4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Good afternoon.
5 We'll call the meeting to order. The meeting is
6 called to order at 3 o'clock, Thursday, April 24,
7 2014.

8 I'm Commissioner Jessica Taylor and I'm
9 going to ask the Secretary if he will call the
10 role, please.

11 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam
12 Chair. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary
13 to the Board. Commissioner Donnell R. White?

14 Commissioner Richard Shelby?

15 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Present.

16 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Wendell
17 L. Byrd?

18 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Present.

19 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner
20 Reginald Crawford?

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

22 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie
23 E. Bell?

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie

1 E. Burton? Commissioner Lisa Carter?

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Present.

3 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner

4 Ricardo R. Moore?

5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.

6 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madam Chair, you
7 have seven of nine commissioners, a quorum.

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.
9 I'd like to introduce from the Chief's Office 1st
10 Assistant Chief LaShinda Houser.

11 1ST ASST. Chief HOUSER: Thank you,
12 ma'am. Glad to be here. The Chief is meeting
13 with the federal monitors now.

14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right.
15 Mr. Secretary, would you introduce the rest of
16 the staff, please?

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam
18 Chair. Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake, our Chief
19 Investigator is seated in the front. Mr. Robert
20 Brown, our office manager is to my right.

21 Sgt. Alan Quinn is in the back
22 recording our proceedings and Mr. Dale Rose from
23 Hanson Court Reporting Service is taking a
24 transcript. That completes the introduction,
25 ma'am.

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'm going to ask
2 Chaplain Roy Hill if he would come and give us a
3 word of prayer, please.

4 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)

5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right. At
6 this time we'll call for a motion to approve the
7 agenda for Thursday, April 24, 2014.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, so
9 moved.

10 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Second.

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
12 and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All opposed?
15 Agenda stands approved. And now I call for a
16 motion to approve the minutes for Thursday, April
17 17, 2014.

18 COMMISSIONER BYRD: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
21 and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All opposed? The
24 minutes stand approved as written.

25 At this time I'm going to have the

1 Secretary's report.

2 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam
3 Chair. This is the Secretary's report of citizen
4 complaints received March, 2014.

5 The monthly count of complaints for
6 2014 in March were 122 compared with the same
7 period of last year 76. It represents a 61
8 percent increase.

9 The year-to-date figures for 2014
10 through the end of March were 327. For the same
11 period in 2013, 248 -- and this is a typo -- it
12 represents a 32 percent increase and not what's
13 listed.

14 At the end of March, 2014 the Office of
15 the Chief Investigator had open investigations
16 273, cases filed 327, cases closed 328.

17 Of the 122 cases filed, 45 percent
18 involved unknown officers. The alleged known
19 units involved that were leading in complaints
20 filed in March of 2014 were the 8th Precinct at
21 7 percent, the 2nd Precinct at 6 percent,
22 Narcotics Enforcement at 5 percent.

23 The 122 cases filed in March of 2014
24 involved 237 allegations where the leading areas
25 of concern were procedure at 27 percent, demeanor

1 at 22 percent, force and service at 11 percent.

2 This next area, Commissioners, is new
3 and it reveals closed complaints that were filed
4 in March. All of this information will be posted
5 online. We're working to get that link.

6 But closed complaints for the month of
7 March totaled 100, so 100 cases in March were
8 closed and involved 179 allegations where the
9 findings were not sustained at 45 percent,
10 exonerated at 23 percent, unfounded at 14 percent
11 and sustained at 12 percent.

12 The leading areas of concern in the 100
13 closed cases were procedure at 36 percent,
14 demeanor at 27 percent, service at 12 percent and
15 force at 9 percent.

16 Also attached for you is the breakdown
17 of the unknown officer allegations. We've
18 compared it by three years for January, February
19 and March and you will also see how -- what the
20 percentage of total allegations for unknown
21 officers as they regard the allegations that were
22 received for the entire department, and that's on
23 the second page.

24 That completes my report.

25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

1 Commissioners, do you have any questions for the
2 Secretary regarding the report?

3 If not we're going to move to the Chief
4 Investigator and have her come and do the OCI
5 report.

6 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: Good
7 afternoon, Ma'am Chair, good afternoon Board.

