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6 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We'll call the meeting
7 to order at 3 -- 3:02, I think it is.

8 I'm Commissioner Jessica Taylor and I'm
9 going to ask the Board Secretary to introduce the, I
10 mean to call the roll.

11 COMMISSIONER/SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
12 Madam Chair.

13 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary
14 to the Board.

15 Commissioner Donnell R. White.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON WHITE: Present.

13 COMMISSIONER/SECRETARY ANTHONY: And Madam
14 Chair, it looks like Commissioner Wendell Byrd has
15 arrived.

16 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Present.

17 You have a quorum with all nine
18 commissioners present.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay, and
20 Mr. Secretary, can you introduce the rest of the
21 staff, please.

22 COMMISSIONER/SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
23 Madam Chair.

24 From the staff, we have Ms. Aliyah Sabree,
25 our attorney to the Board seated in the front. Next

1 to her is Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake, our Chief
2 Investigator from the Office of the Chief
3 Investigator.

4 Mr. Robert Brown, our officer manager is
5 seated to my right, Sergeant Allen Quinn is recording
6 our proceedings, and Karen Klerekoper is from Hanson
7 Court Reporting Services.

8 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I'm going to ask
9 Pastor Darren Spencer, if he would come and give us a
10 word of prayer, please.

11 (Word of prayer)

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I would like to
13 entertain a motion to approve the agenda for today,
14 Thursday, March 20th, 2014.

15 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: So moved.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second Bell.

17 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and
18 seconded.

19 Are there any discussion?

20 (No verbal response)

21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All in favor?

22 (Chorus of "ayes")

23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed.

24 (No verbal response)

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: The agenda stands

1 approved.

2 There is no minutes for March 13th, so we
3 don't have to do that.

4 And I'm going to move to the Secretary's
5 report.

6 COMMISSIONER/SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
7 Madam Chair.

8 This is the Secretary's report of citizen
9 complaints that were received in February 2014.

10 The 2014 monthly count of complaints in
11 February were 97, when compared to the same period
12 last year of 82, it would represent an 18 percent
13 increase.

14 The year to date for 2014 is listed at 205,
15 compared to last year of 172, represents a 19 percent
16 increase.

17 At the end of February, 2014, the office of
18 the chief investigator had open investigations 251,
19 cases filed 205, cases closed 228.

20 Of the 97 cases filed, 38 percent involved
21 unknown officers. The alleged known units involved
22 leading in complaints filed in February 2014 were the
23 8th Precinct at 9 percent, the Eastern District at 7
24 percent, the 12th Precinct, Northeastern District and
25 Telephone Crime Reporting Unit at 6 percent.

1 The 97 cases filed in February 2014
2 involved 172 allegations where the leading areas of
3 concern were, procedure at 33 percent, demeanor at 24
4 percent, service at 16 percent, and force at 10
5 percent. And that concludes the citizen complaint
6 report.

7 Generally I prepare a report for the
8 unknown officers, I'll have that for you next week.

9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioners, do you
10 have any questions?

11 (No verbal response)

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: If not, then we will
13 move to the Chief's presentation or report, the
14 Chief's Neighborhood Liaison.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Yes, Commander
16 Charles Wilson will be doing the presentation this
17 afternoon.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Good afternoon,
19 Honorable Board.

20 (Chorus of "good afternoon")

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Through the Chair, I'm
22 Commander Charles Wilson, I'm the commanding officer
23 of the Chief Neighborhood Liaison, as well as I have
24 public information under my purview. I'm a direct
25 report to Co-Assistant Chief LaShinda Houser.

1 I'm going to bring forward my support staff
2 to take care of the presentation. Currently, I have
3 three sergeants assigned to me, Sergeant Daran Carey,
4 Sergeant Wendie Collier, who will be doing the
5 presentation, and Sergeant Curtis Perry.

6 I know you guys are probably wondering
7 where Lieutenant Hope, now newly promoted, she's the
8 captain over at the 7th precinct, so she has moved on
9 from the Chief Neighborhood Liaison office.

10 But without further ado, Sergeant Collier.

11 SERGEANT COLLIER: Good afternoon,
12 Honorable Board. Once again, I'm Sergeant Collier,
13 Chief's Neighborhood Liaison Office, I'll be doing the
14 presentation for our unit.

