4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening. Welcome
5 to the Board of Police Commissioners Community meeting.
6 My name is Lisa Carter. I'm the Chair for the Board of
7 Police Commissioners. At this time, I'm going to ask
8 that Associate Minister and Officer of the Detroit
9 Police Department Denmark come forward and give a
10 welcome from Mt. Pleasant Missionary Baptist Church,
11 and the invocation. Thank you.

12 REV. DENMARK: Good evening, everyone. In
13 the absence of our Pastor James Minnick, I'm Reverend
14 Thomas Denmark, and associate minister here at the
15 church. When we come to Mt. Pleasant, we come
16 expecting a blessing. This is not Sunday service, but
17 we still expect a blessing. Amen.

18 (Invocation given)

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Amen. Thank you
20 Associate Minister Denmark. I had no idea that you
21 were associate minister. Officer Demark is the NPO for
22 the 4th precinct and that's where I know him from.
23 Thank you.

24 At this time I'm going to ask that each
25 commissioner introduce themselves as part of the --

1 what we do in the community forums so that you will
2 have an opportunity to hear them yourselves. So we're
3 going to start with Commissioner Shelby.

4 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Good afternoon. Good
5 evening. I'm commissioner Richard Shelby. I represent
6 District 1. Former police commander, 31 years Detroit
7 Police Department. Recently elected to continue my
8 service with the City of Detroit.

9 COMMISSIONER VANN: I'm Commissioner Edgar
10 Vann of District 2, Northwest Detroit. Very happy to
11 be here and I'm grateful for Pastor Minnick opening his
12 doors to share with the community on tonight.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Good evening. I'm
14 Reginald Crawford, commissioner of District 3, the east
15 side.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening. Donnell
17 White. I'm glad to be here. I in an additional
18 capacity serve as Executive Director of your Detroit
19 NAACP. I was appointed by Mayor Dave Bing in 2010.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good evening. I'm
21 Willie Bell, your commissioner for District 4. And you
22 are in District 4, the home of the 5th precinct and 9th
23 precinct and I'm an east-sider. I'm proud of it. I've
24 been on the east side all my life, not quite, but quite
25 some time, and I really want to thank you for your

1 attendance this evening.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening.
3 Commissioner Ricardo Moore. I represent District 7,
4 which is Northwest Detroit, the 2nd, 6th and 10th
5 precincts.

6 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Good evening. I'm
7 Elizabeth Brooks and I'm newly appointed commissioner
8 appointed by the Mayor of the City. I'm a community
9 leader and it is an honor to be here. Thank you all so
10 much.

11 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I'm Conrad Mallett. I
12 was appointed by Mayor Duggan. I'm a west-sider and
13 proud of it.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: We love you anyway.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,
16 commissioners. For the record, Commissioner Eva
17 Dewaelsche has asked to be excused, and with that,
18 we'll introduce the rest of the staff. Lawrence Akbar
19 standing in for the Chief Investigator Drake. And then
20 we have Robert Brown and the court reporter is Ms.
21 Mindy Womack. And our recorder for today is Sergeant
22 Alan Quinn. At this time, we have a quorum. We do
23 have a quorum. We're going to move on to the approval
24 of the agenda.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: So moved, Madam

1 Chair.

2 COMMISSIONER: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It has been moved and
4 supported the agenda for August 13th be approved.
5 Those in favor?

6 COMMISSIONER: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
8 carries. At this time I'll entertain a motion to
9 approve the minutes from August 6th.

10 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER: Supported.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
13 supported that the minutes be accepted. Those in
14 favor?

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
17 carries.

18 At this time, I would like to introduce
19 Deputy Chief David LeValley deputy chief, if you would
20 introduce yourself and the rest of the staff here,
21 please.

22 D.C. LeVALLEY: Good evening. Deputy Chief
23 David LeValley, Criminal Intelligence Bureau, Detroit
24 Police Department. I'm sitting in for Chief Craig
25 tonight who sends his regards. He's attending a fund

1 raising event on the southwest side of the city for a
2 scholarship program and couldn't be here tonight.
3 Joining me tonight is, as I'm sure everybody well
4 knows, Assistant Chief Stephen Dolunt. Deputy Chief
5 Renee Hall. Deputy Chief Charles Fitzgerald.
6 Commander Elvin Barren. Mr. Jack Fennessey technology,
7 who's trying to hide there. Hi, Jack. Captain Michael
8 Chambers. Captain Whitney Walton. Lieutenant John
9 Speck. Captain Kyra Hope. Captain Connie Slaki from
10 homicide. Commander Marlon Wilson major crimes.
11 Captain Jackie Pritchett, 8th precinct. Captain Ken
12 Balinski, 12th precinct. Captain Aric Tosqui, 3rd
13 precinct. Commander Charles Mahone standing in the
14 back. Captain Steve Walton the 6th precinct, just
15 joined us. And the phenomenal Captain Mark Bliss of
16 the 5th precinct. Oh, and Director James Flemming,
17 communications. I think that covers the back.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That's everybody?

