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CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good evening. Welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners' meeting. I'm Jessica Taylor, and this is Commissioner Donnell White, the vice chair. And representing the chief's office is no one right now, is there? Mr. Secretary, will you introduce the rest of the staff.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam Chair. For the record, George Anthony, secretary to the board. We have seated in the front Ms. Pamela Davis Drake who is our chief investigator. And Mr. Robert Brown, who is our office manager, and he's seated to the right. We have recording our proceedings Sergeant Allen Quinn, Officer Kent Cooper, and Ms. Trisha Cameron from Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes the introduction now.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, Secretary. Commissioner White, I'm going to ask you if you could lead us in prayer.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly.

(Invocation given)

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We won't be able to approve the agenda of the minutes because we don't have a quorum. So we're going to move to the next item. Is there a -- well, there's nobody representing the

1 chief's office so I guess they don't have a report. No
2 standing committee reports.

3 New business. On the new business, we have a
4 resolution for Retired Commander Dwayne Love, but we're
5 going to table that until next week until we have a
6 quorum so we can approve it.

7 Any old business? No.

8 Announcement. You know, we got -- our next
9 meeting will be December 12th.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam chair, if I could,
11 under old business --

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Old business. Okay.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- through the chair.

14 Mr. Secretary --

15 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- I know we were
17 working on the approval of our bylaws to be updated.

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And I know we had
20 referenced possibly a schedule so that the
21 commissioners could look at the schedule between now
22 and the end of the year. And so if we're not
23 available, that we might alter our meeting date to
24 accommodate us being able to move through that process
25 before year end.

1 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So I think to our
3 benefit, if we could get there before next meeting so
4 that we all could -- especially with the holiday season
5 so we all can be on one accord.

6 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you. And just to
7 let the board know, the schedule is generally prepared
8 a year out so we'll know exactly, and the board can
9 weigh in on it.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No. I'm sorry. The
11 schedule for us to deliberate over the bylaws.

12 SECRETARY ANTHONY: I'm sorry. In fact, the
13 last portion should be next week, I would think. I
14 think that's the last meeting before the year, if you
15 take a recess. The community meeting, I believe.

16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay.

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: And so there's only a few
18 things that really need to come before the board with
19 regards to changes. It wasn't as lengthy as Article 3,
20 and we can perhaps dispense with that next week, if
21 that's the board's pleasure.

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We can have a quorum
23 next week, and we may not have one until January after
24 next week.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: That's correct.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So it's the expectation
2 that we would deal with Articles 4 through -- is it 9
3 or --

4 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yeah. I think it's --

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: 11? Through 11?

6 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through 11, Article 11.

8 SECRETARY ANTHONY: And you can see that
9 they're really kind of minor changes or suggested
10 changes.

11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. I would like to
12 acknowledge --

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Commander Charles Wilson.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commander, not chief of
15 staff.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm still chief of staff,
17 but --

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commander Charles Wilson
19 from the chief's office. We skipped the report. Did
20 you want to give that now?

21 COMMANDER WILSON: We don't have a formal
22 report. But just briefly, I want to kind of give you
23 guys some information about an operation that we did
24 over in the King Homes. Tuesday we conducted an
25 operation we call Super Six that we named after one of

1 our fallen officers, Officer Anderson in narcotics. We
2 deemed it Super Six because his code name was Super and
3 he wore No. 6 in softball.

4 King Homes, as we all know, has been
5 notorious for open air crime, a lot of violence, drug
6 sales. So we went in there with our federal and local
7 counterparts. We had about 200 law enforcement
8 officials that conducted about 38 arrest warrants, 1
9 narcotics search warrant. We yielded about 42 arrests.
10 We made arrests for everything from felony warrants; to
11 weapon possession, not firearms, but knives; narcotics.
12 We also did an inspection on the liquor store across
13 the street from the King Homes, made four arrests
14 there. We cited the owner of that location for selling
15 drug paraphernalia. So all in all it was a very
16 successful operation. The community was very
17 enthusiastic to see us there.

18 And the Chief just wanted to let you know
19 that we will be doing one more operation before the
20 holiday season. I can't give too many more specifics
21 other than that, but there will be another operation.
22 We're just really trying -- those areas that we know
23 have been notorious historically for crime, we're
24 trying to address those.

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: What's the estimated

1 time that they get, some of those people? What's the
2 longest amount?

