest dealt
25 with the fact that our former Chief sat on their

1 Board, so we respected that of course.

2 And then the other company that
3 submitted along with these two we felt did not
4 have the experience or the expertise to do this.
5 And, you know, we were happy and satisfied with a
6 local person who was able to be in touch and in
7 close proximity so that if we needed to get there
8 and go back and forth it would be very easy to do
9 that.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And my last last
11 question, I think Commissioner Stewart might have
12 a question, but out of the three companies that
13 were just referenced, where do they line up as
14 relates to either the assessment or the search
15 portion?

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Excellent
17 question. EMPCO was the only assessment company,
18 the others were search.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So the other two
20 that chose not to submit and the company that was
21 deemed with no experience were all search?

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Question through
25 the Chair. So today when we okay this, that

1 doesn't mean that we pay for it?

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, let me
3 say this very clearly.

4 COMMISSIONER STEWART: If they don't
5 start paying for it, you say you had some
6 finances from someone else?

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We're currently
8 in discussions with them. They have not given us
9 a final decision. We believe they're going to do
10 it and we know that the Administration is aware
11 of the costs, of the potential costs involved,
12 and so whether the City pays for it or if we're
13 able to have it paid for by a foundation, by the
14 Public safety foundation, it will get paid for.

15 So the administration is fully aware of
16 what the potential costs are.

17 COMMISSIONER STEWART: So what was the
18 procedure before this -- well, I don't want to
19 get into that.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, the
21 procedure before was that he would just pick who
22 he wanted.

23 COMMISSIONER STEWART: But now it has
24 to be funded, right, these two companies?

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Right, right

1 exactly.

2 COMMISSIONER STEWART: So it actually
3 takes both these companies to make it fair?

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir, to
5 make it fair.

6 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Make sure we get
7 the right person.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir,
9 absolutely.

10 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Because we don't
11 need --

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And let me
13 explain this too for the Commissioners because I
14 think it's important for the Commissioners and
15 for the public to understand this.

16 That, you know, it's possible that a
17 year from now we may be going through the exact
18 same process and so the candidates will know that
19 and understand that as well. And I think it's
20 also noteworthy to mention that we want to make
21 sure in doing this -- and this is our first time
22 ever having this role and responsibility that we
23 do it right the very first time and that we make
24 sure we move forward in a way where it is very
25 transparent, as we held the forum last week for

1 the citizens to weigh in on this. We wanted to
2 make sure that every step of the way that people
3 are notified of the progress.

4 COMMISSIONER STEWART: That was going
5 to be my next question, that we are communicating
6 with the people?

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely,
8 sir, absolutely.

9 COMMISSIONER STEWART: They will be
10 involved?

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely.
12 They have a hand in the process already.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So, Mr. Chair, at
14 this point I move that this body move forward
15 with this executive search procedures as
16 outlined, and in doing so in that motion that we
17 engage companies EMPCO and TJA Staffing Solutions
18 to complete that search.

19 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Second.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
21 properly moved and supported. Any more
22 discussion regarding the subcommittee personnel
23 report? Any more discussion?

24 And, again, this is a historic moment
25 in the city of Detroit and I think this is going

1 to be a very good process. I think we're setting
2 a very excellent precedent for those
3 Commissioners who will come behind us as relates
4 to how we move forward, and I think in a more
5 excellent way in the choosing of a Chief for the
6 city of Detroit.

7 Having said that, we will do -- can we
8 do a roll call vote and could you call the roll,
9 Mr. Secretary?

10 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir.
11 This is a roll call vote and so I would like to
12 register Commissioner Toney Stewart's vote.
13 Approve?

14 COMMISSIONER STEWART: Approved.

15 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Would like to
16 register Commissioner Donnell White's vote.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Approve.

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Would like to
19 register Commissioner Jessica Taylor's vote.

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I remove myself
21 in this process.

22 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Absentia? Would
23 like to register Chairman Jerome Warfield's vote.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Approve.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: There are three

1 votes that approve and one vote in absentia.