19 D.C. LEVALLEY: I think so.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Ms. Linda
21 Bernard, if you could come take a seat up here. Thank
22 you for coming. For the record, Linda Bernard attorney
23 to the Board.

24 MS. BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chairperson.
25 Been in funerals all day.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time I do not
2 have a Chairperson report. And we'll move on to the
3 5th precinct presentation from the department.

4 CAPTAIN BLISS: Good evening Commissioners,
5 Deputy Chief LeValley.

6 A.C. DOLUNT: Short and sweet.

7 CAPTAIN BLISS: Last year was longer so I made
8 it shorter this time for everyone.

9 For those who don't know me, I'm Captain Mark
10 Bliss and from the 5th precinct. The 5th precinct
11 located currently at 11187 Gratiot is one of the City
12 of Detroit Police Department's largest police
13 precincts. The 5th precinct encompasses 12.8 square
14 miles. The borders of the precinct are to the north
15 interstate I94, the Detroit River to the south,
16 Cadillac Boulevard to the west, and the communities of
17 Grosse Pointe Farms, Grosse Pointe Park and Harper
18 Woods to the east. The precinct is home to
19 approximately 75,000 residents.

20 City of Detroit properties and private
21 property within the 5th precinct consist of Waterworks
22 Park and and the Daimler Chrysler Jefferson North
23 Complex that extends from St. Jean and East Warren to
24 Connor and East Jefferson.

25 The 5th precinct boasts the following. The

1 5th precinct has answered approximately 17,000 calls
2 for service in the past year. That equates to over 300
3 calls per week or almost 50 calls per day. The 5th
4 precinct averages over 50 felony arrests and over 52
5 misdemeanor arrests per month. That's an average of
6 1200 arrests made within the last year alone. The 5th
7 precinct also averages about 750 traffic and
8 misdemeanor citations issued each month, which is over
9 9000 citations issued every year.

10 The 5th precinct has four neighborhood police
11 officers who are assigned to address quality of life
12 concerns issues on average over 80 blight citations per
13 month, which equates to nearly 1000 written each year.
14 The 5th precinct is also home to several family
15 friendly parks and recreation area, the largest being
16 Chandler Park, which is home to the largest aquatic
17 center in Wayne County, which is, it's the Waterworks
18 Park. And those of you that attended the National
19 Night Out, it was a beautiful occasion at our
20 Waterworks Park. As well as an 18-hole golf course.
21 That is also part of Chandler Park, which is scheduled
22 to receive a 20 million dollar makeover. Those of you
23 that did see that in the paper how it's going to be a
24 huge park once it's done.

25 Balduck Park on the precinct's eastern border

1 features a large sledding hill as well as a newly
2 renovated UAW Ford ball field which received bleachers,
3 fences, lighting, restrooms, thanks to 2 million dollar
4 gift from UAW and formed.

5 The precinct also houses St. John Hospital
6 Medical Center on Moross Road. St. John Hospital,
7 Level 2 trauma center is one of largest hospital
8 campuses in the City of Detroit.

9 The 5th precinct is home to the Fiat Chrysler
10 Jefferson North Assembly Plant, which is approximately
11 three million square foot plant resting on 283 acres
12 near the precinct's southern border. The plant is
13 responsible for building the Jeep Grand Cherokee and
14 the Dodge Durango.

15 Finally the 5th precinct is excited to soon
16 be moving into our new home at 3500 Connor. I've been
17 saying this for approximately a year, so don't
18 everybody get excited. The ground breaking took place
19 in May 2014 and is scheduled to be completed soon. So
20 just for the Board, I've gone to each of my community
21 meetings for the past year telling them it's next
22 month, next month. So it's like a running joke now
23 with the community. Is it this month? So but that's
24 all for my presentation. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

1 CAPTAIN BLISS: Any questions?

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Before we take any
3 questions, I want to acknowledge the presence of
4 commissioner Willie Burton, who just arrived. So any
5 questions, Commissioners, at this time?

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, I just
7 want to say on behalf of District 4 that Captain Bliss
8 do an outstanding job and NPO's in the office of the
9 5th precinct. And I think I speak on behalf of
10 individuals from Jefferson and Chalmers, all the way up
11 to Cornerstone in East English Village and Morningside
12 and other community groups in terms of being able to
13 respond. We had our meeting last night in East English
14 Village. Officer King was there in your place and
15 reporting out, and people were really pleased with the
16 interaction on the 5th precinct under your leadership.
17 So I just want to commend you and thank you and keep up
18 the good work. Contrary to what the A.C. might say, if
19 you need two more minutes, you can get two more
20 minutes.