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, it depends,
4 Commissioner. Some of them -- we had at least one --
5 no. Two parole violators. So those would depend on
6 what was the length of their sentence. They would have
7 to do the remainder of those. So you're looking at
8 anywhere from a year to ten years depending on what the
9 crime was.

10 But even more than that, it's just the
11 officers' presence, being able to address it. And the
12 community is starting to feel that their complaints are
13 being heard. So that was one of the things that we
14 really wanted to just show, that we are listening, that
15 we're trying to bridge that gap.

16 Also, just year to date, I'll give you guys
17 the numbers relative to homicides and non-fatal
18 shootings. Homicides, year to date we're sitting at
19 311, which is down 51 from last year for a total of 14
20 percent decrease. As far as our non-fatal shootings,
21 year to date we're sitting at 1,101, which is down 77
22 for a 6.6 percent decrease. And overall violent crimes
23 is still down about 6 percent. So we're still meeting
24 our goal of about 5 percent reduction.

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Excellent. I think

1 going back to one of the things that I was impressed
2 with was the guy that you arrested said you was doing a
3 good job. So if the criminals think you're doing a
4 good job, you're doing a good job.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, ma'am. That would
6 conclude my report.

7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you.
8 Commissioner White, do you have anything else?

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No, ma'am.

10 SECRETARY ANTHONY: No.

11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Well, now,
12 the next meeting is Thursday, December 12th at 6:30.
13 It will be at the Second Precinct at Greenfield Plaza,
14 and that's at 15400 Grand River Avenue. That's the
15 Greenfield Plaza at 15400 Grand River Avenue. That
16 will be our next meeting, community.

17 At this time, we'd like to have oral
18 communications from the audience. And just please give
19 your name and limit your comments to two minutes.

20 MS. PANNELL: Good evening, Sharon Pannell.
21 Out of the 38 people that you arrested, how many going
22 -- is back on the street already?

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Actually, we did 38, 38
24 arrest warrants. We arrested 42. I don't know exactly
25 how many are out because some of them had misdemeanor

1 warrants, and they could have paid those warrants.

2 They may be out. I couldn't tell you that right now.

3 MS. PANNELL: So out of 42 arrests, probably
4 most of them are back on the street. So what was the
5 purpose of it?

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, it's not so much of
7 us trying to arrest our way out of it. Again, like I
8 say, it's the presence, putting them on notice. We can
9 only make the arrest. The courts handle whether or not
10 they're released or not. We have nothing to do with
11 that.

12 MS. PANNELL: So the system need to change
13 because they're probably all back on the street.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Ms. Pannell?
15 Ms. Pannell, that was an interesting question. That
16 was my point I was trying to make. But what I'm going
17 to ask him to do is give us, you know, a count to see
18 where these people are.

19 MS. PANNELL: Right. Right.

20 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: And when you know where
21 they are, then people watch on them. They're not going
22 to be running rampant out in the street.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: One of the things we did
24 yesterday, we had our neighborhood police officers out
25 there with our mobile mini station we have. So there's

1 going to be much followup. The system -- we only can
2 control our end from a law enforcement standpoint. The
3 court system has to work it out. If we can't hold
4 them, we can't hold them. If they pay their fine and
5 they get out, that's the system. But it's still being
6 that presence, letting them know that we're there and
7 that we're addressing it. It's better than doing
8 nothing. If we didn't do anything, then you'd be on
9 me.

10 MS. PANNELL: But you been on the east side.
11 When you coming to the west side?

12 COMMANDER WILSON: I told you next party --
13 just watch. Just watch the next party. Watch out.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: He said there would be a
15 party coming near you soon.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Soon.

17 MS. PANNELL: Good. I'm waiting on it.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you.

19 MR. LUND: Hello again. This is Dana Lund,
20 again.

21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, sir.

22 MR. LUND: I keep coming down here several
23 times. I know it's going to take me more than two
24 minutes. I just want to address this to you because I
25 knew that you all give Reverend Jim Holly more than two

1 minutes. And I would like to have more than two
2 minutes to explain this because I cannot understand why
3 is it that you guys keep sending me to deal with this
4 with the reserve. I got all my paperwork done. Then I
5 got this thing that I showed them that says to dismiss
6 -- to dismiss with prejudice. So I took it down there.
7 Then I had an officer call me today with a bad
8 attitude. He could have spoke to me with a better
9 attitude than that. But I don't have a problem with
10 it. I gave up on it. I'm trying to deal with you
11 guys.

