BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING  
January 23, 2025 at 3:00 P.M.

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3 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Good afternoon.  
4 The time is now 3:01 PM, and I would like to bring this  
5 meeting to order. We would like to have our invocation  
6 today by Commissioner Pressley.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Let us bow forward a prayer.  
8 God it is with grateful hearts that we have been blessed  
9 with another day. And on this day we've been met with  
10 your grace and your mercy. As we enter this meeting, God,  
11 we ask that your spirit of order will reign, God so that  
12 we might handle the business at hand. God, I pray that  
13 there might be an increase of wisdom and understanding  
14 that we might be led in a way that honors your leadership  
15 as well as the will for the residents of the city of  
16 Detroit. So, have your way this meeting. It's in your  
17 loving name we pray, amen.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Amen. Thank you so much,  
19 sir. Since we do not have a quorum we will go directly  
20 into our report from madam secretary. You do have your  
21 report?

22 MS. GARNIER: The report this week is for the Office  
23 of the Chief Investigator, the weekly inventory report,  
24 as noted. All under tab 5; the Budget Committee  
25 memorandum. There are no action items. So, the memorandum

1 is there for your review. And the announcements are as  
2 follows. The next board meeting is scheduled for next  
3 Thursday, January 30th, 3:00 PM. The location will be at  
4 the Laborers International Union, local 1191, which is  
5 located at 2161 West Grand Boulevard in Detroit. The next  
6 community meeting will be held Thursday, February 13th at  
7 6:30 PM and the location will be in the 11th Precinct at,  
8 say, (SAY), Detroit Place Center, which is located at  
9 19320 Van Dyke Avenue in Detroit, Michigan. And that ends  
10 the report for today. Madam Vice Chair.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Oh, thank you, ma'am. So,  
12 we'll now move into oral communications.

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Madam Chair. We have four  
14 speakers. Our first speaker will be Dr. Gordon. After Dr.  
15 Gordon, Minister Eric Blount, Fredia Butler, and Ms.  
16 Williams.

17 DR. GORDON: Hi. I came down here about the 1st of  
18 December, and complained about how the police came to two  
19 of my homes and posted this book of stuff on my doors  
20 about trespassing that I never did. But they caught  
21 members of Fisher Burns and several of people doing them  
22 a favor by putting this bull stuff on my door saying I've  
23 been on people's property, which is a lie. And then I  
24 come down here to tell the people about what happened to  
25 me. Then I guess to intimidate me further, I get a

1 letter, the same letter, and both addresses in the mail.  
2 Again, the same ones. I don't know why I have to be  
3 intimidated to be able to speak up when wrong has been  
4 done to me. Then I made a police complaint and the young  
5 man that called me never returned any of my phone calls  
6 when I tried to leave messages. He said that he would  
7 send me his email. I've never received it. And still  
8 today, I have not heard anything from this young man. And  
9 then, second of all, I'd like to know why, when I ask,  
10 when I call down to the police station, I don't get any  
11 return calls. I have several police complaints about  
12 citizens that harassed me, that have attacked me, and  
13 have gone nowhere. And I'd like to know; and I have asked  
14 for it to be in writing. Why hasn't the police report  
15 gone anywhere? And it said that it was my right to have  
16 it in writing. Why when I made a police report for  
17 harassment and other things, my property has been torn  
18 up; why these cases have gone anywhere. And I would like  
19 that in writing. And I was told it was my writing and I  
20 still today haven't received it in writing.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Ma'am, could you please  
22 address that? Do we have someone that could talk with  
23 her?

24 DC PRITCHETT: Excuse me. Through the Chair. What  
25 precinct are you referring to, ma'am?

1 DR. GORDON: The 7th Precinct.

2 DC PRITCHETT: I'll see you after this meeting. I'll  
3 get your number and I'll make sure that Commander Johnson  
4 has someone call you tomorrow.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay.

6 DR. GORDON: The police can call.

7 DC PRITCHETT: Well, we'll deal with that with  
8 Commander Johnson tomorrow, I'll make sure he calls you.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Go ahead.

10 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair, ma'am, one of my  
11 supervising investigators is here in the room this  
12 afternoon. Supervising Investigator Murphy; he's sitting  
13 right behind you. He can help you with your citizen  
14 complaint as well, and give you the information that you  
15 need and we'll make sure we'll follow up on the matter.  
16 In fact, I'll give you a call tomorrow as well.

17 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. And through the  
18 Chair, do you know the name of the individual from OCI  
19 who you said reached out to you but didn't follow up?

20 Okay. Well, if you can provide that name as well,  
21 you know, because we want to make sure you're getting  
22 proper feedback. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello, everyone. I'm sure we  
24 called the meeting to order. So, let's go to the  
25 introduction of commissioners, please.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present.

4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Present, District

5 4.

6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter is excused.