21 A.C. DOLUNT: You didn't give your stats yet.
22 Did you give your stats? Crime's down. Did you tell
23 them that? I lost after the Aquatic Park and stuff.
24 Tell them about your stats.

25 CAPTAIN BLISS: Crime is down double digits.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Crime is down. The
2 water park was really a highlight. I mentioned that
3 last week at our meeting that over 400 some folks was
4 there early on and stayed the course. And the A.C. was
5 there and others, so I just want to commend you in
6 terms of that type of activities on behalf of
7 communities just in District 4.

8 CAPTAIN BILLS: Just for the Board to know,
9 that the total attendance at that water park was 731
10 people attending.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair.
12 Could you introduce your staff? Your NPO's.

13 CAPTAIN BLISS: Yes. NPO Deborah Gaines, and
14 NPO Shawnee Robins.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions
16 commissioners?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I
18 want to say to Captain Bliss, you know, you did a great
19 job you and your team over during National Night Out as
20 well as the rest of the department. So thumbs up to
21 you guys.

22 CAPTAIN BLISS: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: A question about
24 Chandler Park. So Detroit patrols Chandler Park?

25 CAPTAIN BLISS: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is that a county park?

2 CAPTAIN BLISS: The water park that's inside
3 is the county park, but the outlying park is City of
4 Detroit.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other
6 questions? Thank you, Captain.

7 CAPTAIN BLISS: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time, if there
9 are any outstanding committee reports. I have not made
10 appointments to the committees yet, and now that we
11 have Commissioner Brooks on board, we're going to be
12 looking at the committees and making assignments over
13 the next couple weeks. So I just wanted to let
14 everyone know that.

15 Under new business we have a resolution for
16 Mr. Anthony Zander. Is Mr. Anthony Zander here today?

17 UNIDENTIFIED PERSON: He's actually about
18 five or ten minutes out. He called.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Assistant
20 Chief -- I'm sorry. Deputy Chief.

21 D.C. DOLUNT: I get demoted again?

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Did you have a report?

23 D.C. LeVALLEY: Yes, ma'am, I did. Two
24 things. One, I'll give some year-to-date crime stats
25 for some Part 1 crime categories or violent crime

1 categories. This is as of 11:59 p.m. last night.
2 Criminal homicides we're at 168. 2014 we were at 169,
3 so we're down one. Aggravated assaults were at 5,766.
4 Last year we were at 5,640. We have an increase of
5 126, or 2%. Nonfatal shootings, we're at 662. Last
6 year we were at 638 for an increase 24, or 4%.
7 Robberies, we're at 1,831. Last year this date we were
8 at 2,194 for a drop of 363, or 17%. And carjackings,
9 we are at 294. Last year this date we were at 322,
10 decrease of 28, or 9%.

11 The second thing I wanted to mention is that
12 last night Chief Craig and Commander Bettison had a lot
13 to do with the first LGBT summit that we held in Palmer
14 Park. We had an attendance of approximately 125.
15 There was seating for 100, so it was filled beyond
16 capacity. Turned out to be a very beneficial event,
17 and the Chief is now going to start along, as well as
18 Captain Balinski from 12th precinct a monthly advisory
19 committee from the LGBT community to give feedback,
20 suggestions, recommendations to help, help the Chief
21 make decisions as well as Captain Balinski. So that's
22 it. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any questions for Deputy
24 Chief LeValley. No questions? Thank you, Deputy
25 Chief.

1 D.C. LeVALLEY: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time, Mr.
3 Zander, Anthony Zander.

4 MR. ZANDER: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You can come up and Mr.
6 Commissioner Bell is going to present the award -- I'm
7 sorry. Resolution.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good evening again.
9 I just want to say I know this young man Anthony. This
10 resolution's honoring Anthony. Mr. Anthony Zander is a
11 dedicated and committed supporter of the City of
12 Detroit and Detroit Police Department 5th precinct.
13 Mr. Zander is an active member of the 5th Precinct
14 Community Relations Council. And Mr. Zander's future
15 projects include increased active membership of the 5th
16 Precinct Community Relation Council includes residents
17 and business owners. He wants to introduce the concept
18 of community policing to city residents and build
19 relationships to help prevent the kind of issues that
20 plague other cities. His main goal is to improve the
21 quality of life within the 5th precinct.

22 He is a graduate of Detroit Martin Luther
23 King High School on the lower east side. I added that.
24 And continues studies at Michigan State University
25 where he received a Bachelors degree in public affairs

1 and political science. He is a committed volunteer for
2 community and citywide projects including Angel's
3 Night, Motor City Makeover, the Freedom Festival, Arise
4 Neighborhood, and many other beautification projects
5 forums and community advisor meeting.