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Sir. I'm sorry. I
13 don't even know what you're talking about.

14 MR. LUND: What's going on is every time I
15 try to help the City of Detroit, I keep getting more
16 pressure with trying to help the City of Detroit than
17 with a factor of trying to help the City of Detroit.
18 Why are you guys giving me a hard time more with
19 helping the City of Detroit than anything? The more I

20 try to help the City of Detroit, you give me a hard --

21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I understood what you
22 were saying. I just need to know what are you helping
23 the city with.

24 MR. LUND: With anything that's going on in
25 my neighborhood or on the east side of Detroit.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Well, just give me an
2 example of something.

3 MR. LUND: In my neighborhood, I call about
4 them speeding up and down the street. I try to let
5 them know the areas that they speed up and down. I let
6 them know where the guys hang out at the gas station.
7 I call them about the stores. I tell them about how
8 they strip the houses, where they're stripping the
9 houses. I give them comments on hey, we take pictures
10 of the license plates of the people stripping the
11 houses, get their faces and everything. Can you do
12 something about that?

13 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I'm going to let the --

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Sir, I apologize because
15 I'm unaware of exactly what's going on as well. But
16 after this meeting, if I could talk to you one on one.
17 I want to get the location of exactly what you're
18 talking about, who you dealt with. I'll put you in
19 contact with the right person. If we could right after
20 this meeting, I'll talk to you one on one.

21 MR. LUND: No disrespect. But this is the
22 thing about it. Excuse me for just one moment. This
23 is the thing about it now. I've done been through so
24 many things. Like 17 years ago, they called it that it
25 was domestic violence. The gun was drawn on me.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Let's deal with what
2 we're talking about now.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: The only thing I can
4 handle is what's apparent right now.

5 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: He's going to talk to
6 you. He's going to talk to you. You won't resolve it
7 here, but he's going to talk to you. And, also, you
8 can talk to our chief investigator, get your
9 information because I do followup, so that you don't
10 come and accuse us of doing this because I don't know
11 what you're talking about.

12 MR. LUND: I understand what you're saying.

13 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: But he will handle that,
14 and I think we got the point of it so --

15 MR. LUND: Okay. Because I had just -- just
16 real quick, down in Frank Murphy --

17 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: And I apologize for
18 anything --

19 MR. LUND: I always put my good eye out with
20 his name tag, and they still didn't do anything about
21 it.

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Well, they're going to
23 fix it now. We can't stay in the past. We're going to
24 move ahead. You've got the man sitting right here that
25 said he would talk to you.

1 MR. LUND: Every time they take me out in the
2 hallway, nothing has been done.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, this time there will
4 be. I'm the chief of staff. Chief Craig holds me
5 accountable for things just what you're speaking of.

6 MS. BERNICE SMITH: Give him a chance.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Exactly.

8 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Give him a chance to not
9 do anything again. Then you come back.

10 MR. LUND: I keep coming back.

11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: But you don't have to
12 come back because I'm sure --

13 MR. LUND: I don't have a problem with it.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You got the best in the
15 house.

16 MR. LUND: I'm not a person that gives up.

17 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Your two minutes is up.
18 So you talk to the chief, and you all set. Thanks a
19 lot, and I apologize to you if we did anything, you
20 know, because I'm just not aware of it and I apologize
21 for that.

22 MR. LUND: No problem.

23 MS. TACKER: Hello. My name is Latoya
24 Tacker. I'm here because I have a legal issue with my
25 property. I recently -- our house recently got

1 foreclosed on, and we didn't know anything about it.
2 We were buying it through a land contract. We were
3 paying and everything, and it got foreclosed on. And
4 they auctioned it off to someone recently, and this man
5 has been harassing us trying to illegally evict us.

6 Now, I went to the Michigan Legal Services
7 yesterday and talked to someone. Her name is Ms. Tonia
8 Phillips. And she told him that, you know, try to give
9 us enough time to evacuate our premises. She tried to
10 explain to him that there are legal procedures that he
11 had to follow. We had to go to 36th District Court and
12 everything like that. And he was hostile.

13 Every time we try to go to our house, he
14 calls the police on us. We explained that to our
15 attorney. And she called him up, let him know that
16 there was proper procedures. Did he want to give us 30
17 days, or did he want to take it to court. He told her
18 that he wanted to take it to court.