8 For the record, Pamela Davis-Drake,
9 Chief Investigator.

10 As of today, Thursday April 24 our
11 current statistics are as follows. We have a
12 total of 271 cases that are currently open, 19
13 cases have been submitted to either myself or the
14 supervisor for review and we have no cases that
15 have been submitted as of today over 90 days.

16 Just as a few updates. The monitor's
17 visit went quite well. Comm. Gurvin, the monitor
18 that is assigned to the Office of the Chief
19 Investigator, conducted a training on Tuesday
20 specifically in the areas that are causing us
21 some issues.

22 He was actually phenomenal. He did a
23 wonderful job in explaining his observations and
24 also providing us with suggestions that we could
25 take with us so that we can come and maintain and

1 come into full compliance.

2 His parting words to us were we're
3 doing well, stay the course and of course pay
4 attention to detail. We got pretty good feedback
5 from both DPD and the monitors this quarterly
6 visit, so we are very happy about that, but we do
7 have still work to be done.

8 I want to thank Commissioners Bell and
9 Shelby for attending the meeting, the meeting --
10 the CAM meeting on Tuesday. It's always nice to
11 look out and see your support and your bosses out
12 there, so that was nice; thank you, sirs.

13 Senior Investigator Madra Coles and I
14 met with Secretary Anthony as he stated earlier
15 about a couple of weeks ago and this was
16 regarding the citizen complaint roster that is
17 mandated within the City Charter for us to have
18 and that's specific to the BOPC website.

19 We did have actually a report that
20 provided us with most of that information. I
21 think it will work. We made a few revisions to
22 that and we think that that is going to work for
23 us and will satisfy that Charter mandate, so we
24 will be providing that to the Board monthly.

25 Also, the DPD asked us to provide a

1 list of the top 20 officers that had the most
2 allegations filed against them or the most
3 citizen complaints -- excuse me -- filed against
4 them in 2014.

5 We did provide that for them. That is
6 something that you might want as well and if the
7 DPD would like them, we can provide that to you
8 all monthly as well.

9 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: Yes.

10 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: Okay,
11 all right, we will do that and that concludes my
12 report. You know, I'm sorry, Madam Chair, one
13 other thing.

14 The statistics that were read today,
15 Mr. Anthony, thank you for reading those, the 61
16 percent increase, he hit on that, between the --
17 as compared to last year this time. I provided a
18 chart for the CAM meeting for the department and
19 at some point I would like to go over that with
20 you all to kind of address that huge -- it looks
21 like a very huge amount of an increase between
22 last year and this year, but there was an anomaly
23 there.

24 We have to take into consideration that
25 Virtual Precincts started at the end of 2012 and

1 ended at the end of 2013 and so during those
2 months the precincts -- some of the precincts
3 were closed or they closed early and we do have
4 to take into consideration that that did happen.

5 As a result of that, our complaints
6 dropped significantly, so if you compare the
7 numbers from this year, the same time last year
8 when Virtual Precincts were in existence the
9 numbers are going to look substantially greater,
10 but at some point I would love to be able to give
11 you the whole chart and the whole rundown for
12 about five years.

13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'm going to ask
14 that you work with Secretary Anthony to come up
15 with a time for us to --

16 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE:
17 Perfect, love to do that, yes, ma'am. Are there
18 any other questions?

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just
20 have a couple of comments. I just wanted to say
21 that I appreciate you inviting me to the training
22 session -- well, not the training, your staff
23 meeting with your team and I sat in on two team
24 meetings and the feedback was that the monitor
25 was in prior to the day before as far as

1 training, and they were impressed with that.

2 And it's one thing to hear from your
3 supervisor on the spot, but it was another thing
4 to hear from the person actually monitoring the
5 process, so -- and I like the team concept in
6 terms of people were enthused in reference to the
7 spirit of OCI.

8 So I just want to commend your
9 leadership and your involvement of making that
10 transition because I know how things worked in
11 the past. And the monitor, I met with him
12 one-on-one briefly and he indicated that we are
13 moving forward and we want both of them to stay
14 in place, you're not going anywhere any time
15 soon, I want to assure you.