6 Now, therefore, be it, that the Detroit Board
7 of Police Commissioners speaking on behalf of the 5th
8 precinct and citizens of the City of Detroit
9 acknowledged the dedication and community spirit of Mr.
10 Anthony Zander. He's a committed and hard working
11 citizens who deeply cares for his community. He is
12 inspiration to all and a model of citizenship to be a
13 young man. We thank you, congratulate you, Anthony, on
14 behalf of the Board of Police Commissioners and 5th
15 precinct and DPD.

16 D.C. LeVALLEY: I have here the Spirit of
17 Detroit award to present to Mr. Anthony Zander from the
18 Detroit City Council, and this is signed by all members
19 of the Detroit City Council.

20 MR. ZANDER: Thank you very much. Really
21 appreciate that.

22 D.C. LeVALLEY: Additionally we have from the
23 Detroit Police Department a Certificate of recognition
24 to Mr. Anthony Zander. Resident of the City of Detroit
25 in appreciation for outstanding service and

1 cooperation. For your involvement in the community and
2 services to the City of Detroit you demonstrate
3 experience and commitment that is worthy of recognition
4 signed by Chief Craig.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Zander.

6 MR. ZANDER: My name is Anthony Zander and,
7 you know, I just want to say thank you to everybody out
8 there, I want to say thank you to everybody out there,
9 5th precinct, everybody in the neighborhood. I really
10 appreciate it and a lot of it is due to this young lady
11 right here. This is my mother, Carol Adams, and I want
12 to say thank you, mom. I appreciate it. She's been
13 very great, very supportive of everything I've done and
14 it's because of everything she's done, everything she
15 sacrificed so that I could be where I am right now.
16 Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, at this
18 time, I would entertain a motion.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
22 supported. The resolution for Anthony Zander. I'm
23 sorry. Is there any discussion?

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, I just rise
25 to personally congratulate Mr. Zander. I had an

1 opportunity to matriculate with this brother at
2 Michigan State University. We didn't call him Anthony
3 Zander back then, but mom, you should know he was
4 exemplary then and he's certainly exemplary now, so we
5 expect more great things from him. Just glad to know
6 him personally. Congratulations.

7 MR. ZANDER: Thank you. Appreciate it.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other
9 discussion? Those in favor?

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
12 carries. The resolution will be placed into the Board
13 of Police Commissioner archives.

14 The second item on the agenda.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: We would postpone
16 that to a later date and time.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Thomas is not here
18 at this time, so we're going to adjourn that until a
19 date when he is available. A certificate of
20 appreciation. Under old business. Is there any old
21 business? Announcements? The next Board of Police
22 Commissioners meeting is Thursday, August 20th at 3
23 p.m. at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters located
24 at 1301 Third Street in the Michigan Room. The next
25 Board of Police Commissioners Community Meeting will be

1 at the 3rd precinct at the Boy Scouts of America
2 located at 1776 West Warren at Rosa Parks Boulevard,
3 and that meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. on September the
4 10th.

5 At this time, we will take oral
6 communications from the audience. Please limit your --
7 give your name and limit your comments to two minutes.

8 A.C. DOLUNT: Assistant Chief Dolunt. We're
9 having a job fair August 22nd for both uniform and
10 civilians. It will be at headquarters this Saturday
11 from 12 to 3. Police officers, dispatchers, I believe,
12 crime analysis. There's different qualifications.
13 Police traffic, I'm not sure exactly called traffic,
14 civilian traffic person. We'll be doing that. So we
15 have a lot of jobs. If you know anyone that's looking
16 for work. Most of them are part time. Some are full
17 time August 22nd, headquarters 12 to 3. Good. Thank
18 you.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

20 MS. BROWN: Hi, everybody. My name is
21 Beverly Brown. I'm going to represent two or three
22 different things at this time. I'm with MEC radio
23 patrol and I'm now recruiting anybody would like to
24 join our patrol. I do have applications, and since we
25 have the police here, all we have to do is hand it to

1 them and let them take it down, so we could do it real
2 fast. Anyway, and I have some information about safe
3 route patrols too if you want to do that. But I want
4 to congratulate our President of the Community
5 relations, Anthony Zander, for what you guys did with
6 him and I come with a kind of sad thing. We lost Art
7 Green and I have the arrangements for him. The viewing
8 is Sunday August 16th at James Cole Northwest Chapter
9 Funeral Home on Schaefer and the viewing is, viewing's
10 going to be 9 to 9, and then it's going to be Monday,
11 August 17th 9 to 9. And the funeral is Tuesday, August
12 18th, family hour 10:00, funeral 11 a.m. at Blessed
13 Sacrament Cathedral, and that's 9844 Woodward Avenue,
14 Boston Edison area of Detroit, Michigan, 48224. And
15 I'd like to thank, you know, saying that if anybody can
16 attend, we'd appreciate it because the day that he died
17 he had took some kids out flying because he's with the
18 Young Eagles Program and they try and get young kids
19 interested in aviation. And he had flown that day and
20 they flew about four or five kids to give them the
21 experience of aviation. And thank you.