19 And we tried to go there yesterday. There
20 was about two, three cop cars waiting on us. Now --

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Waiting on you at the
22 residence?

23 MS. TACKER: Yes. To my understanding --
24 because he has a quick deed, to my understanding, these
25 are not -- he's not dialing 911. He is calling his

1 friends or his family because his parents -- I'm not
2 sure if that's his parents. They live across the
3 street from us. That's his parents. I think I've seen
4 him a few times.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Not to cut you off.
6 Through the chair --

7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Exactly.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: What are the officers
9 saying to you when they arrive? Are they restricting
10 your entry into the home, or are they just there?

11 MS. TACKER: They're trying to kick us out.
12 They're saying that he has a deed, and he's legally
13 bound to kick us out whenever he wants to. I told them
14 they're wrong.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Right.

16 MS. TACKER: You know, you can call my
17 attorney, or I could call my attorney and you can speak
18 to them. He tried to cuss me out. I wish I would have
19 got his badge number. I asked for his badge number and
20 his partner's badge number. They tried to force their
21 way into my house while I was there. I told them well,
22 if you don't have a warrant, if you don't have any
23 court orders, you can't come in my house.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. So you're in the
25 process of moving, though?

1 MS. TACKER: We're in the process of moving,
2 but he's not giving us a chance. And every time we go,
3 he calls the police, and he makes it a very difficult
4 situation.

5 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: So you're actually
6 asking for help with him harassing you until you move.
7 How much time do you have left?

8 MS. TACKER: We never -- we haven't went to
9 court. Our --

10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: So there's been no
11 proceedings you said?

12 MS. TACKER: The police tried to tell -- I'm
13 not sure who he is. But he tried to tell me yesterday
14 that he could go downtown, and by the end of the
15 business day, he could have a paper to have us put out
16 that day. I told them hey, he tried to force his way
17 into our house, tried to say he was trying to help us
18 out, help me out by telling me information.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I think we understand.
20 That's a terrible situation you in. But we're going to
21 have you talk to our chief investigator also and I'm
22 sure the chief.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah. I'll speak with you
24 as well.

25 MS. TACKER: He harasses my fiance. He calls

1 him on the phone talking about he's going to change our
2 locks. And if we take anything out of our house, that
3 he was going to --

4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You got us. We're
5 convinced.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: You can talk to our chief
7 investigator. And my captain, Captain Roche, once you
8 finish talking to her, I will have him get the
9 information because it's a civil matter. It's really
10 not a law enforcement. So they shouldn't be giving you
11 any kind of legal advice.

12 MS. TACKER: He calls his people and their
13 police officers, and they come in the uniforms in the
14 police car --

15 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We'll get it taken care
16 of.

17 MS. TACKER: -- trying to harass us.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: What's your first name
19 again?

20 MS. TACKER: Latoya Tacker.

21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Is there anymore
22 comments? Could you guys move a little bit.

23 MR. SCOTT: Ron Scott. I asked them to come
24 because I wanted to make this clear because I don't
25 think it came across on the record that the individuals

1 in question in relationship to this house, one of them
2 said or in effect attempted to validate for the young
3 man that he was a police officer and that in his
4 position as a police officer he was using that under
5 color of law to threaten them. That is important on
6 the salient matter, not the civil action. But if in
7 effect he violates his oath of office and utilized that
8 to intimidate them, that's what needs to be --

9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Do you know the officer?

10 MR. SCOTT: The young man in the Lions --

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I think we picked up on
12 that, Mr. Scott. And I think that's why Chief
13 Investigator Drake is going to investigate that issue.
14 We will look into any officers that might have been
15 present. And they'll go into the entire Garrity
16 process and the like to see if any violation of the
17 employee handbook has taken place.

18 MR. SCOTT: I didn't hear it clearly, but I'm
19 glad you did in relationship to that. And I don't know
20 -- just -- and I conclude with this. I just wonder in
21 terms of training how much is done in relationship to
22 the clarification for officers, the line between civil
23 and criminal matters in relationship to these issues,
24 and especially like what you're doing with the
25 operations, you know, those kinds of things, to access

1 to homes and individuals and so forth. In the manual
2 and the course, how is that discerned or disseminated?

