4 (The Chair called to order and  
5 Bishop Edgar Vann did the invocation)

6 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Yes?

7 Yes. At this time, I'm going to ask that  
8 each commissioner introduce themselves, beginning with  
9 Commissioner Shelby.

10 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner  
11 Richard Shelby, District 1.

12 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Commissioner Vann,  
13 District 2.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner  
15 Reginald Crawford, District 3. And I'd like to welcome  
16 everyone to the meeting this evening, the commission  
17 meeting.

18 District 3, I'm your commissioner. Also, two  
19 districts comprise of the -- District 3 is comprised of  
20 the 11th Precinct and also the 9th Precinct. And I  
21 presume most are here from the 11th Precinct tonight.  
22 But I'd just like to welcome, a personal welcome  
23 extended from me. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Police Commissioner  
25 Willie Burton, District 5.

1 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Commissioner Willie Bell,  
2 District 4.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening. Police  
4 Commissioner Ricardo Moore, District 7 that comprises  
5 of the 2nd Precinct, the 6th Precinct and the  
6 10th Precinct.

7 Commander Brian Mounsey, Commander  
8 Aric Tosqui, Captain Tiffany Stewart and Commander  
9 Nick Kyriacou -- excuse me -- along with Captain  
10 Elaine Miles make up the cadre for the 7th District.  
11 Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I'm Commissioner  
13 Derrick Sanders, appointed.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
15 Commissioners. And, as I said, I'm Lisa Carter. I  
16 represent District 6. At this time, I'm going to --  
17 I'd like to introduce the Assistant Chief,  
18 Steve Dolunt, who's sitting in for the Chief.

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Hi. The Chief  
20 couldn't be here because he's at the Mayor's meeting at  
21 the DIA.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you.

23 Ms. Bernard, would you introduce the rest of  
24 the staff, please.

25 MS. BERNARD: Yes. Yes, Madam Chairperson.

1 First of all, you do have a quorum of eight for this  
2 meeting. The staff that are present are  
3 Ms. Pamela Davis Drake, the Chief Investigator, sitting  
4 right there in front; Mr. Robert Brown, to my immediate  
5 right, the Administrative Assistant.

6 Our recorders for today are  
7 Sergeant Alan Quinn and Mona Storm is your court  
8 reporter from Hanson Court Reporting Services.

9 That completes our introductions, Madam  
10 Chairperson.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Assistant  
12 Chief Dolunt, could you please introduce any staff that  
13 you have here, please.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Well -- okay. Quinn  
15 has already been introduced. So we have -- who's over  
16 there? Commander Mahone, Captain Stewart. Oh, sorry.  
17 Let them stand. Okay. Tiffany, do you want to stand?

18 No? Okay. Tosqui? Close enough.

19 Captain Worboys, Commander Pritchett. I  
20 can't -- okay. Captain Chambers, Captain Decker,  
21 Commander Mounsey -- okay.

22 I didn't call you yet, Johnny.

23 Commander Thomas, soon to be Lieutenant,  
24 Deputy Chief Fitzgerald, Captain Fitzgerald and  
25 Lieutenant Lockhart -- am I good? Oh, Captain Sroka

1 wants to sit by himself over there.

2 And then you're going to introduce your MPOs  
3 in your Community Relations, when you get up, correct?

4 Okay. I'm good.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right. Thank you.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Thanks.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'd like to also thank  
8 Media Services for being here today. Thank you all for  
9 doing the service that you do and being here on time.

10 At this time, I'm going to -- I'd like to  
11 thank Commissioner -- or Bishop Vann for accommodations  
12 here today.

13 And, if you'd like to do a welcome, sir,  
14 please, do so.

15 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: I'm just delighted  
16 to have the Commission here tonight, my colleagues and  
17 friends. And, of course, the members of the department  
18 here tonight, also, I consider my colleagues and  
19 friends. Thank you very much for coming and sharing  
20 here. My doors are always open, as you well know, to  
21 the community for whatever purpose. And I am just  
22 delighted to -- to host you tonight. And, if there's  
23 anything that we could do to make tonight a more  
24 pleasurable experience for you, please let us know.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right.

1 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
3 Commissioner Vann. And thank you for the scrumptious  
4 meal. Sorry that I was late but traffic was horrible  
5 on 75. So I appreciate anybody that was here on time.  
6 At this time, Commissioners, you have before you the  
7 agenda for Thursday, April 14th. Is there a motion to  
8 approve the agenda?

9 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Motion to approve.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
12 supported that we approve the agenda for Thursday,  
13 April 14th. Is there any discussion?

14 Those in favor?

15 THE COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

17 The motion carries.

18 Before you, Commissioners, you have the  
19 minutes from Thursday, April 7, 2016. Is there a  
20 motion to approve the minutes?

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So move.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Support.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
24 supported that we approve the minutes from Thursday,  
25 April 17th (sic). Is there any discussion?



1 Those in favor?

2 THE COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

4 Motion carries.

5 At this time, I don't really have anything to  
6 report for this week. From this week to last week,  
7 it's been a pretty quiet week. So I'm going to move  
8 forward to the presentation from Assistant Chief  
9 Dolunt.

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Oh.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And --

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: On Captain  
13 Fitzgerald?

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay. So, just real  
16 quick, to give you a recap of our crime, our homicides  
17 are down seven -- excuse me, eleven percent from last  
18 year and non-fatal shootings are slightly up. So, when  
19 you compare all those shootings together, I believe we  
20 were up --

21 Was it five, Chuck, or seven?

22 SERGEANT SPRUCE: Seven.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Seven total. So our  
24 homicide rate, you know, it's too many but it's down.  
25 Non-fatals are slightly up but they've been trending

1 downward, knock on wood. Our carjackings are down in  
2 double digits, I believe, and our robberies are also  
3 down.

4 We've made some good arrests this week. The  
5 Command -- new Command staff, Commanders and Captains,  
6 they've done a good job. And I think we're moving in  
7 the right direction. We had an uneventful opening day.  
8 We've had several protests in the last couple days that  
9 we -- they've been peaceful and so we've been good  
10 there.

11 And the biggest thing we've had going, at  
12 least today, were two individuals that were -- made the  
13 mistake of going to the federal courthouse, open carry,  
14 and they didn't realize you couldn't go on federal  
15 property with guns. And one had a semi-automatic and  
16 the other one had an AR-15 strapped over his shoulder.  
17 And they had cameras on their head, saying that only  
18 agents of tyranny can carry guns. However, it would  
19 have worked out well for them if they hadn't gone to  
20 the federal courthouse, which is against the law.