15 The Chief Neighborhood Liaison office, as
16 Commander Wilson stated, we had a change recently,
17 Commander Wilson was in charge and he's over our city
18 camp and our LGBT group.

19 We also have three sergeants, Sergeant
20 Daran Carey, myself, and Sergeant Curtis Perry, and as
21 you can see, we are over those individual entities
22 within our unit.

23 Here we have a list of our missions and
24 goals, to develop and maintain the communication
25 between the community and the police department, also

1 to offer crime prevention and education and assistance
2 to the residents, partner with our groups and
3 businesses to develop, implement crime reduction
4 strategies, and to also offer education and programs
5 for you.

6 Here we have a list of the different
7 entities within our unit, the PAL, Mouny is no longer
8 under us, be we do have reserve corps under us,
9 chaplains, traffic safety unit, our workstations,
10 which once were our mini stations, now they have been
11 transferred to workstations. We have the police
12 cadets, our explorers and our CB patrol.

13 Here we list a few new initiatives that we
14 have. The first one is the CITI CAMP, basically a
15 program that we're working on with I believe is Cody
16 High School and Henderson Elementary. Basically a
17 program that we are focusing on students that have
18 been identified with certain issues, so we try to
19 bring them in to teach them leadership, and different
20 other things we have listed there, restorative
21 practices, physical training, discipline.

22 We also have the NPO program, and that was
23 recently brought forth in the news. I don't know if
24 you saw the news piece on that, but that's a program
25 that the Chief has implemented within our department,

1 so we have officers that have been assigned to certain
2 sections in the precincts as mini chiefs, and they're
3 in place to try to engage with the community to work
4 with the youth, businesses, gas stations and community
5 groups to try to come together and combat crime in the
6 neighborhood, and also to do events and different
7 things of that nature.

8 And here is another list of new initiatives
9 that we have, we have SALT, which is explained there,
10 and we also have the LGBT.

11 New advisory boards that we have in place
12 are the chief's advisory board, the chief's clergy and
13 the chief's youth advisory.

14 And here we have a list of different
15 academies and projects that are ongoing within the
16 department.

17 Here is just a list of a summary of
18 everything that we have going on.

19 Is there any questions from the Board?

20 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Board, do we have any
21 questions?

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I do, Madam Chair.

23 You had mentioned workstations, what's the
24 difference between a workstation and a mini station?

25 SERGEANT COLLIER: A mini station -- well,

1 the workstation is also like a place where the NPOs
2 can come and they can work, they can use the place to
3 come and do their paperwork, or whatnot, I'll let the
4 Commander...

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Again, Commander Charles
6 Wilson.

7 The biggest difference is the mini stations
8 we were staffed specific hours, but we really wanted
9 the NPOs not to be stationed there, we wanted them to
10 be out in the community, so we turned it to
11 workstations where you can come in, take a report but
12 they will not be manned or staffed during a certain
13 time period, they will be more for them to come in,
14 take reports, or if they're doing a community meeting.
15 Most of the workstations are within the rec centers,
16 they'll come in and do a community meeting, something
17 like that, but we really wanted to push the NPOs out
18 in the neighborhood as opposed to doing stationary.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Any more questions?

21 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Are mini chiefs
22 assigned to a specific area?

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, each precinct is
24 divided into three of four areas, we are total of 38,
25 and we'll make sure once we have the maps finalized,

1 that this Board has the maps of each individual NPO,
2 but they pretty much sectored them into three or four
3 areas, and we gave them a geographic area, which is no
4 more than a two- or three-squad car area, just to make
5 sure that they were staffed.

6 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: How will the citizens
7 in the area know who their mini chief is?

8 COMMANDER WILSON: What we have is, we have
9 a graphic coming through, we'll be giving them cell
10 phones, as well as tablets to each individual NPO
11 officer, and that NPO officer is going to make sure
12 that they bring the community together and give that
13 number out.

14 We actually have some of the NPOs that have
15 developed fliers, they're going door to door
16 introducing themselves to the community that they
17 service, so they are already out there doing it.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Is that all the
19 questions?

20 Well, I have one, I just wanted to know
21 because, Officer Hope, Lieutenant Hope.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, ma'am.