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
3 thank you follow Commissioners. A couple other
4 voting items we want to get to fairly quickly
5 here.

6 There is a grant request to accept an
7 increase in the fiscal year 2013 Traffic
8 Enforcement Grant Program from the Michigan
9 Office of Highway Planning and I'm going to ask
10 if Commissioner White could read that for us.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Before us is a
12 request for permission to accept an increase in
13 the fiscal year 2013 Traffic Enforcement Grant
14 Project from the Michigan Office of Highway
15 Planning.

16 The Michigan Office of Highway Safety
17 Planning (MOHSP) has awarded the Detroit Police
18 Department an additional \$100,000 with no cash
19 match for the fiscal year 2013 Traffic
20 Enforcement Grant Project.

21 The added funding will increase the
22 overall grant budget from \$200,000 to \$300,000.
23 The appropriation number for this grant is 13521
24 and the Cost Center number is 372484.

25 The increase funding will allow for

1 payment of personnel overtime wages. The goal of
2 MOHSP is to increase the use of safety belts and
3 proper use of child safety seats thus
4 substantially improving the likelihood of
5 surviving a traffic crash and/or reducing the
6 severity of injury.

7 Additionally, during the enforcement
8 DPD officers will also focus on removing
9 impaired, intoxicated drivers from behind the
10 steering wheels of cars, thus reducing their
11 ability to hurt themselves or others. Police
12 Officer Viera Brownlee of Grants and Contracts
13 will serve as the project director for the grant.

14 Mr. Chair, I move for adoption.

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
17 properly moved and supported that we adopt the
18 grant request. Any questions or discussion?
19 Hearing or seeing none, all those in favor of the
20 motion?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
23 opposed? Motion carries. Thank you, sir.

24 Deputy Chief, is there a report?

25 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair,

1 there is no formal report, but I do have an
2 announcement about the reopening of the 4th
3 Precinct.

4 Deputy Chief Benjamin F. Lee. I do
5 have an announcement through the Chair for our
6 reopening of the 4th Precinct. We're having a
7 grant reopening of the 4th Precinct this Friday,
8 October 26 tomorrow from 1 PM until 5 PM.

9 (Commissioners White and Stewart
10 leave the meeting.)

11 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: There will be a 2 PM
12 ribbon-cutting ceremony and the 4th Precinct is
13 located at 4700 West Fort Street. There will be
14 light refreshments as well as classic cars will
15 be on display.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well,
17 wonderful. Is that it?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: That's it.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Question for
20 the department as relates to -- as we get ready
21 for Angel's Night and Angel's Night activities.
22 We know that there's usually a sweep of cars off
23 the street. I think I heard about it on the news
24 I think last night or this morning.

25 What procedures or what practices is

1 the department going to do this year for the
2 sweeps, car sweeps?

3 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I am not personally
4 aware of any particular -- through the Chair --
5 any Halloween sweeps for abandoned cars.

6 I do know that the sheriffs have been
7 towing vehicles within the city, abandoned
8 vehicles, but I'm not aware of any program that
9 we have. We really haven't had that particular
10 program where we had a blitz for some years now.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So if you do,
12 could you let us know?

13 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay, thank
15 you, sir. At this time our next meeting will be
16 Thursday, November 1, 3 o'clock PM here at police
17 headquarters -- there's not a game that day, is
18 there? Are you sure?

19 Police headquarters, 1300 Beaubien,
20 Room 328-A.

21 At this time we'll open the floor for
22 oral communications. If you wish to address the
23 Board of Police Commissioners if you can please
24 come to the podium.

25 MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon. My name

1 is Sharon Pannell. I wanted to know about the
2 signs that go on the houses for Angel's Night, do
3 you have any?

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir?

5 MS. PANSELL: On the empty houses, you
6 know what I mean, those signs, those watch signs?

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Right, the
8 Angel's Night signs, right, the watch --

9 MS. PANSELL: Yes.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I'm not aware of
11 whether or not the fire department provided those
12 signs this year. The City has them?
13 Neighborhood City Halls?