21 So, other than that, we are doing okay. Oh,  
22 and just, if you do see someone with an open gun, we  
23 can't necessarily -- or excuse me -- a gun that's in a  
24 holster that's open carry, we can't arrest him, they  
25 have that right, so just be careful. Okay? I'm good.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes, ma'am.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Captain (sic), are, you  
4 coming forward to the -- yes, do your presentation.

5 LIEUTENANT LOCKHART: Good evening,  
6 everybody.

7 THE COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

8 LIEUTENANT LOCKHART: Good evening Board of  
9 Commissioners, good evening to the community and other  
10 members of the Detroit Police Department.

11 Unfortunately, Commander Lynch is out of town  
12 and couldn't -- couldn't attend today. However, I am  
13 very excited to introduce the new captain of the 11th  
14 Precinct.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your name, please.

16 LIEUTENANT LOCKHART: My name is  
17 Lieutenant Ron Lockhart.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you.

19 LIEUTENANT LOCKHART: I know the Board met  
20 her briefly last week as you guys approved the  
21 appointments but I would like to take the time to  
22 introduce her to the community.

23 Now, I've known her for 21 years. She comes  
24 from a strong law enforcement background. Her father  
25 was a decorated Detroit Police Officer for many years.

1 Her brother was a Detroit Police Officer for many  
2 years. But, most importantly, she is deeply committed  
3 to the citizens of the City of Detroit in making the  
4 11th Precinct a safer place for all citizens.

5 Captain Fitzgerald is going to give a  
6 presentation today followed by a presentation by  
7 Ms. Kim Jackson, who is head of our 11th Precinct  
8 Community Council.

9 At this time, I would like to turn it over to  
10 Captain Kelly Fitzgerald. Come on up.

11 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Good evening.

12 THE COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

13 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: So, like Lieutenant  
14 Lockhart just introduced me, my name is Captain  
15 Kelly Fitzgerald and I'm here today to present on  
16 behalf of the 11th Precinct. My Community Relations  
17 team is here, Sergeant Spruce, MPO Nichols,  
18 MPO Robinson and MPO Hill and they're responsible along  
19 with Miss Jackson for bringing the food and  
20 refreshments that are out there for the Board and  
21 community.

22 The 11th Precinct is located at 5100 Nevada.  
23 The Eleventh Precinct borders east Eight Mile from the  
24 north, John R to Conners, and bordering Hamtramck to  
25 Interstate 75 on the south.

1           The current manpower at the 11th Precinct is  
2           one commander; one captain; three lieutenants; one  
3           precinct detective lieutenant, for a total of four; ten  
4           sergeants; two sergeants assigned to the precinct  
5           detective unit, for a total of 12; and four detectives  
6           that are assigned to the precinct detective units.

7           There are currently 79 police officers and  
8           two additional police officers assigned to the PDU,  
9           Precinct Detective Unit, for a total of 81. We do have  
10          14 officers, though, that are assigned out through  
11          various commands in the City. So that makes a total of  
12          67 available officers at the 11th Precinct currently  
13          and we also have five civilians.

14          The current average response time for the  
15          11th Precinct is eight to eleven minutes. Our average  
16          number of priority one runs is 16 per day. And our  
17          average arrests per month are as follows:

18          We average 60 adult felonies, 35 adult  
19          misdemeanor arrests, 14 juvenile felony arrests and 8  
20          juvenile misdemeanor arrests.

21          When we are in need of assistance at the 11th  
22          Precinct, we request manpower from the Traffic  
23          Enforcement Unit, otherwise known as TEU; the Tactical  
24          Response Unit, otherwise known as TRU, T-R-U; and then  
25          the newly-created -- which Commander Leach created this

1 back in January -- the East Side Back force, otherwise  
2 known as EBF.

3 The EBF operates on the east side of the City  
4 on Fridays and Saturdays from 7:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m.  
5 and they're an available extra unit in each precinct on  
6 the east side as the need arises for additional  
7 support.

8 Going forward, the following operations are  
9 being implemented in order to reduce part-one crimes:

10 The Precinct Detective Unit is conducting  
11 warrant sweeps in collaboration with our Special  
12 Operations Unit. Operation Border Patrol is initiative  
13 organized with the 12th Precinct to eradicate  
14 prostitution from Six Mile to Eight Mile, John R and  
15 Woodward.

16 Operation Borderline which consists of the  
17 11th and 7th Precinct Special Operations Units, they  
18 work together to focus on priority-one runs, mainly  
19 aggravated assaults, stolen vehicles and carjackings  
20 within those precinct borders.

21 The 11th Precinct Monthly Restore Order; that  
22 consists of the 11th Precinct Special Ops working in  
23 conjunction with our Precinct Detective Units and  
24 Traffic Enforcement; and that's to identify and  
25 apprehend individuals on the Detroit One List.

1                   The Detroit One List is a list of  
2                   priority-one offenders. And that list is established  
3                   in collaboration with state, local and federal law  
4                   enforcement.

5                   The East Side Operation Restore Order is an  
6                   operation that includes the 7th, 11th, 5th and 9th  
7                   Precincts and we come together and we conduct warrant  
8                   sweeps for known one offenders.

9                   And then, lastly, the Chief's Initiative  
10                  Operation Restore Order. And this is where various  
11                  precincts -- and you've probably seen some of it on TV,  
12                  it's been televised. Various precincts and specialized  
13                  units come together and they execute search warrants  
14                  and arrest warrants; arrest warrants for homicide,  
15                  aggravated assault and known drug offenders and then  
16                  search warrants at known drug locations. And this is a  
17                  data-driven operation in the high crime areas.

18                  The 11th Precinct personnel will continue to  
19                  team up with members throughout the Department as well  
20                  as the community to bring peace to our neighborhoods,  
21                  while maintaining professionalism and high morale  
22                  amongst our troops through all obstacles.

23                  At this time, I'd like to introduce you to my  
24                  new best friend, Kimberly Jackson.

25                  MS. JACKSON: Good evening, Board. My name

1 is Kim Jackson and I'm the President over at Number 11  
2 for the Police Community Relations Council. And I just  
3 have a brief presentation. And each one of you have in  
4 front of you a packet. And in that packet includes the  
5 presentation for tonight. It also includes our  
6 calendar for our community meetings until the end of  
7 the year. We also have a map of the 11th Precinct's  
8 scout area and we also have our calendar of events from  
9 January through December. And, of course, they may  
10 change but we have what we have in here so far.