23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You were going to talk
24 with her and, like, form a partnership where the
25 Commissioners would work with them to be informed

1 about what's going in the community, so how do we do
2 that now?

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Wendie Collier, she will
4 be her liaison for that and you can work directly with
5 her.

6 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right, thank you.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any more questions?

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I one
10 question, I think, for the Sergeant.

11 What's the process of handling minor
12 neighborhood disputes, over-the-yard noise complaints,
13 you know, we used to try to mediate, is that something
14 that falls in your area?

15 SERGEANT COLLIER: Well, we still have that
16 process in place. The NPO officer will contact them,
17 or I can contact them for you, and they come out, try
18 to bring them together and work on the issues at hand.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: If I can add to that,
20 we are working with the Chief, we haven't put anything
21 in place yet but we're talking about mediation
22 centers, community mediation centers, so that will be
23 something that's coming in the future.

24 SERGEANT COLLIER: Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any more questions?

2 Okay. If not, thank you.

3 Let's move to our standing committee

4 reports, are there any committee reports?

5 Are there any new business to come before

6 the meeting?

7 Old business? Are there any old business?

8 Okay, if not, our next meeting is Thursday,

9 March 27th, 2014, at 3:00, here at the headquarters.

10 Next we'll have oral communications from

11 the audience.

12 Please give your name and limit your

13 comments to two minutes.

14 Are there any comments?

15 MR. CARTER: Good afternoon.

16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon.

17 MR. CARTER: Hi, I'm Tyrone Carter, the

18 president of the Original United Citizens Southwest

19 Detroit.

20 I think I appeared before this Board two

21 weeks ago about the Marathon incident and the lack of

22 an emergency plan.

23 Well, to kind of illustrate why there's a

24 need for a plan: Yesterday, I-75 was shut down, and

25 if you're familiar with the area, the Jefferson Street

1 Bridge is up and the Fort Street Bridge is up.

2 There was a train wreck behind Marathon for
3 the detour. It took people two and a half hours to
4 get there. This is a public safety issue. 48217 is
5 cut off from the rest of the city.

6 Now, I did get a phone call, too, maybe a
7 week ago from Ms. Brenda Ice, who used to work with
8 Homeland Security, now she's back contractually. And
9 I got the same run-around, I'm going to be honest with
10 you.

11 As a retired lieutenant and a person that
12 lives in a community with mostly seniors, it's kind of
13 insulting to me when you keep saying, go to your
14 website when half of my people don't have cable or
15 Internet.

16 The city does a great job when they want to
17 get in touch with people, they can print these
18 pamphlets and door to door them. If it's that
19 unreasonable, then give them to me and I'll do it.

20 We have a community meeting tonight, and
21 you know, I pulled my notes up, June 10th, I appeared
22 before Detroit City Council to discuss Petcoke storage
23 and the fire at Marathon June 10th of last year,
24 there's still nothing done this year. This is not
25 acceptable.

1 No other community would tolerate this, and
2 I say that because we have the only oil refinery in
3 the State of Michigan in our city. I guarantee you
4 there's an evacuation plan for the Fermi plant down in
5 Monroe. We have to do better, we deserve better in
6 that community and the city as a whole.

7 I hate to say this, I guarantee you this
8 wouldn't happen in Rosedale-Grandmont, and some other
9 areas, thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you.

11 Are there anymore comments?

12 Yes, ma'am, come on up.

13 MS. DOWDELL: Hello, my name is Cherlyn
14 DowDell.

15 I have a son that was murdered in June 22nd
16 of 2013.

17 There is a detective named Kevin Wright,
18 he's assigned on this case.

19 What I don't appreciate what Detective
20 White is doing to me, put it like that, I called him
21 with the information about there's someone has
22 information concerning my son's murderer, would you
23 talk to him?

24 So I had went on the cell phone and went on
25 the house phone, so I told Detective White that this

1 person is going to be calling you right now.

2 He said okay, but when he called him, he
3 wouldn't answer, he didn't answer.

4 I called him, he didn't answer.

5 We did -- the following day, he didn't
6 answer, so I'm just wondering what can I do, you know,
7 with the detective?

8 If he don't want to investigate or do his
9 job, maybe they can give it to someone else.

10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay, well, let me
11 turn that over to Chief Houser.