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Neighborhood
15 City Halls? Who has them? Neighborhood City
16 Halls, are we sure? Neighborhood City Halls,
17 Ms. Pannell, has them.

18 MS. PANSELL: Thank you.

19 MS. MORRIS: Hello, Tijuanna Morris,
20 Fight For Your Rights Investigations. I'm not
21 speaking for the Detroit Coalition Against Police
22 Brutality, I'm not speaking for Peace Zones for
23 Life, I'm speaking for Fight For your Rights.

24 Today I would like to speak out to the
25 young officers in this time of stress that

1 they're going through to maintain their status
2 quo, keep their heads, because we need them, we
3 need their professionalism and continue to pray
4 for them that we get through these hard times and
5 looking for justice and accountability for our
6 department as well as our City Council.

7 Thank you.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
9 Ms. Morris. Yes, ma'am.

10 MS. BOYKINS: Thank you for letting me
11 come and address the Commission. I'm a resident
12 --

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Your name for
14 the record?

15 MS. BOYKINS: Joel Boykins, a resident
16 on the east side of Detroit or exactly, some
17 community houses that we're renovating on the
18 east side of Detroit. There's a particular house
19 that's a nuisance activity that is, I would
20 imagine, unlawful and I would see whether or not
21 I could get some redress or some way to get that
22 problem removed.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Mr. Deputy
24 Chief.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, Deputy Chief

1 Lee through the Chair. See me right after the
2 meeting and I'll get the information from you.

3 MS. BOYKINS: Okay, thank you very
4 much.

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you for
6 coming, Ms. Boykins. Is this your first time
7 coming to a meeting?

8 MS. BOYKINS: Yeah, absolutely.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Don't make it
10 your last. Come back and see us again, please,
11 just to get information. I think it's a good
12 place to get information as relates to safety.

13 MS. BOYKINS: Problems in the
14 community, yeah, because I think Detroit has a
15 strong opportunity to improve if we all come
16 together and work together.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.

18 MS. BOYKINS: Okay, thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

20 SGT. MILLER: I'm going to use my two
21 minutes very quickly. My name is Kevin D.
22 Miller, I'm a sergeant with the Detroit Police
23 Department and February of this year will mean
24 that I now have 25 years with the department.

25 And I would say for the most part of my

1 career it has been a very fun one, and my
2 reputation speaks for itself. However, you will
3 hear from some that I'm a rebel or too vocal or
4 what have you.

5 But there is an issue that has happened
6 within the Detroit Police Department whereby I
7 had to write to the Independent Monitor which is
8 Chief Robert Warshaw.

9 There is a case that just recently went
10 to court before Daphne Means Curtis where I was
11 the Plaintiff against Commander Linda Peltier,
12 Commander Frankie Lewis and retired Susan
13 Sylvester, the -- as a result of reporting some
14 alleged misconduct.

15 So after reporting the alleged
16 misconduct --

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Hold on one
18 second, sir. I just want to make sure that
19 either you or us don't get in trouble legally so
20 I'm just going to ask counsel to just help us
21 weigh in if we go too far because I want to
22 jeopardize anything.

23 Is there anything -- so is there
24 something still pending or is that case resolved
25 out of court? I'm asking -- I'm sorry, I'm

1 asking the sergeant.

2 SGT. MILLER: Right now we're looking
3 at appealing a decision.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So, ma'am, how
5 far should we go with this or -- okay, you keep
6 going.

7 SGT. MILLER: I'm going to be very
8 brief, it's very surface. As a result of
9 reporting some alleged misconduct by two superior
10 officers, meaning two officers above me in rank,
11 I was gravely harassed and disciplined in a
12 nature that was unprecedented.