11 As you guys know, our Commander's  
12 Timothy Leach and we have a newly-appointed Captain,  
13 which is Kelly Fitzgerald.

14 Thank you, Kelly, and welcome.

15 The 11th Precinct covers approximately 18  
16 square miles and we have a list of our boundaries,  
17 which Captain already have (sic) already gone over so I  
18 won't read them again.

19 The 11th Precinct Community Relations  
20 Officers, of course, are Sergeant Spruce, Officer  
21 N. Black and then we have our MPOs, Officer D. Nichols,  
22 Officer E. Hill and then Officer D. Robinson.

23 Our community meetings are every second  
24 Tuesday of the month at 6:00, at the station, which is  
25 5100 East Nevada.



1           According to the 2014 Winter Motor City  
2 Mappings, we have 17,300 homes in our area that are  
3 actually occupied. According to the City's open data  
4 portal, there are 700 homes that have been demolished  
5 in our -- in the 11th Precinct. We've 495 homes judged  
6 as vacant.

7           Currently, we have five recreation parks in  
8 our area. And they are Evans Recreation Center, we  
9 have Lasky Recreation Center, we have Lipsky Recreation  
10 Center, we have Farwell and now we have a new one,  
11 Galilee Community -- Community Recreation Center.

12           As of 4-6 of 2016, we have 24 active parks in  
13 our area and we have 12 nonactive parks.

14           We have a community events that kind of  
15 kicked off in the month of February. We had a  
16 Valentine's Day dance. We had a wonderful Appreciation  
17 Luncheon for our businesses and for our communities.

18           And then March 26th, we did an Easter egg  
19 hunt. We, approximately, had about 150 to 200 kids  
20 that participated in our event.

21           We're also going to do this year something a  
22 little different and we would like to do a  
23 beautification contest in the 11th Precinct. And what  
24 we're doing is we're going to have either block clubs,  
25 community groups, to volunteer and pick a section of

1 the 11th Precinct and beautify it. And then, July the  
2 9th, we're going to judge that. And then we'll have  
3 three winners of the contest that won -- of the people  
4 that participated.

5 Police week, of course, is May 9th through  
6 the 13th. Every first Saturday, from April until  
7 September, we have a conversation with the Commander  
8 and it is at various locations. And those are listed  
9 on our calendar as well.

10 Every third Wednesday, from April to October,  
11 we have Bingo at the station from 5:00 to 7:00.

12 Every Thursday from June through September we  
13 do a movie day for the families in our community.

14 And then, in July, we have a family day.

15 August, we're doing a national night out and  
16 we also have a back-to-school health fair and rally  
17 this year.

18 We also do the TriCounty Seniors Zoo Day.  
19 This year we're going to do a police military ball at  
20 the Light Guard Armory, and there will be more details  
21 to follow.

22 We will do our -- in November, we'll do our  
23 Veterans Day parade and luncheon. We had a wonderful  
24 turnout last year and we're expecting a bigger turnout  
25 this year.

1                   And then, at the Eleventh Precinct, we also  
2 do a community relations holiday party for the  
3 community, and that's from the Board.

4                   And are there any questions?

5                   CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Before you get to  
6 questions --

7                   Captain Fitzgerald, can you come back and  
8 join?

9                   Commissioners, do you have any questions for  
10 Captain Fitzgerald or Ms. Jones?

11                  CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Jackson.

12                  COMMISSIONER MOORE: Jackson.

13                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Jackson?

14                  CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Yes.

15                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm sorry. Ms. Jackson.

16                  COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, I  
17 just want to commend them. I like the combination of  
18 the community and police --

19                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I do, too.

20                  COMMISSIONER MOORE: -- tag team. And that  
21 was great.

22                  CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Thank you.

23                  COMMISSIONER MOORE: And that's what it's  
24 about, ultimately.

25                  CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: I do have to say there

1 must be a misprint. Police Week is not -- it's the  
2 week of May 16th. Remember, it was moved.

3 MS. JACKSON: Well, I was told it was changed  
4 again back --

5 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Back to the 9th. Okay.  
6 Well, does anyone.

7 Bosses, do you know?

8 MS. JACKSON: I'm just the middleman here.

9 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: The 9th? Okay. Then  
10 it's the 9th. Okay.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?  
12 Commissioner Bell?

13 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Do you know?

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: He's still trying to --

15 SERGEANT SPRUCE: I'm Sergeant  
16 Charles Spruce. I went on the website. The main date  
17 when it's in it is on the 15th. So starting the week  
18 of the 9th --

19 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: It is on the 9th.

20 SERGEANT SPRUCE -- they're going to starting  
21 having the events --

22 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Okay.

23 SERGEANT SPRUCE: And then it goes through  
24 the 15th.

25 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Through Sunday. Okay.

1                   VICE-CHAIR BELL: Madam Chair, I just want to  
2 say that you continue the tradition of the 11th  
3 Precinct Police Community Relations. And I had an  
4 opportunity to be assigned there. I think, at the  
5 time, that Commissioner Moore and one of my rookie  
6 officers, Officer Robinson, is a part of your community  
7 team. He was a rookie officer and do (sic) an  
8 outstanding job.

9                   I just want to say that 11th Precinct's  
10 already there. Their community group is a little ahead  
11 and above others. And see how organized they are in  
12 terms of their platform from the Veteran's Day and all  
13 activities that you engage. And I have attended at  
14 least one or two of your meetings. And I want to get  
15 back because I'm just impressed with what's going on  
16 there.

17                   And I just want to thank you for your  
18 involvement. And I would hope that we can share some  
19 of that experience and knowledge with other police  
20 community relation groups in the City. Because I think  
21 you are a classic model.

22                   I know that we have the 12th Precinct on the  
23 west side but I think you are the model on the east  
24 side of Detroit and I just want to lift you up, in  
25 terms of --

1 Captain, you've always --

2 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: I am blessed.

3 VICE-CHAIR BELL: You've got a good  
4 assignment.

5 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Yes, I do.

6 VICE-CHAIR BELL: You've got a great  
7 Commander, you've got a great community leader.

8 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Yes.

9 VICE-CHAIR BELL: You can't fail.

10 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: That was on Tuesday we  
11 had our community meeting --

12 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Right.