16 But it really was a good dialog and I
17 want to commend you, also DPD at the CAM meeting,
18 the Chief complimented you even though he took
19 away his personnel, but it was well needed, I
20 like that exchange too.

21 I just want to say since I have the mic
22 that the CAM meeting was my first meeting and I
23 was highly impressed in terms of the layout and
24 the process and perhaps even Comm. Shelby -- I
25 shouldn't say -- commander at one time,

1 Commissioner Shelby, from the old school and he
2 was briefing me on some of the things that's
3 totally new and the Chief also -- I know I was
4 a long term sergeant, I guess I was a slow
5 learner in terms of getting promoted, but the
6 Chief that afternoon was scheduled to meet with
7 the first line supervisors, the sergeants, the
8 working sergeants, and I said wow, that's a
9 difference because in my career we never had an
10 opportunity to talk to the Chief in a mass
11 setting like that.

12 I think that's really a team-building
13 because they are the ones who do the day-to-day
14 work and hear all the complaints from the police
15 officers, so I really appreciate that type of
16 forum.

17 He also emphasized training, training,
18 training and they're striving for 100 percent, so
19 I just feel the spirit of Detroit is moving
20 forward and one in DPD and one in the community
21 because I know my community appreciates it.

22 I just want to share that with you;
23 thank you.

24 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: Through the
25 Chair, just for the record that meeting with the

1 sergeants had to be rescheduled, but it's
2 scheduled for next Thursday the 1st.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any
5 more questions?

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am,
7 through the chair. Yeah, I was alarmed by the 61
8 percent, but now that you explained the things so
9 I guess if you can't get in the door, the door is
10 open, so that speaks volumes for transparency.

11 Also too I just had concerns about I
12 think your last monthly report there was an
13 increase in demeanor and now it says procedures
14 27 percent, demeanor is 22 percent. Seems like
15 those numbers have kind of flipped so to speak.

16 Is there any analysis or will it be
17 done in terms of -- this might be directed
18 towards the department -- in terms of procedures
19 what's really happening now that the complaints
20 about procedure more decreased and the ones filed
21 about demeanor.

22 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE:
23 Demeanor and procedure are always the top two
24 allegations. What often happens is they will
25 flip, it just depends on the month, it depends on

1 probably a number of factors, but those really
2 are the two top and have been for years, the two
3 top allegations. So there really isn't a
4 specific rationale other than that's the way they
5 usually come in.

6 And most of the cases, if you review
7 the cases, most of them that come in have some
8 type of procedural type of allegation, so it just
9 kind of is the draw of the cards as to whether it
10 will be procedure or demeanor for that particular
11 month.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: As a follow-up,
13 are we -- in the procedure are we seeing the same
14 allegations about the same procedural --

15 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: No.
16 The department has a plethora of procedures and
17 the citizen may provide an allegation about two
18 or three in one report, so it's not anything
19 specific usually, but I tell you what we can do,
20 a little bit of an analysis and see if there is
21 something that is coming in more often than
22 something else, but really because it's procedure
23 and because there's so many departmental
24 procedures they usually fall under one of those
25 and that's how it is.

1 Demeanor is a little bit more cut and
2 dry because they may say, "Well, I didn't like
3 the way an officer talked to me" or something of
4 that nature, so that's a little bit more cut and
5 dry.

6 But when you're looking at procedure
7 there are a host of procedures that could be
8 covered.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Also when we
10 talk about procedure because I was just concerned
11 whether or not -- and that's why I asked that
12 question -- if it's dealing with searching of
13 vehicles, if it's dealing with stop and frisk,
14 what you're saying is --

15 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: I'm
16 not seeing a whole lot actually from stop and
17 frisk, but again it could be something as a
18 traffic stop and the complainant says that
19 something was done inaccurately or not completed
20 or not according to protocol, but it just -- it
21 depends on what that procedural allegation is.

22 And it can be across the board. Like I
23 said, we have so many procedures that it could
24 fall under, so I'm not seeing anything that is
25 blaring, a blaring issue that is consistent. I'm

1 not seeing that, but we can look at it and see if
2 there is, but I haven't seen that.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay, thank
4 you, and the top 20 list, I'm sure there's no
5 police officer wants to be on the top 20, but
6 it's unfortunate that we have one now. So thank
7 you.