13 So, as I stated just a few moments ago,
14 which resulted in me going to court, which we've
15 been there and contemplate appealing the decision
16 of the jury. I just wanted this to be noted. I
17 do have copies for you all of the letter that I
18 sent to Chief Robert Warshaw, but in the -- the
19 jury --

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So just -- is
21 that information you're about to say in the
22 letter?

23 SGT. MILLER: Yes, it is.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can we just
25 read it privately? Can you just give that to us

1 privately?

2 SGT. MILLER: I'll respect that for
3 now.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Because
5 whenever we deal with legal -- Sgt. Miller,
6 whenever we deal with legal matters we just want
7 to be very careful because this is a public
8 record that we are establishing and we want to be
9 very careful about impugning others' character in
10 the public record without them having the
11 opportunity to defend themselves.

12 So we will -- here's what we will do.
13 I'll let you know this now. We will read it and
14 if you can speak with our attorney, Celia Banks
15 Washington, we will establish a line of
16 communication if we need to talk further about
17 this. Is that okay?

18 SGT. MILLER: That's fine, thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
20 appreciate it.

21 MS. ROMANO: Good evening. How is
22 everyone this evening?

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good, how are
24 you?

25 MS. ROMANO: Pretty good, thanks. My

1 name is Anna Romano and I have just two
2 announcements to make. DPD is having its second
3 annual Veterans Day luncheon on Monday, November
4 12 at Jane Seer Post on Mound in the Northeast
5 District from 11 AM to 2 PM and I do have some
6 flyers for you and there's flyers to be handed
7 out.

8 Also Interim Chief Logan is having a
9 food drive for homeless veterans. It's starting
10 Monday, October 29 through Monday, November 12.
11 Non-perishable food items may be dropped off at
12 all DPD locations. So we're trying to get the
13 word out to the community and I see different
14 community leaders here.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Is that it?

16 MS. ROMANO: That's it.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

18 It's always good to see you, God bless you, good
19 to see you. Thank you.

20 MR. FOSTER: Good evening, Board.

21 Barry Foster with LIJBS Towing. Good evening,
22 Deputy Chief.

23 I was coming to the Board to bring you
24 guys information on the update of the transport
25 of the DPD helicopter. I was -- I got

1 information from Sgt. Richey to share with you
2 guys to let you know where they're at from
3 Aviation right now.

4 They're -- they've turned in all the
5 paperwork and right now they're just waiting on
6 actually our company, I've been in communications
7 with the mechanic down there in Delaware and
8 we're hoping to do this if not this Monday, it
9 would be the second week of November to bring the
10 helicopter back for DPD.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Wonderful,
12 amen. Now, with the invoice --

13 MR. FOSTER: That's the other thing.
14 We were forced to submit an invoice because we
15 said we was going to do it at no charge to the
16 department, so we've submitted an invoice for \$1
17 to the City.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you and
19 amen. I'll get back with you on that.

20 MR. STIDHAM: Good afternoon,
21 Mr. Chair, Commissioners and Deputy Chief. Tom
22 Stidham.

23 I know some of the Board was not here
24 last week, but during public comment I did have a
25 question for the Deputy Chief about if the Chief

1 could update us on the status of the department's
2 interaction and happenings with the Municipal
3 Parking efforts underway to influence or to merge
4 the police authorized towing and I know that I
5 did speak after the meeting with -- and I think
6 Deputy Chief Tolbert was very clear that he did
7 have someone from his staff attend the meeting
8 last week, but he was not there and so I just
9 wanted to see if I could get an update on what
10 has transpired over the last two weeks.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Deputy Chief Lee.
12 If DC Tolbert can come forward and provide an
13 update.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good afternoon,
15 Board, Deputy Chief James W. Tolbert. The answer
16 to Mr. Stidham's question is that there were
17 multiple individuals there, but in the last week
18 I can tell you that the current process is that
19 the Detroit Police Department plans on taking
20 aban tows, opening up Number 1 Pound and taking
21 aban tows there within, I would say, in the next
22 couple of weeks. That's what I've been told.

23 MR. STIDHAM: Can I just follow up on
24 that, Mr. Chair?

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yeah, sire.