13 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: -- and it was amazing;  
14 the turnout that we had.

15 VICE-CHAIR BELL: So I just want to -- keep  
16 up the good work.

17 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Thank you.

18 VICE-CHAIR BELL: And thank you for the  
19 hospitality. Because we always get hospitality when we  
20 come to this part of the City --

21 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: We try.

22 VICE-CHAIR BELL: -- in terms of the 11th  
23 Precinct. And I just want to -- I know you work with  
24 the seniors extensively and you work with the young  
25 people. So it's a blessing to have that type of

1 interaction. Thank you, again.

2 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

4 Commissioners, any other questions?

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

6 Also, thank you, Captain. And thank you,

7 Ms. Jackson --

8 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Jackson.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- correct?

10 Yes. I would like to echo some of the same  
11 sentiments as Commissioner Bell. Also, to -- well,  
12 this is the 3rd District, Commissioner Bell, the 11th  
13 Precinct, so they have been busy.

14 But I just want to say thank you for the work  
15 you've done. And everything I've heard throughout the  
16 community, it's been great.

17 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Particularly that  
19 Veteran's Day parade last year was really something.  
20 So thank you.

21 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,  
23 Commissioners?

24 Thank you.

25 CAPTAIN FITZGERALD: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time, are there  
2 any standing committee reports?

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair, I do have a  
4 question in regards to the Personnel and Training  
5 Committee. Maybe you can assist me with it. The board  
6 secretary position, do we know how that process is  
7 coming along or how many candidates have applied for  
8 that position?

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I don't know exactly how  
10 many have applied. We -- the recommendation -- and I  
11 wasn't there when we -- did we do a resolution?

12 I wasn't there when we did the resolution.  
13 But TJ -- TA Staffing is going to recommend five  
14 candidates and they've started on it. And then the  
15 Department of Human Resources has -- I don't know how  
16 many candidates they had to apply but they are going to  
17 submit a list of five candidates, I believe, tomorrow  
18 to the personnel committee for review.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Thank you, ma'am.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You're welcome.

21 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes?

23 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: What's the closing  
24 date for that application process?

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I am not certain of the



1 closing date but I believe, with the Department of  
2 Human Resources, it's closed because she's going to  
3 submit the final five tomorrow. They've done telephone  
4 interviews and they're going to submit the list of five  
5 candidates that they're recommending to us tomorrow.

6 Any other questions?

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes?

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I think we've had a  
10 little bit of confusion with regard to the proprietary  
11 source of -- of where people were supposed to send in  
12 resumes, et cetera. Was that ever straightened out?  
13 Because I think there was some confusion with that.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: There was some  
15 confusion. There is some confusion because the posting  
16 was posted before Director Oxendine went on vacation.  
17 And there was a listing -- so we decided to use both of  
18 them. And, before Director Oxendine went on vacation,  
19 the position was posted. And TA Staffing was not  
20 advised until, I think, a week later. So that's why it  
21 was a different posting time.

22 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: So what are we  
23 doing to ameliorate the confusion so that persons who  
24 may have applied to the agency, thinking that they  
25 still have an opportunity when you're saying that the

1 Director of Personnel has already closed it?

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The posting for the  
3 City, I believe, is closed on the Human -- the  
4 Detroit -- City of Detroit website; I believe that  
5 that's closed. TA Staffing is doing their own search.  
6 So they're independent. But, in the end, we'll get,  
7 like, ten candidates to choose from.

8 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Kind of like  
9 Commissioner Burton, we weren't informed. We were not  
10 informed of the time that it would be open and the time  
11 that it would be closed.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I actually did not know  
13 when it was posted because I was not advised of that.

14 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: So my question is,  
15 how can it being closed if we were not informed?

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That would be a question  
17 for Director Oxendine. And we'll have her here this --  
18 next week.

19 VICE-CHAIR BELL: I think the Chair of the  
20 Personnel Committee, Commissioner Dewaelsche, is going  
21 to have a conference call with the Personnel Committee  
22 to address those concerns.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Right, tomorrow.

24 VICE-CHAIR BELL: And that we are -- it's  
25 going to have that type of dialogue. And hopefully we

1 can get some closure on this matter, in terms of those  
2 concerns in, as you well know, communicating that with  
3 the Chair of the Personnel Committee.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, may  
5 I ask, why are we using two different services, TJA  
6 Staffing and we're using the Department's Human  
7 Resources? Why are we using the two? Can Gail  
8 Oxendine, the HR Director -- is she capable of doing  
9 the job? I think she's doing a great job. So why are  
10 we using two services? Why this body is not being  
11 (sic) properly informed? Have we voted on another  
12 service?

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I believe it was voted  
14 on. I wasn't here that week but it was voted on.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Do you believe or do  
16 you know or -- because we're on TV.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I know we're on TV.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So we're using two  
19 services here?

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It was voted on. It was  
21 recommended by the Personnel Committee and it was voted  
22 on.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you provide that  
24 information for the rest of the Board?

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: What, when it was voted

1 on?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Or maybe Attorney Linda  
3 Bernard can provide that.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm sure she can.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But why are we using  
6 two services? Why are we using -- why are we not  
7 sticking with HR Director Gail Oxendine?

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I think that --

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Why are we bringing in  
10 an independent --

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The general --

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- that people are  
13 submitting their resumes to two different --

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Um-hmm.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So -- well, that  
16 creates some type of confusion.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The recommendation was  
18 that -- so that we'll be able to go -- TA Staffing and  
19 Associates -- or Staffing, they've done national  
20 searches and I think that we wanted to reach a broader  
21 audience of candidates or a pool of candidates to  
22 choose from. And so that's why the TA Staffing was  
23 selected.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But we -- Madam Chair,  
25 I hate to bring this back and forth. But we were not

1 informed. This is the first time I'm really hearing  
2 about this, that I recall.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I believe that it was  
4 passed --

5 Two weeks ago?

6 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Madam Chair, I can speak to  
7 that.

8 The Chair -- Commissioner Dewaelsche  
9 communicated to the Personnel Committee and she  
10 communicated to the entire Board in reference to the  
11 rationale, an explanation to this process. It's  
12 something that we will be reporting out, perhaps next  
13 week. But we are going to reconvene. The Chair is not  
14 here at this time.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Right.