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Any more
9 questions, comments for the Chief. If not, thank
10 you.

11 I don't believe we have a report from
12 the department today?

13 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: No, ma'am.
14 This was a miscommunication on the part of our
15 office, not your office, so we're going to
16 reschedule that presentation.

17 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. Are
18 there any standing committee reports? New
19 business and under new business today we have
20 three resolutions.

21 We have a resolution honoring Sgt.
22 William Price, Sgt. Sarah McClure and Sgt. Frank
23 Valenti. Is any of the honorees here today?

24 If not, I'm going to ask if
25 Commissioner Crawford would read the resolved

1 clause for Sgt. William Price.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am,
3 it's a honor because I know and work with Sgt.
4 Price.

5 Now, therefore be it resolved that the
6 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking
7 for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit
8 Police Department award this resolution in
9 recognition of Sgt. William Price's 45 years and
10 nine months of dedicated and diligent public
11 service.

12 His professionalism, integrity and
13 level of commitment to the city of Detroit and
14 its citizens merit our highest regards and best
15 wishes for continued success.

16 We salute and congratulate you, Sgt.
17 William Price.

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you and at
19 this time I'm going to have Commissioner Carter
20 read the resolution honoring Sgt. Sarah McClure.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Now therefore be
22 it resolved that the Detroit Board of Police
23 Commissioners speaking for the citizens of
24 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department award
25 this resolution in recognition of Sgt. Sarah

1 McClure's 25 years of dedicated and diligent
2 public service.

3 Her professionalism, integrity and
4 level of commitment to the city of Detroit and
5 its citizens merit our highest regards and best
6 wishes for continued success.

7 We salute and congratulate you, Sgt.
8 Sarah McClure.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, and
10 Commissioner Moore will read the resolution
11 honoring Sgt. Frank Valenti.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Now therefore be
13 it resolved that the Detroit Board of Police
14 Commissioners speaking on behalf of the Detroit
15 Police Department and the citizens of the city of
16 Detroit recognize the lifelong commitment to
17 public safety of Sgt. Frank Valenti. His pride
18 and dedication have been invaluable assets to the
19 department and merit our highest regard.

20 We thank and congratulate you, Sgt.
21 Frank Valenti.

22 (Commissioner White arrives.)

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. At
24 this time I'm going to call for a motion to adopt
25 the resolutions honoring Sgt. William Price, Sgt.

1 Sarah McClure and Sgt. Frank Valenti.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Is there a
4 second?

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

6 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
7 and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All opposed? Any
10 abstentions. If not, the motion carries to adopt
11 the resolutions honoring Sgt. William Price, Sgt.
12 Sarah McClure and Sgt. Frank Valenti which will
13 be added to our permanent archives.

14 Now, we will move to old business. Is
15 there any old business? Oh, the acknowledgment
16 the Vice-Chair joining us, Commissioner Donnell
17 White.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam
19 Chair, please excuse my tardiness.

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: If there's no old
21 business, we'll move to announcements and our
22 next meeting is May 1, 2014 here at the Detroit
23 Public Safety Headquarters.

24 Now we're going to move to oral
25 communications from the audience. Please give

1 your name and limit your comments to two minutes
2 as you come forward.

3 Are there any comments? Are there any
4 comments from the audience?

5 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: Madam Chair,
6 while Ms. Bernice is walking to the podium I'd
7 like to invite everybody to the 5th Precinct
8 groundbreaking ceremony on Thursday, May 1 at 10
9 o'clock, 3500 Connor.

10 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes, ma'am and I
11 think we have a notice in our packet,
12 Commissioners.

13 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madam Chair,
14 there's also an RSVP at the bottom so if the
15 Commissioners are interested, you can do so
16 directly or you can contact us and we'll do it
17 for you.

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay, all right.

19 MS. SMITH: Public also?

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Is this public?
21 I read somewhere where it said invitation.