1 MR. STIDHAM: Is that -- will that be
2 -- will that process, Chief, be headed by the
3 department or by officials within Municipal
4 Parking?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: It is my
6 understanding at this point -- I don't have the
7 specifics, but it is my understanding at this
8 point towing will be done just as it is at this
9 point and they will just be taking aban tows to
10 the Number 1 Pound. That's my understanding
11 right now.

12 MR. STIDHAM: And are there going to be
13 only a selection or selected group of towers
14 that are going to tow those --

15 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: That is not my
16 understanding. My understanding is as it stands
17 right now the towing process will remain the
18 same, it's just the vehicles will be going --
19 instead of going -- some vehicles will be going
20 to Number 1 Pound. That's my understanding as of
21 today.

22 MR. STIDHAM: Okay, thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, that's
24 breaking news certainly for us for a couple of
25 reasons, and Deputy Chief, you might want to stay

1 there for a moment.

2 It's always been the department's
3 position, at least since I've been here, that
4 they wanted the police officers out of towing,
5 and as you and others might know, if you open up
6 an impound, the department opens up an impound
7 according to city ordinance and City Charter, you
8 will have to put officers there at the impound
9 which will end up pulling more -- moving more
10 resources away from the street or from wherever
11 else and watching over a yard.

12 And I would think that a policy change
13 like that -- and that's how I'm couching it and
14 characterizing it -- as a major policy change if
15 we're going to move aban and open up a new
16 impound that this Board has to weigh in on that
17 first before that change happens.

18 And I know we have not been involved in
19 any discussions on a committee level or any other
20 level as relates to moving abans and opening up a
21 new yard for that.

22 Because it's going to require a budget
23 to do that because there's going to be costs
24 associated with the build-out of that yard to
25 bring it up to zoning requirements as well as,

1 again, assigning personnel in that area.

2 And the last time I reviewed the budget
3 we did not have any officers assigned to impound
4 yards, and so for that discussion to be made or
5 -- actually not to be made -- but for that
6 discussion to go on to the fact that it may
7 happen, as you say maybe within the next couple
8 of weeks it's very concerning to us from the
9 standpoint that we have not heard of it at all.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: To the Chair, I
11 am -- I just received this information at 13:58
12 and so I wasn't -- I don't know the particulars
13 about the specifics of the operation, but I guess
14 I'll have to say I will have to find that out and
15 report that out next week because I'm just
16 receiving -- and what I told you was what I
17 received in a short e-mail.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay, well,
19 thank you for informing us. We will certainly --

20 MR. STIDHAM: Mr. Chair, can I just
21 follow up on that?

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yeah,
23 absolutely.

24 MR. STIDHAM: What is the projected
25 budget for the build-out and the manpower that --

1 have they even disclosed that to you, Chief?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: No. Through the
3 Chair, no.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: There is no
5 budget because we did not approve a budget for
6 that, so I don't know. I don't know where this
7 money is coming from because, you know, they cut
8 the police department's budget by a very
9 significant amount and we're operating from what
10 I was told on a shoestring budget so that's why
11 even for the selection of a new Chief we went to
12 an outside agency to see if they can fund this
13 because we do understand the budget
14 considerations that the City of Detroit is under,
15 let alone the department.

16 So we'll get more information on it.
17 As the Deputy Chief said, we'll get more
18 information, but I mean it's good to know it's
19 out there because we did not even know it was out
20 there, so at least we know and we'll get more
21 information and move forward.

22 MR. STIDHAM: Very good, thank you.
23 Thank you, Deputy Chief.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any other
25 comments for the Board? Please not on this

1 though because I'm going to get some more
2 information on the abans, so before anything
3 happens, trust me, we'll get more information on
4 it first.

5 MR. ERRIGO: Good afternoon, Board,
6 Chief? Gregory Errigo, Michigan Auto Recovery.
7 I guess I'm a Detroit Police Department tower
8 with nothing there.