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Yes, ma'am,
13 through the Chair, I'm going to ask that Sergeant Ryan
14 Harris to come up and take some information down, and
15 then if she could stand by, then I'll follow up right
16 after the meeting with Deputy Chief LaValley in
17 regards to this matter.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay, thank you,
19 ma'am. Are you going to see him again?

20 MR. RHOADES: Good afternoon.

21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon.

22 MR. RHOADES: My name is Peter Rhoades,
23 R-h-o-a-d-e-s, I'm a resident of Detroit.

24 I've been before the Board on several
25 occasions, and it's just a small problem with business

1 license enforcement. I did get an update from
2 Attorney Sabree, I want to thank you very much for the
3 update, the law department is still working at it, as
4 soon as possible.

5 So let me give you just a story to give you
6 a little background, what I think this is important.
7 Years ago Immigration Enforcement did a big raid on a
8 chicken process plant. Around the plant there were
9 hundreds of officers, they stormed the plant, they
10 hold everybody, they go through all the paperwork and
11 they arrest two or three people because they were
12 undocumented aliens.

13 The entire community is an uproar there,
14 there's a massive use of manpower, and all they wanted
15 to do was get the business to comply with the law and
16 say, only hire documented workers.

17 Later, the same problem, they hired one
18 employee, and he had a computer. He went down the
19 list of employees' Social Security numbers and a list
20 of all the, and he found out which ones were bad
21 Social Security numbers, notified the employer, within
22 a week all of those employees that he had bad Social
23 Security numbers and maybe undocumented, they no
24 longer work at the plant. There was one employee with
25 a computer, and not only did he take care of that one

1 plant, he took care of every plant in the state, so
2 all of the chicken processing plants were treated
3 equal.

4 So when we have this matter coming up
5 eventually, do the right thing. Instead of hammering
6 businesses to try to get compliance by giving tickets
7 to individual employees to a criminal prosecution,
8 just use the building safety engineering department
9 show cause hearing procedure and one person with one
10 computer can go down, just down goes the list and make
11 sure every business in that category complies with the
12 law and gets the business license.

13 It's been done successfully, it can be done
14 successfully before, but when I, as a citizen, a
15 resident, hear that we're still giving out tickets,
16 that's why I'm here, thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

18 Are there any other comments?

19 MS. SMITH: Got the computer up here.

20 Good afternoon, Bernice Smith, Human Rights
21 Commission.

22 I just want to express my opinion about
23 Monday at the City-County Building, it was just
24 wonderful. Those that did not see the Chief and all
25 the officers that was present, it was just a wonderful

1 sight. I was at home watching it on television
2 because I wasn't able to get down, and you know
3 parking is a mess down there, anyway.

4 But seeing all the police officers and the
5 expression that was on their face, I mean, it was just
6 wonderful, because of the fact that there is a new day
7 here in the City of Detroit, and we have a police
8 chief that's head of it, and he's going to do a
9 marvelous job for the citizens here in Detroit, and
10 I'm sorry, I didn't even speak, good afternoon.

11 And I just had to come today and let you
12 know that I'm very proud.

13 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Can you state your
14 name for the record?

15 MS. SMITH: Yes, I did, at the beginning, I
16 did do, I know Brown is sitting over there.

17 But anyway, it was just wonderful, and I
18 just had to come and tell you about it, I don't know,
19 most of you probably was at work and didn't see it,
20 but I was able to see it, and they just took up the
21 whole center of the auditorium, and they did take
22 pictures of them, and they had the Chief to come up
23 and sit next to the council people.

24 So I just want to let you know, we have
25 someone to be proud of, not only the officers, we have

1 a chief who is a good leader and I think morale has
2 really come up more so than what it has been, and I do
3 hope the Board keeps him, I think the mayor, I think
4 he will be in favor of keeping him. And we don't keep
5 going through the ranks of getting different police
6 chiefs all the time.

7 I subscribe to the Defender there in
8 Chicago, because I'm a former Chicagoan, and I brought
9 the paper for the Chief to see.