22 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: I know that
23 the public will be there. I'm not sure if you
24 have to go through the RSVP process, so --

25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Ms. Bernice, I

1 know you'll be there.

2 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice
3 Smith, Human Rights Commissioner. I don't have
4 that much to talk about, but I do want to ask I
5 was speaking with an officer at the Eight Mile
6 Meijer's store and we were speaking about his
7 position there and what he does and so forth.

8 And in our conversation he stated that
9 there were quite a few officers that are being --
10 they're going to retire and do we have that large
11 a percentage of officers that's being retired
12 that they afraid of what the EM is doing or, in
13 other words, interfering with your monies.

14 You know, I got to stick him about
15 that, your salary and plus your health and I did
16 say there were quite a few of the officers that
17 were being retired and you do have a class that's
18 being trained, but the fact is that there's more
19 retirement than is coming in and you know as well
20 as I do a lot of these recruits come in and they
21 don't stay with us because we're known to be the
22 best recruitment that there is as far as police
23 concerns.

24 So I've just wondered if you're aware
25 of this situation because of the fact that the

1 police officers are very scared about their
2 monies being taken from them which I am too
3 because I believe that you deserve every bit of
4 what you earn because your lives is out there on
5 the street.

6 So if we can see about -- I know we're
7 not going to do nothing with the EM, you know, he
8 does his own thing, but the fact is I'm looking
9 forward to meeting him. We have a meeting next
10 week so I'm looking forward to finally getting to
11 him and I just want to let you know, I'm going to
12 fight for you regardless of what he does, I'm
13 going to really mention it to him, "What are you
14 doing to the police and the firemen", you know,
15 and that's all I have to say today and --

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I think the Chief
17 wants to say something.

18 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: Yes, ma'am,
19 through the Chair. Certainly there's some
20 anxiety as it relates to pensions and salaries
21 associated with police and fire. However, I can
22 tell you that over the last few months the number
23 of officers that actually retire are much smaller
24 than they have been, let's say, over the course
25 of the last six to nine months, so certainly

1 there's some --

2 MS. SMITH: That's good to hear.

3 1ST ASST. CHIEF HOUSER: -- anxiety and
4 then we do, we actually have three classes in the
5 academy and one will actually be graduating
6 sometime in early June.

7 MS. SMITH: Wonderful, that's
8 wonderful. I thank you so much.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
10 Chair, Ms. Smith, we're all fighting. The Rev.
11 Bernie Johns said, "If you see a good fight, get
12 in it"; we're all fighting.

13 MS. SMITH: That's good. I want you
14 all of you to know that there are -- we're
15 citizens out here, we're fighting for you all, so
16 -- because I can't see you getting, what is it,
17 \$14 an hour. That's ridiculous, whatever that
18 may be. It's too far under the classification of
19 what you're doing out here, and I just feel as
20 though you deserve more, so if the executives can
21 get it and the consultants that's coming into our
22 city can get it, you deserve it also, so that
23 will be mentioned too whenever I get a chance.

24 I thank you so much.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Ms. Bernice, it's a

1 blessing to retire. The time you want to make a
2 transition to another life, it's a blessing to
3 retire and I don't think people exiting like they
4 have in the past at the one year or two year
5 count. There's not a lot of job openings in
6 metropolitan Detroit and even out in the country,
7 so they are staying much longer, they are more
8 committed.

9 I know one time period that was really
10 really concerned, but it appears they are
11 staying. When I say retirement, I say that's a
12 blessing to that officer and his family, they can
13 retire from this job, so look at it in that
14 sense.

15 MS. SMITH: Okay.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: And we all are
17 concerned about pension, but I know there's a
18 higher order that we will be sustained.

19 MS. SMITH: Oh yes, you better believe
20 it. Thank you so much.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any
22 other comments? Commissioner, I'm going to ask
23 do you have anything you want to say?

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam
25 Chair. Briefly just to announce the 59th annual

1 Fight for Freedom Fund Dinner for the NAACP which
2 everyone is invited to participate will be at
3 Cobo Hall on May 4, 5 o'clock PM.

4 Our keynote speaker this year will be
5 Professor Charles Ogletree of Harvard Law
6 University. Thank you, Madam Chair.