16 VICE-CHAIR BELL: But everybody is fully  
17 aware that they want to do a national search, it's not  
18 a local search. And the staffing company utilizes --  
19 it's no cost to the Board. And that was another issue  
20 that -- and they conducted the search for the Chief of  
21 Police and they have a wealth of experience in that  
22 particular area. So we want to do a national search.  
23 So that's where we are today. And we will be reporting  
24 out to the full board.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And you are a part of

1 the personnel?

2 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Yes, ma'am. And Bishop  
3 Vann is part of the process, too.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through -- through the  
5 Chair, may I add, we as the Board, we just recently  
6 appointed Gail Oxendine to stay on for another two  
7 years as HR Director. I think she's doing a fine job  
8 in that capacity. But why are we bringing on another  
9 independent agency that you mentioned that are doing it  
10 pro bono, or for free, we know -- you know, when we  
11 actually have someone that's capable of doing the job  
12 in-house?

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: As Commissioner Bell  
14 said, we wanted to do a national search and TA Staffing  
15 was a -- was able to do that.

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair?

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Crawford?

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: For the sake of  
19 clarity, closed or open, next week, perhaps, we can get  
20 back with the Board --

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Absolutely.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- and maybe leave  
23 the process open. Because now we -- as of this night,  
24 from this conversation, I gather that we have two  
25 entities here where people are submitting resumes for

1 this position.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yeah.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So we can just pull  
4 it all together, perhaps, next week --

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Absolutely.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- and come back to  
7 the Board --

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Have some clarity.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- with the --

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We'll have some clarity.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Because I -- also,  
14 too, I might add, too, I don't -- I don't -- and I do  
15 remember that there was the mentioning of using that  
16 company. But I don't recall a vote. And I do know,  
17 before -- or, again, going back with the bylaws of the  
18 Commission, which I think I stated last week, we need  
19 to -- everyone needs to refresh the -- needs to read  
20 them every once in a while, the Commission's bylaws,  
21 Open Meetings Act, City Charter, too, and adhere to  
22 that.

23 Even when it comes to entering into any type  
24 of contractual agreement, be it a gratuity or whatever,  
25 the entire Board has to -- or should vote on that.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Not just from the --  
3 the Personnel Committee, it should be the entire -- it  
4 comes out of the Personnel Committee but the entire  
5 Board should vote on it, even though it's done now.  
6 But what I'm saying is, next week, for some clarity,  
7 we'll just pull all this back together.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Um-hmm.

11 Any other questions or comments?

12 Okay. On to New Business, we have  
13 resolutions for Ms. Sherri Iskra -- Iskra?

14 MS. ISKRA: Iskra.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Iskra.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -- Iskra. Okay. If you  
17 would step up here, Ms. Iskra, and  
18 Commissioner Crawford is going to do the honors of  
19 presenting you.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: We have a "Resolution  
21 honoring Ms. Sherri Iskra.

22 Whereas Ms. Sherri Iskra has been an active  
23 volunteer in the 11th Precinct boundaries for the last  
24 26 years. She is the proud parent of three children;  
25 Lucas, 18, age 18; Mark, age 16; Emily, age 14.



1                   And whereas Ms. Iskra graduated from Chippewa  
2 Valley High School. Following graduation, she pursued  
3 her secondary education at the Michigan State  
4 University and graduated with a Bachelor's degree in  
5 Education in 1990.

6                   In 1990 she started working for a  
7 family-owned business, Leonard's Syrups, a beverage  
8 company located at 460 -- 460 (sic) Nancy, Detroit,  
9 Michigan, and is currently the vice-president of the  
10 company.

11                   And whereas Ms. Iskra is a member of the  
12 St. Thecia Catholic Church under the pastorate of  
13 Father Brian, where she serves on the School and Church  
14 Fundraising Committee, the Fashion Show Committee and  
15 is the secretary of the PTO of St. Thecia School.

16                   And whereas Ms. Iskra's community involvement  
17 with the 11th Precinct dates back to 2009, includes the  
18 11th Precinct's Annual Senior Valentine's Day dance,  
19 Police Week, Motor City Make Over, Annual Family Fun  
20 Day, Back to School Rally, National Night Out.

21 Ms. Iskra and Leonard's Syrups are the corporate  
22 sponsors for the 11th Precinct's Annual Veteran's Day  
23 Luncheon and Parade and the 11th Precinct Veteran's  
24 Reach Out (sic) Program.

25                   And whereas Ms. Iskra loves to volunteer and

1 help wherever she is needed. She is where (sic) every  
2 community leader hopes for -- what every community  
3 leader hopes for and more.

4 And now there it be (sic) resolved.

5 The Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
6 speaking for citizens of the City of Detroit and  
7 Detroit Police Department, acknowledges the generous  
8 spirit of Ms. Sherri Iskra. Her self -- unselfishness  
9 and dedication to improving the quality of life for all  
10 citizens in the community and throughout the City of  
11 Detroit merits our highest regard.

12 We thank you and congratulate you, Ms. Iskra.  
13 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners."

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: One more.

15 VICE-CHAIR BELL: One more coming.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay. We've got one  
17 more.

18 Well, you stay; you get to stay. I'm going  
19 to come back.

20 Okay. So he couldn't be here but this is a  
21 Certificate of Recognition from the Police Department.

22 Thanks. Anyway, this is from the Police  
23 Department, which the uniform gives it away. So it's  
24 an appreciation of your contribution, your involvement  
25 in the community and services in the City of Detroit,

1 demonstrates a spirit and commitment that is worthy of  
2 recognition. The Commissioner's right, without the  
3 family, you can't do this. I don't know how you do it.  
4 You're the vice-president of the company and  
5 everything, right?

6 MS. ISKRA: (Nods head.)

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: God love you. So --  
8 and thank you on behalf of everyone here for not only  
9 you but what everyone does in this community.

10 What are you laughing at?

11 So thank you. Now, do you want to take a  
12 picture? You're killing me, Quinn. No, the family.  
13 They're coming.

14 SERGEANT QUINN: We have one more.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: One more. Look at  
16 you, Quinn.

17 Okay. You're holding on. Hold on. She's  
18 right, you should be in the middle. She's taller than  
19 me. Just take the picture. You're killing me. Okay.  
20 Now the kids.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Now the kids, yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Now the family.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Now, the family,  
24 come on up. Do you want her in the middle again?  
25 You're so tall. Are you wearing heels? No, you're

1 not. Crap that's worse.