8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore is excused.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez is excused.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Present.

12 MS. GARNIER: We have 6 present, sir.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We have a quorum. I entertain a  
14 motion for the approval of the January 23rd, 2025 agenda.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, moved.

16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Moved by Commissioner  
17 Pressley and supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any  
18 discussion? All in favor say aye.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
21 carried. I entertain a motion for the approval of the  
22 minutes of January 16th.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, moved

24 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Second.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Pressley,

1 second by Commissioner Smith. Any discussion? All in  
2 favor say, aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
5 carried. Introduction of the BOPC staff, Chief of Police  
6 and so forth.

7 MS. GARNIER: This afternoon we have the Board of  
8 Police Commissioners staff, Attorney, Dante Goss, Drew  
9 Fries, Felicia Tyson, Teresa Blossom, Robert Brown, Mary  
10 Barber, Candace Hayes, Artemisia Joshua, and Jasmine  
11 Taylor. Office of the Chief Investigator, Elton Murphy,  
12 and I apologize, Chief Investigator, Reverend Warfield.  
13 DPD's HR Director, Katrina Patillo, Deputy Chief  
14 Pritchett for Chief of Police, Interim Chief of Police,  
15 Todd Bettison. Our interpreters today are Ms. Yakata and  
16 Dr. Stephanie Beatty, Charles Henry for Media Services,  
17 video. Those officials present today are Ms. Fredia  
18 Butler, Second Precinct, Community Relations President,  
19 Ms. LaDon Davis, Office of Council member Fred Durhal. I  
20 also have, I think that --- and former Detroit Police  
21 Commissioner William Davis are all that I have recorded  
22 at this time, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. Thank you. And  
24 the chairperson report, if the Personnel and Training  
25 Director is here --- we are in that portion, right? You

1 have been trying to get my attention? Okay. All right.  
2 Yes. And so, I moved the Board of Police Commissioners  
3 for the interview of 5 candidates who came through our  
4 search firm. They did a thorough search, and I'm very,  
5 very appreciative of the chairman of the Personnel and  
6 Training Committee who has worked with the search firm  
7 and worked with everyone to be able to make this happen.  
8 And it has been recommended by the search firm for the  
9 position of chief of police during the next Board of  
10 Police Commissioners meeting on Thursday, January the  
11 30th, 2025 at 3:00 PM. The location would be at --- what  
12 Union Hall Is that Mr. Brown? Madam Secretary?

13 MS. GARNIER: The location?

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

15 MS. GARNIER: We announced it a few moments ago. It  
16 will be on West Grand Boulevard, as was announced a few  
17 minutes earlier.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. And it will be  
19 posted on our website.

20 MS. GARNIER: Yes, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Facebook page and all of that,  
22 right?

23 MS. GARNIER: Yes, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Thank you very kindly.  
25 And the candidates are Todd Bettison, who is the Interim



1 Police Chief for the City of Detroit. Joel Fitzgerald,  
2 Chief of Police and Emergency Management in Denver,  
3 Colorado, Vernon Coakley Jr. Chief of Police retired from  
4 Kalamazoo, Michigan, Joshua Wallace, Commander, Chicago  
5 Police Department, Chicago, Illinois, and Allan Fear  
6 Chief of Police in Lamar Colorado. And so, motion was  
7 made --- I mean, I entertained that motion to be able to  
8 interview these 5 candidates for January the 30th, 2025  
9 at 3:00 PM

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm wondering whether or not  
13 this might be better served under new business. The  
14 things that comes out of committee, and if so, then I  
15 think that someone who serves on that committee should  
16 make the motion because as the Chair, you would just  
17 entertain the motions made.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, makes sense to me. Okay.  
19 Thank you. Strike all of that. So, we have a resolution  
20 honoring Captain Jamar Rickett. Is that here in our  
21 appellant?

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It is.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you take care of that for us?

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. Through the Chair,  
25 resolution, honoring Captain Jamar Rickett.

1           WHEREAS Jamar Rickett was appointed to the Detroit  
2 Police Department on May 12th, 1997. Upon graduating from  
3 the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Rickett  
4 began his career at the Communication Operations Section;  
5 and

6           WHEREAS Officer Rickett displayed tremendous  
7 knowledge and leadership skills as a police officer, and  
8 was promoted to the rank of sergeant on June 14th, 2006.  
9 As sergeant, he was reassigned to the Communications  
10 Operations Section. And on August 2nd, 2016, he was  
11 appointed to the rank of lieutenant. His assignments  
12 included crime intelligence, Communications Operations  
13 Section, and reassigned to Crime Intelligence; and

14           WHEREAS Lieutenant Rickett was promoted to the rank  
15 of captain on January 17th, 2022, and was reassigned to  
16 Communications Operations Section, of the 12th Precinct,  
17 Telephone Crime Reporting Unit, and Communications  
18 Operations Section until his retirement; and

19           WHEREAS Captain Rickett was the deserving recipient  
20 of the following awards: Fireworks Award, Both Consent  
21 Judgment Awards, the Chief Merit Award, the Major League  
22 Baseball All-Star Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks  
23 Community Recognition Award.