10 On the headlines it had the new chief of
11 Chicago, I said to myself, I'm going to let the Chief
12 see what he's doing, and he is Caucasian, but the fact
13 is, they are having more problems than we have over
14 here. They have a gang situation over there, so it's
15 just wonderful to know that we are talking care of our
16 troubles over here and we don't have all the troubles
17 that Chicago has, because they do have plenty, and I'm
18 telling you, they can't get it under control nowadays.
19 I understand through friends they tell me the police
20 let them do the shooting and then they will come
21 afterwards, so in this respect, our police officers
22 are in certain areas, they got them numbered in the
23 cars, and they're are going to be right on on time,
24 just like what happened the other day, you have
25 several incidents, the man and his son that jumped on

1 the 42-year-old man, what happened, within hours that
2 there were caught.

3 Also the hijackers of the man, they got,
4 well, I'm not saying Good Lord, he knows best, but one
5 got killed and the other one is seriously injured. So
6 we can't continue to let these crooks do what they
7 want to do in our city and not have anything to be
8 done about it.

9 So again, I thank you for listening to me,
10 and also, one little tidbit, you know, you're in a
11 situation just like the City Council, if you do
12 anything, they are going to put it on the headlines,
13 all right, so I'm just telling you that advice,
14 because I've seen it happen at the City Council, as
15 you might know, they wasn't after George this time but
16 they were waiting for him, but I want you guys to
17 know, please be careful whatever you do in the public
18 and not give them anything to talk about, because this
19 is a good board, I approve of it, even though I'm not
20 on it, but I approve of it. But the fact is, you got
21 to be careful on what you're doing, because they want
22 anything to put you in the spotlight, and I don't want
23 none of you to be in the spotlight because I care too
24 much for you.

25 I thank you so much for your time.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, ma'am.

2 MS. SMITH: Take care.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: When I came on this
4 Board, and I intend to be involved more, about the
5 integrity of the Board in confidence that the
6 community has in this board.

7 I'm very family and reading all the
8 information as to what has occurred, even in the
9 e-mails that were sent, people claim they didn't know,
10 they didn't have knowledge of the department policy.
11 But back in January, we all were issued a copy of the
12 DPD manual, and that was through Ricardo Moore's
13 e-mailing and my requesting of the Board Secretary.
14 In all instances, the manual, for the DPD, this is the
15 policy.

16 I know some there's people said they should
17 have known, they didn't know. I always say, you
18 should have know in this policy.

19 For those who don't know, let me just, a
20 few things I pulled from the policy dealing with that
21 is applicable to that issue with the department
22 vehicles.

23 It's a directive, it was effective
24 4-1-2010, and for those who aren't familiar with it,
25 they can write this down and research it if they like,

1 303.1-1, 303.1-2.1, 303.1-3, 303.1-4, 303.1-4.1, and
2 303.1-5.

3 It's absolutely correct, it would be
4 hypocrisy in front of the police officer who may want
5 to appeal discipline, we're sitting on the Board and
6 we have to sit in judgment of them.

7 When I talk to parties involved at the
8 scene and everything has been resolved, and for the
9 sake of reconciliation they said they would reconcile,
10 I certainly hope they would reconcile with the Chief,
11 I mean, because the e-mails I saw, I mean, and I read
12 back and forth, was like some skit from an old sitcom
13 Sanford and Son, I'm serious.

14 MS. SMITH: I don't blame you.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: This ignorance of
16 not having knowledge, policy, read the City Charter,
17 that's what this commission is supposed to be about,
18 one of the issues is, with policy of the police
19 department.

20 So I just want to say that, you know, I
21 certainly hope, and all the rest of the board members
22 we can move forward, but if something like this
23 happens again, I personally will call for some
24 sanctions against everyone involved and everybody
25 involved in this is to have some sort of culpability

1 anyway.

2 MS. SMITH: That's fair. There is so much
3 going in politics here in the city, we all know, we
4 went through a tiring, what, five years ago, so we
5 don't need to go through it no more, because we sit
6 and waiting to see what the next step we're going to
7 do, so this is good board.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: We shouldn't been
9 engaged in the politics or the politricks.

10 MS. SMITH: That's true.

11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Let me just comment on
12 that, you're absolutely right, Commissioner, but the
13 Chief and I was never out of sync. I was talking with
14 the Chief all along, as a matter of fact, the Chief
15 was the last person I talked to and he had, you know,
16 that was before this policy thing came up, and I'm
17 sure, Cecilia, if you want to comment on that policy,
18 or anything, but the Chief and I was always in sync.