2 SERGEANT QUINN: Everybody look right here.  
3 Big smiles. Let's take another one. Okay. Let's see  
4 if everybody's eyes were open.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Are you good, Quinn?

6 SERGEANT QUINN: Yeah.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: He's a professional.  
8 Thanks. Thank you very much. Thanks. Thanks.

9 Quinn, get out of here.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We have a resolution for  
11 Reverend Nicholas Hood, Sr.

12 Commissioner Bell?

13 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Yes. We have a resolution  
14 in honor of Reverend Nicholas Hood, Sr. And he's a man  
15 of leadership, courage and conviction for many, many  
16 years. We should all know the history of Reverend  
17 Nicholas Hood, Sr. There have been quite a few  
18 writeups in reference to his departure this week.

19 I just want to lift him up in terms of the  
20 Board of Police Commission.

21 "Whereas, in 1958 he became the Senior  
22 Minister of Plymouth Congressional Church of Detroit,  
23 and respond (sic) to an urban renewal plan which would  
24 have excluded Black churches from the Detroit Medical  
25 Center Campus Area. He founded the fellowship of Urban

1 Renewal Churches, which was successful in electing a  
2 Mayor and City Council that granted black churches the  
3 right to maintain or relocate in the Medical Center  
4 Area."

5 And you should know Plymouth and Friendship  
6 Baptist church are still there, Shiloh Baptist Church  
7 and others.

8 "Reverend Hood was elected to Detroit City  
9 Council in 1965, the second African-American." And the  
10 first was William Patrick, if I recall. He was second.  
11 He always wanted to make that distinction; that he was  
12 not the first.

13 And he utilized a black architect to build  
14 this church on ten acres on the corner of St. Antoine  
15 and Warren" -- right across the street from Bethel and  
16 just up the street -- or down the street from  
17 Dr. Charles Wright Museum. You know the location.

18 And a rather unique experience, "Whereas, as  
19 a Councilman he opened the Detroit Fire Department to  
20 black recruits by drafting an ordinance that allowed  
21 black City employees to be transferred directly to the  
22 Fire Department without going through the normal  
23 process which was designed to exclude all but white  
24 applicants."

25 That's rather unique. You wonder how he was

1 able to integrate the firefighters, Detroit  
2 firefighters. He demonstrated, time and time again,  
3 his commitment, in 28 years of service, with some of  
4 the most distinguished City Council members, like  
5 Erma Henderson, Maryann Mahaffey, Senator Carl Levin, a  
6 State Senator -- a U.S. Senator, and he was a great  
7 supporter of our Mayor Coleman A. Young. They was  
8 connected at the hip, if you know what I mean, in terms  
9 of the City of Detroit.

10 He was a civil rights activist. He was  
11 founder -- one of the founders of SCLC, Southern  
12 Christian Leadership Council, with Dr. King. So you  
13 can see this involvement has been extensively. And he  
14 always related to, in the '60s, when he became Council  
15 Member, that black officers wanted to form the  
16 Guardians. And they was intimidated, in terms of just  
17 coming together because, at this time, the Department  
18 had eyes and ears in all activities. And you know  
19 about the Red File. But he allowed them to meet at his  
20 church. That was the type of commitment that he made.

21 And, as he fully-promoted the integration of  
22 the Police Department, in reference to affirmative  
23 action, which was challenged in Federal Court,  
24 confirmed as Constitution, an opinion by his good  
25 friend, Judge Damon Keith, and later was affirmed by

1 the U.S. Supreme Court.

2 Reverend Hood was a Christian minister, a  
3 Christian man, a gentle spirit, spoke softly but he  
4 carried a big stick.

5 And now, therefore be it resolved the Detroit  
6 Board of Police Commissioners recognizes and pays  
7 tribute to Reverend Nicholas Hood, Sr. as a drum major  
8 for justice in his legacy, and that of his  
9 distinguished family, through this Resolution of  
10 Tribute.

11 And, further, may Reverend Nicholas Hood, Sr.  
12 always be remembered as a leader and legendary public  
13 servant who made Detroit a better place by leading by  
14 example and fighting discrimination to ensure dignity  
15 and respect for African-American citizens and all  
16 humanity."

17 He had that type of love and commitment. And  
18 he would be funeralized (sic) on a home-going with  
19 the -- this Saturday at 2:00 at Plymouth United Church  
20 of Christ, 600 East Warren. And I appreciate the  
21 support of DC Washington and AC Dolunt and Chief Craig,  
22 in terms of providing service to the funeral on Friday  
23 and Saturday evening.

24 And so the resolution is something that they  
25 (sic) not going to really -- you know, it's going to be

1 quite a few recognition and -- but they appreciate, in  
2 talking to his son, Reverend Nick, in terms of they  
3 would be mentioned in that format. But, as you well  
4 know, there's going to be a great deal of activities at  
5 church. And his -- one of the people -- a young man  
6 that he minister, in terms of a minister and also Civil  
7 Rights, Andy Young, would be here for Atlanta, who is  
8 the former Mayor of Atlanta. And you know his role  
9 with Dr. King.

10 Most people do not know about the history of  
11 Reverend Nicholas -- I call him Reverend Senior. But  
12 if you go to the website and you would Google, he was  
13 also, even in his 80s and 90s, a social media person.  
14 You can see his genealogy with his whole family. If  
15 you just Google his name, it will pop up.

16 He didn't want to write a book, he wanted to  
17 tell his story through Genealogy. And I see  
18 Mary Waters know the history, a lot of -- in terms of  
19 the Plymouth members.

20 But, basically, he was what I call one of  
21 those people who worked in the background but  
22 Bishop Vann would know his leadership and ministry  
23 movement, in terms of crucial. When he came here, I  
24 guess he recognized the need and got organized and got  
25 elected through the Council, after Mr. Patrick. And,



1           therefore, he continued to work. He was blessed to  
2           have longevity and passed it on to his son -- his  
3           daughter-in-law and to his son and grandkids.

4                        So I'm just thankful that the Board would be  
5           supportive in terms of passing this resolution, so I so  
6           move.

7                        COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Support it.

8                        COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Support.

9                        CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is that for both  
10          resolutions or what?

11                       COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Both.

12                       VICE-CHAIR BELL: Yes, both. I mean, Bishop  
13          Vann, you making the motion. She wanted to know about  
14          both resolutions.

15                       CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is it for both  
16          resolutions or one?