22 And I'd like to thank the NPO's. They did
23 such a wonderful job with the Aquatic Center and their
24 idea. It was a beautiful vision that came. And after
25 being there, all of the these officers -- I'm sorry.

1 They came. I'm nervous. Okay. They came and
2 supported us and the young, the young officers, they
3 did, the NPO's did such a great job and those kids that
4 some of them had never been to that pool. They saw it
5 all the time but they never could afford to be there,
6 and these people raised the money to get them in there.
7 And some of them was paying out of their pocket because
8 they had ran out of what we raised, they were paying
9 out of their pocket so the kids could come. Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Can we offer a moment of
11 silence for Mr. Green.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sure. Thank you. Yes,
13 sir.

14 (Moment of silence).

15 MR. WELLBORN: By name's Bill Wellborn. As
16 Beverly said, Art made five flights Sunday and myself,
17 Eric Love and Dr. Smith was one of the last people to
18 talk to him before he took off. And, you know, when I
19 found out he was dead, it does kind of hurt because he
20 was our leader.

21 But anyway, I want to talk about something
22 else right now. There's a new school coming to town.
23 Might take a little longer than two minutes. It's a
24 company called Base 1 out of California is coming.
25 They're already here. They started a new drone school

1 at City Airport, second floor out of City Airport. Now
2 the only ones go there this year are the people that
3 went to Davis Aeronautical School because they've
4 been -- they've got some training. They donated one
5 million dollars for this school here. The system, the
6 new drone system is the job of the future and in order
7 to be -- in order to fly a drone over 500 feet, you
8 have to have a pilot's license. You've got to have a
9 pilot's license to fly over 500 feet. So you have to
10 go to school for that.

11 I've been talking to a lot of kids around
12 different schools and telling them to start getting
13 ready now, but you've got to have a lot of math.
14 You've got to have your math. You've got to study
15 math. If you haven't taken algebra or geometry, you
16 got to get on the stick and start doing this. These
17 jobs pay as much as \$200,000 a year some of these jobs.
18 And a lot of jobs trickle down because they got to have
19 mechanics, they got to have controllers. They've got
20 to have a of lot other people to do this.

21 Colonel Melbourne was the former commander at
22 Selfridge Air Force Base. He's trying to get the
23 aviation school back out to the airport because the
24 full emergency manager, he moved away from the airport,
25 which to me was stupid. You move people away from the

1 airport and they want to learn how to fly and the
2 airport's five miles away. You can't do it. It just
3 doesn't make sense. You can't do it. It just doesn't
4 make sense. But he's fighting for this. He's to
5 trying to get this, get it moved back to the airport.
6 But this school, for individuals who want to go to
7 school, going to cost them \$14,000 to go to this
8 school. And, like a say, it's created a lot of new
9 jobs. A mechanic will make up to \$70,000 a year on
10 this job. That's just a regular mechanic. Myself, I
11 was a chief mechanic in the service so I know what a
12 mechanic does. And you got to know what you're doing
13 because if you're a mechanic on something and you're
14 out there working on these things, even on the
15 aircraft, you got to know what you're doing because you
16 might cost a person's life. So as soon as I get more
17 information on this, I'm going to bring it back to you
18 all and let you know. Because I'd like to -- everybody
19 let their kids know, start getting ready for this.
20 This is something new. And it's going to come because
21 a lot of people flying them around right now, and it's
22 in the works right now. These guys are here today.
23 They're putting a million dollars in effect today into
24 this so.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Wellborn, when you

1 get the information, can you please get it to us as
2 soon as you can?

3 MR. WELLBORN: Yes, I am. That's what I'm
4 working on now.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. We
6 appreciate you.

7 MR. ZANDER: Greetings, Board. Good evening.
8 I want to say -- first I want to start off by saying I
9 hope that some day soon that you all receive, receive
10 the power that was bestowed upon you by the City
11 Charter of Detroit. First want to get that out of the
12 way.

13 Anthony Zander, President of the 5th precinct
14 Community Relations Council. And I just wanted to get
15 that out the way. I hope that happens, and I hope it
16 happens soon. And whatever that you may need from the
17 5th -- members of the 5th precinct, the community, to
18 help that, to help that along, just let me know and
19 we'll get that started.