19 The sad thing, is that I had to find out
20 from the media, if George Hunter hadn't called me, I'd
21 still being driving a car and don't know anything
22 about I'm not supposed to be driving it now.

23 I know you say I should know, and maybe I
24 should, but the fact still remained that I didn't.

25 So, we have reconciled, it was never

1 anything that was really out of sync. The e-mails
2 were just answering e-mails, but I have talked to the
3 Chief, the Chief and I was communicating when George
4 called, George Hunter called me, I immediately called
5 the Chief and we communicated throughout that process,
6 so that was never anything between the Chief or this
7 Board. The Chief was in tune with everything and the
8 Chief and I relationship is good, it always has been
9 and always will be.

10 There is nothing about that, that little
11 incident that happened, I talked to George and George
12 and I agreed that we should have been talking, but I
13 didn't know anything to talk about.

14 Like I said, I learned it from the media
15 and I hope that would not happen again.

16 MS. SMITH: That was the reason why I said,
17 you got to be careful because they watching you guys,
18 just like they doing the City Council.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I know that for a
20 fact.

21 MS. SMITH: Whatever you do, I know it's
22 been an uproar, you know, I'm not worried about it.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair,
24 with all due respect, we talk about policy, policy,
25 policy. The issue is ethics here and to be above, for

1 me, to ask for any police resources, a car anything,
2 would be unethical, for me to sit here in a position
3 that I was elected to represent the people and we are
4 talking about leadership here, to ask for anything
5 like that, and no disrespect to anyone here.

6 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: That may be true, sir,
7 but when you think that I was told that the Chair had
8 a car, I never asked for a car from this Board even
9 when they said that. I don't think that should be an
10 issue, that was a mistake on my part maybe in asking
11 for a car, but when you don't have the knowledge, I
12 know you being a police officer, a police officer, or
13 still police officer may know these things, but that
14 doesn't mean everybody knows these things, and I
15 certain would not do anything unethical, never have,
16 never will, my reputation stands on it own. I don't
17 have to sit here and defend my reputation, because it
18 does not need any defending.

19 As you said in the e-mail, I would not
20 speak on this matter again because there is nothing to
21 speak on.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON WHITE: Just as a point of
23 order, we are currently on the agenda under
24 announcements and public comments, communications from
25 the audience, so I would move that if this matter

1 needs further discussions as it relates to policy or
2 Commissioners' understanding, or lack thereof, that we
3 place it on the agenda for further discussion.

4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I agree with that.
5 Okay.

6 Mr. Welborne?

7 MR. WELBORNE: Bill Welborne,
8 W-e-l-b-o-r-n-e. I'm president of the Detroit City
9 Wide Police Public Relations.
10 I'll going to bring some good news for a
11 change, Monday, Burgess Smith had a thing for
12 Olympics, running, Lauren Williams, which I thought
13 was great, and, I was talking to him later on, and
14 her, and he's going to try to have another one later
15 on, and myself, I like to see more people there, you
16 know, when I was in Europe, and when English people
17 want something, they come out by the thousands, they
18 support their people, we don't.

19 We don't support our athletes at all,
20 especially when something she did. Now she won a
21 silver medal in the 100-meter dash, a gold medal in
22 the 400-meter relay, and come to the Olympics, and
23 they lose, won a silver medal, that's outstanding, you
24 know, for somebody to make it like that.

25 You know, I ran track, I wasn't, I wasn't

1 quite good enough to make the Olympics, I was pretty
2 decent, but I couldn't make it, I wasn't quite good
3 enough. For somebody to get out from and go to the
4 Olympics and win a medal, that's great.

5 And I think we should next time we come out
6 and support her, she's going to move back to the City
7 of Detroit. She said she wants to move back to
8 Detroit so she can help Detroit become a better city.

9 And Dr. Womack is a good friend of hers,
10 like a Godfather of hers, and I think she's going to
11 work through him to become a, find a job, or something
12 like that, so just want to let the panel know about
13 that, I thought that was great, that she came back to
14 the Detroit.

15 She's a young lady and she's got a lot to
16 offer, we need more young people to come back to
17 Detroit.

18 Me, I'm on my way out, I'm in bad shape.

19 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Meeting tonight.