17                       COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: This is for both  
18          because we know --

19                       COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Both. Both  
20          resolutions.

21                       CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Is there any  
22          discussion?

23                       Those in favor?

24                       THE COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25                       CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

1 The motion carries.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair, I was  
3 remiss in my duties. On April 6th, 2016, I presented a  
4 resolution to the retiring Captain Harold Rochon, from  
5 the 2nd Precinct. I humbly ask this Board to accept  
6 that resolution in my error and in my haste. I'd like  
7 to put a motion on the floor for that.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
10 supported that we pass the resolution for Captain  
11 Harold Rochon in his retirement.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Correct.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Is there any  
14 discussion?

15 Those in favor?

16 THE COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

18 The motion carries.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Board.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any Old  
21 Business, Commissioners?

22 Under Announcements, the next Board of Police  
23 Commissioners meeting will be Thursday, April 21st at  
24 3:00 p.m. at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters,  
25 located at 1301 Third Street in the Michigan Room.

1                   Our next Board of Police Commissioners  
2                   Community meeting will be Thursday, May 12th, 2016th  
3                   (sic) in the 8th Precinct at the Harvest Christian  
4                   Church, located at 24440 West 7 Mile Road, two blocks  
5                   west of Telegraph.

6                   At this time, we'll have oral communications  
7                   from the audience. Please give your name and limit  
8                   your comments to two minutes, please.

9                   COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, prior to  
10                  the public comments, I just want to go on record and  
11                  have a request of the Chief.

12                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sure.

13                  COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: What was reported in  
14                  the media is that Ms. Luella Clark was arrested and it  
15                  was on -- it was in the local media the other day,  
16                  several days ago. It states, "Police mistakenly puts  
17                  an innocent grandmother behind bars in Detroit."

18                  If what was reported is accurate,  
19                  Ms. Clark -- it was some case, some 25 years ago. And  
20                  this is a case, basically, of mistaken identity. There  
21                  was a person arrested 25 years ago on a felony charge.  
22                  That person was prosecuted and acquitted on that  
23                  charge.

24                  Ms. Clark was picked up recently, similar  
25                  name, definitely not the same person, was retained for

1 three days in the Detroit Detention Center.  
2 Subsequently, they found out that she was not that  
3 person. Even though that case was -- was acquitted 25  
4 years ago, the warrant was still in the LEIN system,  
5 obviously, and that's what she was arrested on, that  
6 warrant.

7 I just ask that there's -- and I do  
8 realize -- I believe this occurred on a Friday. So I  
9 do understand sometimes things are closed over the  
10 weekend, such as, perhaps, the 25-year-old case. I do  
11 strongly suspect one would have to check the archives  
12 to find that information. But --

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Can I see that?

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I'm sorry. I wasn't  
16 familiar with it.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: It's just a --

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Well, still, it's  
19 bad; I agree with you.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And just that we  
21 check the system and perhaps maybe, if it's something  
22 that needs to be changed, perhaps bring about that  
23 change so that, perhaps, this may not occur again in  
24 the future. I do realize that, oftentimes -- well,  
25 sometimes, like I said, warrants are left in the system

1 and cases have been resolved and people still get  
2 picked up.

3 But, in this case, this was a 72-year-old  
4 grandmother. And, when she was arraigned, they told  
5 her she couldn't be around any children. And, for  
6 three weeks prior to going to court, she couldn't even  
7 see her grandchildren. So -- and that's just to make  
8 note that it -- it's so difficult. Even though this  
9 was not her but any young people who are arrested and  
10 charged and convicted of a felony, not this lady, but  
11 it's just so difficult to rise above that, not only in  
12 the City of Detroit but even across the country. There  
13 are certain things -- as a matter of fact, when this  
14 grandmother was arrested, she was seeking some social  
15 assistance.

16 And that's another thing: If you have a  
17 felony on your record, they automatically enter your  
18 name in the computer and that's how she was arrested,  
19 by the State Police, but, of course, turned over to  
20 Detroit because it was a -- I guess a Wayne  
21 County/Detroit case.

22 So I just ask if we check the system and if  
23 there's anything that needs to be done to, you know,  
24 correct some things or change some things, that the  
25 Detroit Police Department could do so.

1                   And I personally want to go on record and  
2                   offer her a formal apology for what has occurred.  
3                   So as a --

4                   ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I'll look into this.

5                   COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- as a Commissioner  
6                   and also a resident of the City of Detroit. And I'd  
7                   like to extend my heart-felt apologies for her  
8                   experience of several days in the Detroit Detention  
9                   Center. Thank you.

10                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Oral communications from  
11                  the audience?

12                  COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, before we  
13                  do oral communication, I want to acknowledge Former  
14                  State Representative Mary Waters.

15                  (Laughter from the audience.)

16                  COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, she's in my  
17                  district, so, you know.

18                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Oral communications from  
19                  the audience?

20                  Oral communications from the audience?

21                  Commissioners, is there a motion to adjourn?

22                  COMMISSIONER MOORE: I think we have one.

23                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Oh, okay.

24                  MR. REEVES: Good evening. Through the  
25                  Chair --

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening.

2 MR. REEVES: Good evening to the  
3 Commissioners. My name is Kenneth Reeves and I know  
4 summer is fast approaching, thank God. And one of the  
5 things that I brought to you guys' attention last year  
6 was about the slow roll, right?

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.

8 MR. REEVES: And I think there was some --  
9 there was some resolution to that, although I wasn't  
10 here to hear about it. Is there any one of you guys  
11 that can kind of bring me up to speed, what was the  
12 resolutions to that?

13 Because my concern basically was not so much  
14 the people doing -- you know, doing this, it was the  
15 use of resources from -- in terms of our officers.  
16 Because we just come out from under bankruptcy. And it  
17 was discovered, when I first brought this to attention,  
18 that these were on-duty officers that was escorting the  
19 cyclists, particularly through my neighborhood that  
20 particular day. And, you know, I understand that the  
21 Department has a -- has a moonlighting program if  
22 I'm -- if my memory serves me correct.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You mean secondary  
24 employment?

25 MR. REEVES: Secondary employment, yes. Yes.

1 Well, that's what one of your former Deputy  
2 Chiefs said, labeled it as such. But, you know, I --  
3 but, like I say, we're coming into the summer season  
4 now. And, you know, our concern as -- my concern, as a  
5 citizen -- not only, you know, as a citizen, as a  
6 tax-paying citizen is that our resources aren't being  
7 used properly. And that, if these people going to do  
8 this, they're going to come from suburban enclaves or  
9 wherever, to participate in this, I think that they  
10 should pay for the service.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you,  
12 Mr. Reeves.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Crawford?