9 Wayne County Sheriffs are taking our
10 cars. Now we're going to take our cars to DPD to
11 Number 1 Pound if it approves. And I don't know
12 what's going to come next, but all I know is
13 we're all sitting in shoestrings with nothing to
14 do here.

15 And how simple would it be, Chief, for
16 just to give a teletype on a Halloween blitz to
17 the aban officers who are just sitting there
18 doing nothing. They're sitting there watching
19 one of the companies tow these cars from Wayne
20 County Sheriffs under their direction.

21 I haven't seen a Wayne County Sheriff
22 around at any rate, they're just picking and
23 choosing and going. I haven't seen not one Wayne
24 County Sheriff with a tow truck as of yet ever.

25 I see a lot of tow trucks, same

1 company, a lot of cars. We're sitting there with
2 17 cars in our inventory, nothing happening. All
3 it takes is one little letter, teletype, to have
4 an aban blitz for the city of Detroit for the 27
5 Detroit Police Department tows. They're sitting
6 there with nothing to do.

7 So when we always did the Halloween
8 blitz, we did 2,700, 2,800, 2,900 cars in one
9 weekend and for Wayne County Sheriffs to take
10 these cars and not give any money to the City of
11 Detroit and it goes to one company, it's mind
12 boggling and it's unbelievable.

13 Reverend, wouldn't it be simpler to
14 just put a letter like you did before when we had
15 a meeting that you didn't like what was going on,
16 the Board had sent a letter to the Mayor, the
17 Chief to this, just to shop everything and to
18 disregard everything that was going on with the
19 City of Detroit until it goes past the Board,
20 that the Board has the right to approve it on.
21 That would stop this aban thing they're doing,
22 whatever they're doing, because they're bringing
23 cars there --

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Here's what
25 we'll do, Tom -- I'm sorry.

1 MR. ERRIGO: I'm Greg.

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry,
3 Greg. Here's what we'll do, and you know this.
4 We will do our due diligence, we'll check into it
5 and Deputy Chief, I mean they're going to work
6 with us. They will work with us, they always
7 do.

8 MR. ERRIGO: How could there be
9 meetings without the Board knowing?

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Wait a minute.
11 At the end of the day things always work out like
12 they're supposed to, I mean for real.

13 I think this Board has shown that we
14 will do that. So next week we'll report out what
15 the progress -- as a matter of fact I'm going to
16 go get some information right now so I have to
17 leave this meeting like literally right now at
18 this moment.

19 And we'll get some information and
20 we'll bring it back, but that change cannot
21 happen within this department without the Board
22 weighing in on it first, period, just can't
23 happen.

24 So, you know, that's just that and I
25 think you all know that this Board is resound and

1 resolute in matters in which we oversee, so it's
2 not going to happen.

3 MR. ERRIGO: If this happens in a
4 piecemeal way, it's very very disturbing, very
5 upsetting, very disrespectful.

6 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Right, yes,
7 sir.

8 MR. ERRIGO: To the Board, to us.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It will not
10 happen like that, I'm telling you.

11 MR. ERRIGO: It should not happen at
12 all, boss. It shouldn't happen at all, Reverend.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We got this.

14 MS. SMITH: I'll be very brief.
15 Bernice Smith, political activist. Good
16 afternoon.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.

18 MS. SMITH: Chief Lee, since you're a
19 substitute so far, I would like to know what are
20 you, or if it's in your realm, or the Board can
21 do in regards to this sudden expo that we're
22 going through now.

23 I'd like to know what the police is
24 drinking, if they having Kool-Aid or what is
25 going on? We go from one week to the another.

1 Now you have a commander -- and I know him. I
2 cannot believe this is going on.

3 You're help selling the newspaper here
4 in the Detroit area and it shouldn't be this way.
5 My suggestion -- and I'm very hard on this -- I
6 suggest that you investigate it thoroughly, no
7 cover-up, no blue cloud or whatever you call it.