20 MR. WELBORNE: We have City Wide meeting
21 tonight, but I'm going to worry about the City Wide
22 meeting tonight, I got a meeting coming up, I'd like
23 everybody to come to, I got a special speaker that is
24 coming to this meeting, I'm going to let everybody
25 know, in September, I hope to have a awards dinner, a

1 sit-down awards dinner, and I hope to have the
2 Attorney General from Washington come to being guest
3 speaker. I have written a letter already. He hasn't
4 responded to me yet. If he don't send a letter pretty
5 soon, I'm going to send another letter because I want
6 him to come down.

7 It will be a big thing. My term is up in
8 December, I want to get him to come down be a speaker.
9 Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you,
11 Mr. Welborne.

12 MR. BASHAUNT: Good afternoon, Board.

13 (Chorus of "good afternoon")

14 MR. BASHAUNT: Nicholas Bashaunt
15 (phonetic).

16 I just want to let the Board know that the
17 committee, Public Health & Safety Committee is having
18 a towing discussion on Monday at 10:00 regarding what
19 has been going on regarding towing in the City of
20 Detroit, municipal parking, the police, and what you
21 have authority over, so I encourage you to appear.

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON WHITE: Through the Chair,
24 I do believe that is an important discussion that will
25 take place on Monday. I just wanted to check through

1 the Chair, with Secretary Anthony, do we have anyone
2 who's likely to participate in that?

3 COMMISSIONER/SECRETARY ANTHONY: I'll be
4 there, I don't think I have necessarily the authority
5 to participate, unless the Board gives me that
6 authority, but I will certainly be there to advise and
7 bring back information to the Board.

8 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other
9 comments?

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I would
11 like to digress for a minute to Mr. Carter's concern.
12 This is my understanding, a subject before this Board,
13 would you, perhaps the Assistant Chief will be able
14 to, is this a Homeland Security-type issue that falls
15 under the Chief of Police?

16 MR. CARTER: Well, yes, I was told in a
17 meeting with the mayor that prior to this transition,
18 I know that Homeland Security is now under the police
19 department. Before that I think they were own their
20 own entity under the last administration, or however
21 it was set up.

22 So we had meetings with Director Lundy, and
23 actually I have notes from saying he was going to meet
24 with the community, that was in June of last year.

25 Everybody remembers the big fire, the

1 evacuation, the Melvindale evacuation, the sirens and
2 no communications with the residents of Detroit.

3 Well, yesterday kind of illustrated that,
4 because if something had gone wrong yesterday, there
5 is still no plan to do anything.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, I spoke briefly
7 to Director Gerald Simons in reference to this matter,
8 and I think we have to respond to this serious
9 concern, and I was hoping perhaps he would have
10 contacted you since last Friday when we talked
11 briefly.

12 MR. CARTER: Well, he has not personally.
13 Brenda Ice contacted me and we had the same
14 conversation that we had before.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, if this call, the
16 chief authority, chain of command, I would hope
17 there's a follow-up, and be able to report back at the
18 next meeting in reference to this matter, because this
19 a serious issue, and we don't want to take it lightly.

20 I apologize, not responding when you was up
21 at the mic.

22 After I thought bit, we should respond as a
23 Board in terms of this issue, so I'm hoping that we
24 can really entertain this concern and report back to
25 the Chair, minutes at the next meeting.

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Through the Chair,
2 apparently, and we do have our Director of Homeland
3 Security, Gerald Simon, and he's prepared, apparently
4 last week, to present and provide some information to
5 the Board.

6 I will get with him after the Board, and
7 sit with you, Mr. Carter, and we can figure out where
8 we here as it relates to the operational plans that
9 would be taken care of.

10 MR. CARTER: That's fine.

11 Just a side note, after talking to Ms. Ice,
12 I went to the website, and again, we're talking about
13 a community living below the poverty level. Everybody
14 doesn't have Internet, and then if you want it, you
15 have to print it out, it's a bunch of page and it's
16 generic, okay, and that's fine, but to say go to the
17 website, go to the website, go to the website is
18 insulting on a lot of fronts because if my mother was
19 alive and I live in the same neighborhood that grew up
20 in, that wouldn't be an issue because she wouldn't
21 have access, so we need start to giving the respect
22 due to community that's entitled to.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: I'm totally with
24 you, Mr. Carter, and we'll work with Director Simon
25 and you to get some things moved.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, Chief
2 Houser; thank you, Mr. Carter.