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, Mr. Reeves, I do  
16 recall that conversation when you came before us.

17 MR. REEVES: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And I think, most  
19 importantly, the secondary employment was second  
20 because you were talking about the emergency  
21 situation -- or emergency situations that could arise  
22 from streets being shut down as those --

23 MR. REEVES: Particularly in neighborhoods.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- thousand, or a few  
25 thousand bike riders passed intersections. And I



1 believe your situation was getting EMS in and out of a  
2 situation. And I do recall the Assistant Chief was  
3 working on it. And I believe our -- the Department  
4 Attorney even had some input on it, if I recall. It's  
5 been some months.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Do you want to  
7 address it or not?

8 Sure.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Oh. And, by the way,  
10 the Assistant Chief is a biker, too, he's an avid  
11 biker.

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: He's not a biker,  
13 he's a cyclist.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Cyclist.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: There's a  
16 difference.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: There is a  
18 difference.

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I'd kill myself on a  
20 bike.

21 We are -- if I recall, we had a meeting with  
22 them, several times actually.

23 Oh, Assistant Chief Dolunt, through the  
24 Chair.

25 We had a meeting -- a couple meetings with

1           them. And I believe they did pay for a couple of  
2           secondary employment. They've agreed to stop --  
3           they've agreed to stop the open intoxicants and they're  
4           marshaling it better. I totally understand your  
5           plight. I -- I don't appreciate them driving through  
6           my neighborhood -- riding through my neighborhood with  
7           open alcohol. It does present concerns to me when  
8           officers are pulled away from their normal patrol and  
9           not being able to get EMS in and out, in a -- in a  
10          neighborhood.

11                         So we are working on that again this year.  
12          They were very receptive to our ideas last year. It  
13          has gotten huge. And I get the whole idea at first.  
14          But, to me, as a cyclist, I don't need a slow, slow  
15          roll. I mean, they're -- some people are practically  
16          going backwards. You've seen it. So I mean, it's a  
17          bicycle ride. I don't know, ride your bicycle. So  
18          we're on it, though. Okay? We got it. Thank you very  
19          much.

20                         COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And I might add  
21          they've already started their season, which is every  
22          Monday.

23                         Yes, sir?

24                         COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, can  
25          we turn away a unit? Actually, we sat together. Is

1 that -- I know years ago it would have been called  
2 tack-ops. Who actually puts the slow roll, the  
3 coordination on behalf of the Police Department  
4 together?

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Captain Petty's  
6 working with them on their route because they change  
7 the route every week is my understanding. And, also,  
8 Deputy Chief Hall has been intimately involved.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay.

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: She is out of town.  
11 She'll be back Saturday. And, trust me, on Monday  
12 morning we're going to talk about this.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: No problem.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, ma'am?

16 MS. McCANTS: Good evening.

17 THE COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

18 MS. McCANTS: My name is Yolanda McCants and  
19 I am in the 11 Precinct. And I just have a couple  
20 concerns, and I think I asked about it before. We used  
21 to have maintenance at the Precincts and I'm sure it's  
22 at all of them, not just mine. Are we -- can we get  
23 those people back, rather than having someone come  
24 every other day? Due to the fact that our officers and  
25 the community, for one thing to the other, is working

1 in the precincts every day, all day. And sometimes  
2 that -- the trash and the cleanliness is -- needs it  
3 more than every other day.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

5 MS. McCANTS: The next thing is we would like  
6 to have some services to have our heat and  
7 air-condition fixed because sometime it just get -- the  
8 heat in there gets overbearing and then, when it's cold  
9 in there, it's cold in there.

10 The third thing is we would like to also  
11 have -- or tell me what I have to do to have it done --  
12 is our sidewalk in front of our precinct because we  
13 don't want someone to fall and get injured.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay. Through the  
16 Chair, it's me again. So I will talk to Assistant  
17 Chief White, as far as fixing the sidewalk, heat and  
18 AC. And we do have a contract for a company to clean  
19 our building but apparently you're not satisfied with  
20 that. They're not doing a very good job, I'm guessing?

21 MS. McCANTS: They only come every other day.  
22 They don't come --

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay.

24 MS. McCANTS: We used to have an everyday  
25 person.

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I know we did and it  
2 used to be a police officer did it. And that's kind of  
3 counter-productive. If you carry a gun, you shouldn't  
4 also be cleaning the building. And that's how they did  
5 it.

6 MS. McCANTS: Okay.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: We used to have a  
8 building maintenance officer that replaced two, running  
9 cars back and forth. But, realistically, we can't do  
10 that anymore; it's not fair to the citizens to be  
11 paying a police officer to mop floors and run cars when  
12 they should be out in the street protecting you or  
13 serving you.

14 So I will check on the contract. I will talk  
15 to White about the other two things. And next Thursday  
16 you will have an answer to all three things. You know,  
17 three. What are you -- I have White's sitting here, I  
18 can't see you. Okay.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair --

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: -- I was just curious,  
22 did the Commander bring these issues up? Because he's  
23 there at the precinct 40 hours a week, plus. It would  
24 seem like the Commander would have brought these issues  
25 up on behalf of the officers and the citizens which

1 frequent the precinct.

2 So I'll reach out to Commander Leach. I'll  
3 see him this weekend and we'll have that conversation.  
4 But thank you, Ms. McCants.

5 MS. McCANTS: Don't get me in trouble.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: He's my fraternity  
7 brother, ma'am, he won't get in trouble over this  
8 issue.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So you'll see him  
10 before I see him.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Right.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: But I will talk to  
13 the Commander also. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other oral  
15 communications?

16 Any other oral communications?

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair --

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, ma'am. I just want  
20 to acknowledge Russ McClarkin is this the audience from  
21 Wendell Byrd's office, State Representative  
22 Wendell Byrd.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. All right. Thank  
24 you.

25 Any other oral communication?

1 Is there a motion to adjourn?  
2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So move.  
3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So move.  
4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
5 support that we adjourn.  
6 All in favor?  
7 THE COMMISSIONERS: Eye.  
8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?  
9 Meeting is adjourned. Thank you all for  
10 coming out this evening. Thank you.  
11 (Meeting was concluded at 7:34 p.m.)