20 Once again, I want to thank the 5th precinct
21 officers, Captain Bliss and all his whole team. I want
22 to thank the leadership of the DPD for coming down here
23 and sitting with us and discussing everything with us.

24 One of the things that I really wanted to
25 discuss is one of the things I wanted to mention is

1 that I had the opportunity to speak at length with a
2 couple of my NPO's in 5th precinct and it was a
3 reminder of what our relations used to be back in the
4 day before, you know, the department got thin or the
5 department decided that this was a priority, this is a
6 priority and things of that nature. But one of the
7 things that should be a priority is the establishment
8 of relationships between the people of the community
9 and the officers themselves. And so the NPO's that I
10 spoke with, I know they're hearing me, and just want to
11 say thank you for having that conversation with me, for
12 spending that time with me. I think it was great. It
13 allows, it allows the relationship be built that the
14 relationships that we need that aren't happening around
15 the country and happening elsewhere that are, that are
16 driving wedges in between the police and the community,
17 which I don't think is happening here because those
18 opportunities exist. I just want to, I just want to, I
19 want to put that before you the board and powers of the
20 DPD downtown that whatever it is that you can do to
21 allow that to happen on a more regular basis, I really
22 would appreciate it. I mean I think it's been
23 official. These people are my NPO's. At the same
24 time, I know I can count on these individuals not
25 because they wear a badge and because I know them and

1 they know me. They know me by name. I can call upon
2 them at any time I need. I never had a problem with
3 them not responding to anything I need, and I think
4 that personal relationship helps that along. And so
5 whatever it is that you can do to establish that and
6 make that a citywide thing, I think that would be great
7 for the rest of the community, the rest of the city.
8 Thank you very much.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Zander.

10 MS. BUTLER: Good evening to the Board and
11 the community members here today.

12 My name is Brenda Butler and I'd like to
13 speak with you this evening regarding the City of
14 Detroit ordinance that requires the installation and
15 maintenance of video surveillance equipment and
16 additional public security measures at self service gas
17 stations licensed under this chapter to operate in the
18 City of Detroit. This ordinance was declared necessary
19 for the preservation of the peace, health, safety and
20 welfare of the people of the City of Detroit.

21 Our self-service station licenses that are
22 issued pursuant to this amended to the ordinance shall
23 expire on August 31st, which is approaching us quickly.
24 So my question tonight is can we make this a part of
25 the agenda for the Police Commissioner Board Meeting

1 and the 5th precinct meeting to update the community on
2 all service stations, gas stations, service stations in
3 the 4th precinct as to where we stand with these gas
4 stations in compliance with this ordinance?

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.
6 Assistant Deputy Chief.

7 D.C. LeVALLEY: I will say that we are doing
8 a review right now of all gas stations. The NPO's at
9 every precinct are going around inspecting them for
10 compliance with the ordinance list. We'll have that
11 completed by the 15th and then we will be able to make
12 known to the public who's in compliance with the
13 ordinance and who's not.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. 15th of this
15 month? August.

16 D.C. LeVALLEY: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: August 15th?

18 MS. SKLAR: Good evening, commissioners,
19 officers. I just want to say too, Art Green is going
20 to be missed dearly. He was part of our military
21 family as well. And anyway, my thanks to the police
22 department. Oh, I'm sorry. Sharon Sklar. Thanks to
23 the police department and all the officers thank you
24 for protecting our city and keeping the peace.

25 What brings me today, here today is my

1 property tax bill which had a fee that was part of a
2 lawsuit that was levied against the City of the Inkster
3 Police Department and that all citizens had to pay for
4 in Wayne County, which actually brings me to my subject
5 today. With the hardship our city still faces post
6 bankruptcy, I would like to know why our city continues
7 past practices of negligence retention.

8 I'm a researcher. My research to date shows
9 that we have a consistency for zero failure rate for
10 our officers in FTO programs, and unlike the national
11 average, failure rate's like 24%. I was hard pressed
12 to find any failure rate within the City of Detroit,
13 and this is costing us money.

14 Another concern of mine is regarding now the
15 City's hiring civilians that we have proper programs in
16 place to train these people, and one area where I find
17 that we are lacking is in our communication section in
18 dispatch where we have no formal training program. The
19 national standard for failure is 70% across the nation
20 for failure of dispatchers, but yet, we have no failure
21 rate in our dispatch program and we actually have
22 dispatchers who have failed who are now training new
23 dispatchers, civilian and police. So we have no state
24 certified program that's being followed to train these
25 new dispatchers to keep our officers safe on the

1 street, and that's a major concern because I think all
2 these things need to be looked at because they's a very
3 high potential for litigation and lawsuit.