3 MR. STIDHAM: Good afternoon, Madam Chair,
4 Members of the Commission, Mr. Secretary.

5 My name is Tom Stidham, I'm an attorney,
6 I'm just following up on what Mr. BaShay (phonetic)
7 brought to the Board's attention about Monday's
8 hearing related to towing, but I think it's
9 imperative, Madam Chair, and Commissioner White, that
10 one of you be there, if possible, because of the
11 institutional knowledge that you have and from the
12 discussion at the council, the last time at the table,
13 there definitely needs to be someone, unless you're
14 going to authorize George, but there definitely needs
15 to be someone with historical or institutional
16 knowledge about what's transpired, so I would
17 certainly encourage either one of you to personally
18 attend, if possible.

19 Also, I'd reach out to the Chief's office
20 and also ask to ensure that someone from their office
21 is there, perhaps Ms. Washington.

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We'll discuss that,
23 I'm sure someone will be there.

24 MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other

1 comments?

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, just one
3 more small comment in reference to Lauren Williams,
4 track, and Bob, I had opportunity to coach the young
5 lady and see she had potential, she was at the
6 Dominican Academy School on the east side, and her
7 mother is a former schoolteacher in Detroit, and
8 father who is now deceased relocated her. And I was
9 sad because I saw the potential, she also participated
10 in summer track program, track and field, and I'm
11 familiar with them because my daughter went through
12 track and field. I coached Dominican. We went to the
13 state but I didn't have the Lauren Williams' talent,
14 but we participated, but basically we didn't know, I
15 saw the article later on that evening in the paper.

16 I know Dr. Jimmy Womack, he's a church
17 member, and hopefully something like that we can get
18 some high profile, because this young lady, even
19 though she grew up in Philadelphia, I don't think
20 she's coming back to Detroit, maybe she's coming back
21 to help us.

22 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAK: She can come back.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: We really need to
24 expose some people, I was playing at Cass Tech High
25 School team there in reference to interaction, but the

1 PR was not there.

2 Basically what happened is that, you know,
3 sometimes the media, we don't lobby hard enough to
4 promote the good things that happen with young people
5 and she's in that age group we really need to bring
6 back home that was possible.

7 And one other note, in reference to the
8 Chief forum at Wayne State, that we was invited and
9 Commission Crawford attended, I think I'm going to,
10 there is no age limit for recruiting, I think I'm
11 going to apply, reapply, because I was impressed in
12 reference to the team, and I'm a sports man, I'm a
13 team player, DPD, I think the tone was established
14 there, and I'm happy this young lady was promoted to
15 first assistant chief.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Assistant Chief.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Assistant Chief, but
18 the main thing is that, my 32 years that this chief
19 was rather unique because he brought in working police
20 officers to kick off the forum and they did not miss
21 no word, same dialogue you would hear in the locker
22 room, in the scout car, a concern, they were able to
23 focus in on that.

24 And the other side of the coin, that the
25 management of deputy chief, assistant chief,

1 lieutenant, they were receptive to that, they were
2 receptive, so that's how you build a team of the
3 spirit of Detroit in terms of reversing the attitude,
4 the morale is, the change is taking place, I just want
5 you to know that, the citizens, that we need your
6 input, we need your help to get people out to our
7 community forum. We're going to go to them but we
8 need your help in terms of bridging that gap, because
9 I think this Board is great, I know it's great, but we
10 can only be so great in the minds of the people if we
11 are engaging Bob.

12 So on that note, I just want to say the
13 spirit of Detroit is alive and well. We need your
14 involvement, we need more attendance, especially when
15 we go out in the community, so take those initiatives
16 and help us develop that type of program.

17 Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

19 Are there any other comments?

20 Are there any other comments?

21 Any other comments?

22 If not I'll entertain, a motion to adjourn.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and

1 supported.

2 All in favor?

3 (Chorus of "aye")

4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Meeting adjourned.

5 (Meeting adjourned at 3:46 p.m.)
