# It's Your Budget - Take Part! PUBLIC MEETING & ENGAGEMENT SUMMARY

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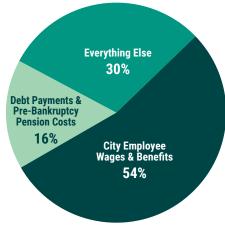
The Budget Office held nine public meetings throughout October 2022.

This flyer summarizes what was presented in those meetings.

The General Fund is the only fund in the City's budget with flexibility in how the money can be spent. The discretionary money in the General Fund is what was discussed in the public meetings. The General Fund is made up of 3 different spending categories:

- Wages & Benefits 54% of the General Fund goes towards supporting City employees
- **Debt & Pensions** 16% represents prior investments the City is obligated to pay off over time
- **Everything Else** 30% of the fund goes to support essential city services and has some flexibility in how this money can be spent

## Where does the General Fund money come from?

General Fund money comes from 5 major revenue sources:

- 1. Income tax
- 2. State revenue sharing
- 3. Wagering tax
- 4. Property tax
- 5. Utility users tax

## How does the City spend its money on each priority outcome?

The City categorizes how it spends General Fund money into 5 outcomes:

- 1. Efficient & Innovative Operations 44%
- 2. Safer Neighborhoods 35%
- 3. Economic Equity & Opportunity 10%
- 4. Effective Governance 5%
- 5. Vibrant & Beautiful City 4%
- 6. Not Yet Classified (Rainy Day Fund) 3%



#### What else should I know about the budget?

- The City of Detroit brings in millions of dollars every year in grant revenue to supplement the budget
- Schools, libraries, and state or county services are not funded through the City of Detroit's budget but through separate sources