4 To date we have two officers in the
5 communications section that were so concerned about no
6 training standards and the possibility of litigation
7 that they recently paid for and completed the trainer
8 to transfer and now they are the only two officers
9 certified to train in their section according to state
10 standards and are state certified to do so.

11 Today, in today's climate many dispatchers
12 are being sued due to lack of formal training as well
13 as officers, and I think, you know, we've all seen it
14 in the news where they go back to the training.
15 They've mentioned training of the officers on the
16 street as well. We as citizens cannot afford our taxes
17 to continue to rise because of the City continues with
18 a potential for inadequate training standards to save
19 money versus doing it properly because in the long run,
20 it costs us all money and we do need to look forward to
21 the future of our city post bankruptcy, especially at
22 this time that we do everything as prudently and wisely
23 for the betterment of our city and the betterment of
24 our citizens.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ma'am?

1 MS. SKLAR: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your two minutes is up.
3 At this time, I'm going to ask, is there anybody from
4 here, from training that can speak to the dispatchers
5 training from the department?

6 D.C. LeVALLEY: We have Director Flemming
7 from communication.

8 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: I'm here. I represent
9 communications. This is a structured training.
10 Director James Flemming. Yes. We have an approved
11 structured training process that's been taught by our
12 Detroit Police Academy and also by inhouse dispatching
13 professionals. I don't know where she got her
14 information. I'm assuming you're Jeff Sklar's wife?

15 MS. SKLAR: Yes, I am.

16 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Okay. So that's an
17 inhouse complaint. So we have tried and proved methods
18 of teaching our new emergency service deployment
19 officers. I don't know exactly what her complaint is.

20 MS. SKLAR: I don't have a complaint. I'm
21 just speaking to the fact that we don't have a formal
22 training program in place right now at dispatch. We do
23 not.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you. Are
25 there any other comments?

1 MS. FRASER: Yes. My name is Jan Fraser.
2 I'm a Detroit resident, lifelong Detroit resident, and
3 I'm very upset about -- well first, I think we all are
4 aware of the 11-year-old who accidentally, I guess, shot
5 his three-year-old cousin about a week and a half ago.
6 So I was shopping in my local grocery store the very
7 next day, and I live in Russell Woods,
8 Livernois/Davison area, and what do I see on the shelf
9 but a gun packaged with candy for children right at the
10 checkout, eye level to where children see this and
11 mommy, you know, like the gum and the other, the candy
12 for sale. So, of course, I was very incensed.

13 So I immediately went to the store owner who
14 knows me because I'm in there often. Oh, you're right,
15 you're right. I will take it off. Well, he didn't,
16 because the next day I went back and it was there. He
17 hadn't removed it.

18 So then I put together a memo and challenged
19 WDIV TV to do a story on this. And as it turned out,
20 they did last Friday. I was on the news. My husband
21 and I were on the news. But what kind of message are
22 we sending the children packaging candy with a gun.
23 And I don't know about guns, but I'm told this looks
24 like a 9 millimeter or whatever. I mean somebody
25 could, you know -- in other words, a child playing with

1 candy and to associated this with a gun. This is
2 madness. What is this world coming to?

3 Now I have to admit, even after it was on the
4 news, the comments, you know, how you get a string of
5 comments from people from all over, I mean some people
6 talk about oh, this woman needs to be pistol whipped
7 because, you know, what she saying? Guns are a part of
8 society. But I think that's one of the problems,
9 because when you are selling candy. Now, the
10 distributor says that he's not going to discontinue
11 selling it. He's in Oak Park. He happens to be --
12 done our research. He lives in West Bloomfield. Now I
13 bet this is not on the shelves of stores in West
14 Bloomfield. But, you know, when young black males and
15 females, particularly males, get this when they're
16 three, four, five, six years old with candy, probably
17 put it in their mouth, no telling what's going on. If
18 they had this and an officer was to see even me walk
19 out right up here on Moross with this in my hand, I
20 might be shot and killed. So I just think something
21 needs to be done.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you for your
23 comments, ma'am.

24 MS. FRASER: What kind of message. This
25 world is just coming -- it's crazy.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other
2 comments?

3 MS. YANCEY: As parents, we do have the
4 responsibility of not allowing --

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Excuse me. If you want
6 to make a comment, ma'am, step up to the mic.

7 MS. FRASER: I agree with her. She's saying
8 as parents, yes. It's an issue if a parent buys it.
9 It's an issue if a store sells it, but it's really more
10 of an issue that it's packaged and merchandised.
11 That's the problem. You understand, if they didn't
12 package and merchandise it particularly to inner city
13 black kids, then it wouldn't be a problem. That's the
14 point.

15 MS. YANCEY: I do agree with that. But then
16 as --

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Excuse me. Give your
18 name for the record and limit your comments to two
19 minutes, please.