8 I also make a suggestion if it's true
9 the way we have been hearing about it, I'm sure
10 the kids wouldn't tell a lie about it, but the
11 fact is I feel as though that the response should
12 be suspension for 60 days without pay, and if
13 necessary to treat -- and let everybody know
14 that's on the force we're not going to tolerate
15 it.

16 You can't continue to embarrass the
17 public and the -- Brown, don't even try it -- you
18 cannot continue to embarrass the public and the
19 police department.

20 So I want to know what you're going to
21 do about it and if necessary demote him to a
22 lieutenant or a sergeant. Come on, let's don't
23 let that go over and swept underneath the rug.

24 That's all I got to say.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Smith, let

1 me say this while you're still there. Here's
2 that the news media did not report.

3 That situation was investigated
4 thoroughly by this department, turned over to the
5 prosecutor. The prosecutor decided at the time
6 --

7 MS. SMITH: I know, I know.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- not to move
9 forward, and then eventually decided to do
10 something else. So the department did their due
11 diligence and so -- and unfortunately the media
12 does not bring that out because it's, you know --
13 let me just say this.

14 MS. SMITH: Well, they going to make it
15 look bad for you. I'm saying your job --

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Here's what I'm
17 saying.

18 MS. SMITH: Yours and Commissioners'
19 job, thoroughly.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Whether it's an
21 office setting in an office, whether it's a
22 church setting, whether it's a department as big
23 as this, you're always going to have --

24 MS. SMITH: Negative reporting, yes.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- issues

1 amongst employees over that. We're going to have
2 that.

3 MS. SMITH: Oh, come on.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Wait, wait,
5 wait, no, no, wait a minute.

6 MS. SMITH: It shouldn't be this way.
7 We got too much at stake.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We do, but let
9 me say this. When people go fishing, you'll find
10 something. If I go fishing in your past or your
11 current, I'll find something.

12 MS. SMITH: Yeah.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: If you come
14 fishing in my current or past you'll find
15 something, so all I'm saying is --

16 MS. SMITH: I hit a lady over the head,
17 yeah.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- all I'm
19 saying is is that the department is doing --

20 MS. SMITH: Ten years ago.

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All I'm saying
22 is that the department is doing its level best
23 that when these issues arise, they investigate
24 them quickly and swiftly, they really do.

25 MR. SMITH: So are you satisfied so far

1 with what's going on in the investigation?

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Oh, with the
3 investigation, absolutely.

4 MS. SMITH: Okay.

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: But it's like a
6 classroom of students.

7 MS. SMITH: I just get tired of hearing
8 things like this on the radio about the police
9 department, you understand, not only the paper,
10 it's on the radio all the time.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: But challenge
12 the media to report on the officers and the
13 department when they're going over and beyond the
14 call of duty which they do every day.

15 MS. SMITH: I understand that.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Challenge the
17 media to fish for those stories as well because
18 those stories are just as prevalent as the
19 stories that they're going to find under a rug
20 somewhere. That's all I'm saying.

21 But because it's our responsibility as
22 citizens to say okay, enough of that, tell me
23 about what the police is doing right because
24 here's what I'd say about this department.

25 With all of the challenges that they've

1 had, let's say in the last four or five years,
2 and we can even go back under previous
3 administration, the men and women of this
4 department are still standing, they're still
5 coming to work every day.

6 The report of absenteeism on this
7 department today is a heck of a lot lower than it
8 was in years past, even with all of the
9 challenges what they're going under right now.

10 And no reporter, no news agency, has
11 reported that. The men and women, even though
12 they might not like the 12-hour shifts. Maybe
13 they do, maybe they don't.

14 MS. SMITH: No, they don't.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Even though --
16 well, some do, some don't. Even though they
17 might not like the cuts in the benefits, they're
18 still showing up and doing their job and that's
19 what needs to be highlighted, that they're still
20 standing there, this is still a great department,
21 that it's still founded on the basis to protect
22 and serve the citizens of Detroit.