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Each one of our officers
4 have to go through a 40-hour training block once a
5 year. So law enforcement is one of the training blocks
6 within that 40 hours, and then we have legal advisor
7 updates that are constantly given out. They have to
8 sign for those, and we keep a record of that. So any
9 time there's a change in the law, civil, criminal, we
10 receive updates on that. So all of our officers are --
11 are as abreast as possible on any new laws, any new
12 issues, things like that.

13 MR. SCOTT: Okay. Yeah. Thank you very
14 much.

15 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Ron, do they have
16 housing? Do they have anywhere to go after they --

17 MR. SCOTT: At this particular point, as I
18 understand it, they have not gotten a place. They said
19 they were willing to go to someplace. And I know with
20 the housing coalition they can get referrals. But if
21 you have any referrals, I'm sure they would --

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Contact Brian.

23 MR. SCOTT: Okay.

24 MS. ROMANO: Good afternoon. Ann Romano.

25 Traffic enforcement on the direction of Commander

1 Barron in the area of Schoenherr between Eight Mile and
2 Six Mile. A lot of our parishioners that go to church
3 on Gratiot and Six Mile travel that area daily. That's
4 been a problematic area. There was a boys and girls
5 club there, a school, and a couple blocks away another
6 elementary school. I think it's Tacoma. There's a
7 party store, and right across there's some vacant
8 buildings. And there's been a lot of activity, people
9 standing there, vehicles pulling up and stopping
10 traffic. And a lot of those parishioners are elderly
11 coming to prayer service at the church. So on Monday
12 they were so happy to see the traffic enforcement unit
13 out there in full force taking care of the area. And
14 ever since Monday it has been quiet, and they're very
15 appreciative. And they just wanted me to say thank you
16 to the officers and to the Detroit Police Department
17 for taking care of that matter in that area.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Nice.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you. I appreciate
20 that.

21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Police presence
22 definitely makes a difference. Are there anymore
23 communications?

24 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice Smith,
25 political activist. I want to give kudos, Chief,

1 Commander, to the police. I did it to him this morning
2 because he was on our program this morning. But
3 anyway, I feel as though we're working up in a
4 direction where people are going to start having faith
5 in the police department again.

6 And the fact that he calls it a party, I
7 thought that was really out of the ordinary. But we
8 laughed about that. He said you haven't seen anything
9 yet. Wait until the results of it. So we're going to
10 go in another area next week, which I'm not going to
11 say where it is. But anyway, we will be going in the
12 city and we will take care -- we will take care of all
13 the crime which is my aim.

14 That's the only reason why -- well, not the
15 only reason. But the reason why I'm interested in
16 being a police commissioner. I want this city to be
17 clean, and I want the police to be clean. I don't want
18 them to harass the citizens. We will not tolerate
19 that.

20 And I'm sure you -- Commander Wilson, your
21 daddy was the best. He didn't tolerate it, and I'm
22 sure it's going to work down into your favor also.

23 So I, again, congratulate the police
24 department on what they did. Of course, I know it was
25 a combined effort with the FBI and the other officers.

1 So we can't complain about it if we see them on the
2 street again because a lot of times the courts don't do
3 their due diligence.

4 So we just have to bear along with what's
5 going on, and we will be behind you all the way as far
6 as these raids are concerned because Martin Luther King
7 desperately needed it over there because, if you
8 remember, when we were downtown the lady came and she
9 spoke to us. She was the wife of one of her -- she was
10 a tenant in there, and she told us about her husband
11 getting killed and so forth. That's the first thing I
12 thought about when I heard about the raid.

13 So maybe we will clean it up. Matter of
14 fact, we will clean it up. Forget about maybe. And we
15 will do the best we can. And I'm sure that the police
16 department is going to be working with the citizens,
17 and they're going to have a lot of faith in it.

18 We have so much that's going on now with the
19 EM. So at least this is something that will be a
20 pleasure for us to look forward to, you know. At least
21 crime will be handled in a way where we will have
22 competence in the police department again.

23 I congratulate you to the highest. And we
24 will talk about you forever and ever as long as you
25 keep going to the various neighborhoods and cleaning it

1 up. We want the people to see you coming.

2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You going to tell us
3 where it is in a minute?

4 COMMANDER WILSON: I hope not.

5 MS. SMITH: I told the chief just do it. I
6 thank you so much.

7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Are there
8 anymore communications? Anymore communications? I
9 move to adjourn.