20 MS. YANCEY: Loretta Yancy.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

22 MS. YANCEY: You're right, absolutely right.
23 I mean my son now is 49, but I remember never
24 purchasing guns, never allowing him to play with guns,
25 not bring it in my house, not to play with. There are

1 other things that you can teach your kids to play with
2 like reading, math, building, the things that build,
3 those blocks and stuff like that, something that's
4 challenging. And today, we got technology, computers.
5 So I don't know what to say about that, but it was
6 depressing to hear about 11-year-old being charged as
7 an adult. I mean, you know, that's crazy to me.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It was and it is. And
9 your two minutes is up, ma'am. Thank you.

10 MS. FRASER: Guns are not toys. Guns are not
11 toys. And this is merchandised as a toy.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It is merchandise as a
13 toy, and as a parent, we have to take responsibility
14 for what we buy our kids and it's on -- the onus is on
15 the parents.

16 MS. FRASER: No, it's on the person that
17 merchandise.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's on the parents
19 because the seller is going to sell what they can sell,
20 but as a parent, you can't bring it in my house. And
21 you're not going to bring it in my house so I think
22 that the onus is on the parents.

23 MS. FRASER: Well, to some degree, but she's
24 correct about purchasing. He can't put it on the shelf
25 if we're not buying it.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That's true.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Pardon me. Through
3 the Chair. Also the onus is on the community --

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: True.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- to engage in some
6 activism. And Ms. Fraser, when you get ready to march
7 on the store, call me. I'm just saying if, you know,
8 if you organize and there's some activism, I can
9 guarantee you, he'll take it off the shelf in 24 hours.

10 MS. FRASER: Commissioner Crawford, let me
11 say, because WDIV went to the store, it was removed
12 immediately. But my thing is maybe we need to march on
13 the home of the man that lives in West Bloomfield that
14 merchandises and sells this. That's the point.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Call me, Ms. Fraser.
16 You know we have a history of that.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Are there any other
18 comments?

19 COMMANDER MAYOR: Commander Elvin Barren,
20 Detroit Police Department. And I want to elaborate on
21 this a little bit further. More than -- I think the
22 vision is broader than just parents. Here's why. This
23 can be bought by a kid, I take it, and kids can walk in
24 there and buy this. So parents may not know. You take
25 this little orange tip off, this is a 22 to us. Don't

1 let it be at nighttime. And we're explaining to the
2 community how that teen or young adult was killed
3 because they pointed it at an officer or at a
4 bystander. So let's think a little broader. This is a
5 very serious issue and I think we need to address it.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other comments? Any
7 other comments?

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.
9 Only because this came before the Board last week and
10 Chief Investigator's not here today, but Mr. Munger
11 walked into our meeting and he was quite adamant last
12 week about filing a complaint about an issue over a
13 traffic stop. That issue was covered in the media by
14 all three networks. The appearance in the video was
15 the officer was very professional, and I must commend
16 him for that, and the appearance of Mr. Mungo appeared
17 to be disorderly. But the issue I have, and it was
18 reported in the media, and I don't know if it was true
19 that it was 26 minutes of the video that was missing
20 beginning of the video, and I do know that currently
21 and in recent years, police, some of them, I call the
22 video police, have always complained about citizens who
23 turn their cell phones on and video police when they're
24 engaging in some action in the street. And the
25 question is, when did they turn that cell phone on.

1 And the issue when there is some video missing, whether
2 it's technical difficulty or malfunction, etcetera. As
3 a matter of fact, at that meeting last week, some 45
4 minutes, Assistant Chief White with some assistance
5 from attorney Washington did a presentation on where
6 we -- where the department was on body cams which,
7 again, this is the second year. We're still into our
8 completing our second pilot program. And so if there
9 ever was an urgency in acquiring body cams and having
10 complete video, now's the time.

11 So I just want to make those comments because
12 it is -- and those in the community are asking
13 questions too, even though, like I said, what we saw is
14 what we saw. But is what we didn't see is I guess one
15 may want to question as to why it was 26 minutes
16 missing. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. That's still
18 being reviewed by the OICs office.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Are there any other
21 comments? Any other comments?

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: If there's no other
23 comments, I'd just like to acknowledge other members of
24 the 5th precinct. Would you please stand. Thank you
25 for your attendance and your involvement and your

1 commitment. And I saw also NPO Officer King in the
2 back. I just want to acknowledge him for his
3 involvement. He's one of the mainstay in this area
4 too. NPO King. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Are there
6 any other comments? If there are no other comments,
7 I'll entertain a motion for adjournment.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So moved and supported.
11 Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed. Meeting
14 is adjourned. Thank you all for coming out this
15 evening.