23 Even with reduced resources, they still
24 come and do the job. I was at the hospital
25 yesterday with the young boy who got shot in the

1 leg, little 4 year old. The police were there
2 doing their job and they were Johnny on the spot.

3 MS. SMITH: Well, they're right there
4 by the police station.

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: When the guy
6 got kidnapped -- I'm sorry, carjacked, when the
7 lady got carjacked and the guy was in the truck,
8 the guy on the news said it was a swift response.
9 That happens more often than not.

10 That's all I'm saying. You can find
11 anything. You come to my house, both of them,
12 and you'll find something.

13 MS. SMITH: Don't say that.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And you'll find
15 something.

16 MS. SMITH: Go home, go home.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I got to go.
18 Commissioner Taylor is going to take over.

19 (Commissioner Warfield leaves the
20 meeting.)

21 MS. SMITH: I thank you for your
22 response. It just hurts me because of the fact
23 that my involvement with the police department
24 has been so long and that's the only reason.
25 It's just like a mother coming to chastise the

1 child.

2 When you do wrong, I want to find out
3 if it's true or not, you know what I'm saying?
4 So I get tired of these newspaper and their
5 headlines talking about the police.

6 I talked with one today when I was
7 coming out of the lunch and I said, "How you
8 doing?" He said, "I'll be all right if I get my
9 time back and my money."

10 He's getting \$600 now. That's terrible
11 and he can't afford to take care of his family.
12 This is what I want to fight. I don't want to be
13 fighting what they're doing wrong to each other.
14 That's my main concern.

15 I want them to be gentlemen at all
16 times and ladies at all times. I profess this
17 and it disgusts me when I turn my radio on and
18 hear that program talking about the police
19 department.

20 I know they have to make a living, but
21 the fact is I just get tired of it and then I got
22 to do a -- repudiate the statements and come here
23 and tell you about it and then I can get the
24 truth from you and then I can report it back when
25 I go on the air.

1 So that's my only thing. I want to
2 find out the truth, so therefore I do admire the
3 police department. I have nothing against them,
4 but when they do wrong, I want to come and find
5 out if it is true, that's all, and stop selling
6 the newspapers all the time and this is what
7 we're doing.

8 I thank you so much for your time.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

10 MS. SEMMA: Julie Semma for 7-Ds
11 Towing. Past practice -- we've been towing for
12 23 years in the city of Detroit and past practice
13 around Angel's Night there's been an blitz
14 that's going on for the entire city of Detroit to
15 pick up abandoned cars and to protect the
16 citizens and the homes from being vandalized in
17 the city of Detroit.

18 And I understand earlier you said there
19 was nothing in place this year for the City of
20 Detroit towers and I can't fathom that none of
21 the towers would have anything in place right
22 now. It's a week away and not have anything
23 lined up for any towing being done in the city.

24 Is that correct what I heard from you
25 earlier?

1 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Deputy Chief Lee
2 through the Chair. I'm not aware of any
3 particular program. I've not received the
4 operational order which is probably on my desk
5 now of any program similar to the programs we've
6 had in the past where there was a just a massive
7 blitz of towing abandoned vehicles.

8 I'm not aware of that.

9 MS. SEMMA: Who would be in charge of
10 that?

11 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Nobody would be in
12 charge of it in particular. All of the
13 operational orders come out of the Tactical
14 Operations Unit and if that -- that wasn't part
15 of the program this year and it may be because of
16 the way the shifts are configured now and in the
17 past we had people in every district and people
18 assigned to an Abandoned Vehicle Task Force.

19 I'm not aware of an Abandoned Vehicle
20 Task Force for this year and I don't know if
21 there was one last year.

22 MS. SEMMA: There was one last year and
23 there has been for many years in the past that
24 we've currently towed so I'm just kind of shocked
25 to hear that nothing is going to happen this

1 year.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I'm not saying it's
3 not happening, but I'm not aware of it.

4 MS. SEMMA: Okay, thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any
6 more comments? Any more comments?

7 If not, meeting is adjourned. See you
8 next week.