24           I'm sorry, I'll slow down. The Super Bowl XL  
25 Recognition Award, as well as numerous letters of

1 commendation from citizens and superiors; And

2 WHEREAS Captain Rickett has tirelessly served the  
3 Detroit Police Department, the people of Detroit, and its  
4 neighboring communities, for 28 years. He has served the  
5 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of the City of  
6 Detroit with loyalty, professionalism, integrity, and  
7 dedication, and is widely respected throughout the law  
8 enforcement community as the consummate professional.

9 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

10 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
11 speaking on behalf of the citizens of the great City of  
12 Detroit, recognize and honor the lifelong contributions  
13 and commitment to excellence in public service of Captain  
14 Jamar Rickett. His display of courage and unwavering  
15 community spirit has improved the quality of life of the

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of the  
20 board.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move that we adopt this  
22 resolution into the archives. COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE:  
23 Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
25 Pressley, and supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any

1 discussion? All approved say, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
4 carried. So, we are saying all resolutions. You said  
5 resolutions?

6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah. There are two more.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Two more. So, we're good, right?

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right.

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And just for clarification,  
11 is this a Viera Brownlee?

12 MALE SPEAKER: Viera.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Resolution honoring Detective  
16 Viera Brownlee.

17 WHEREAS Viera Brownlee was appointed to the Detroit  
18 Police Department on

19 April 27th, 1998. Upon graduating from the Detroit  
20 Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Brownlee began her  
21 career in the Eastern District; and

22 WHEREAS Officer Brownlee's assignments with the  
23 Detroit Police Department included the Eastern District,  
24 Grants and Contracts, Sex Crimes, 6th Precinct, and Vice  
25 Enforcement; and

1           WHEREAS Officer Brownlee displayed tremendous  
2 knowledge and leadership skills as an officer, and was  
3 promoted to the rank of detective on October the 26th,  
4 2020. Her assignments included investigative operations  
5 and sex crimes; and

6           WHEREAS Detective Brownlee was the deserving  
7 recipient of the following awards: NFL Super Bowl XL  
8 Recognition Award, Rosa Parks Criminal Recognition Award,  
9 MLB All Star Baseball Recognition Award, Ford Fireworks  
10 Celebration Award, a Chief Unit Award, a Chief Merit  
11 Award, Departmental Citation Award, a Citation Award, and  
12 several accolades from within the department and from  
13 other agencies and citizens for her professionalism and  
14 expertise; and

15           WHEREAS Detective Brownlee has tirelessly served the  
16 Detroit Police Department, the people of Detroit, and its  
17 neighboring communities, for 26 years. She has served the  
18 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of Detroit  
19 with loyalty, professionalism, integrity, and education,  
20 and is widely respected throughout the law enforcement  
21 community as the consummate professional.

22           NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

23           That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
24 speaking on behalf of the citizens of the great City of  
25 Detroit, recognizes and honors the lifelong contributions

1 and commitment to excellence in public service of  
2 Detective Viera Brownlee. Her display of courage and  
3 unwavering community spirit has improved the quality of  
4 life for the citizens of Detroit. We wish you all the  
5 best in your future endeavors. We thank and congratulate  
6 you, Detective Viera Brownlee. I move that we adopt this  
7 resolution to our archives.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Pressley,  
10 second by Commissioner Banks. Any discussion? All the  
11 favor, say, aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
14 carried.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And finally, resolution,  
16 honoring Corporal John Hall.

17 WHEREAS John Hall was appointed to the Detroit  
18 Police Department on December 14th, 1998. Upon graduating  
19 from Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Hall  
20 began his career at the 8th Precinct; and

21 WHEREAS Officer Hall's assignments with the Detroit  
22 Police Department included a precinct, Southeast Section,  
23 Records Management Office of the Chief of Police, Forced  
24 Investigations, and reassigned to the Office of Chief of  
25 Police; and

1           WHEREAS Officer Hall displayed tremendous knowledge  
2 and leadership skills as an officer, and was appointed to  
3 the rank of corporal on November 13th, 2015. His  
4 assignments included the chief of police office and  
5 Records Management until his retirement; and

6           WHEREAS Corporal Hall was the deserving recipient of  
7 the following awards. NFL Super Bowl XL Recognition  
8 Award; Rosa Parks Criminal Recognition Award, MLB All  
9 Star Baseball Recognition Award, Ford Fireworks  
10 Celebration Award, a Chief Unit Award, a Chief Merit  
11 Award, Departmental citation Award, A Citation Award, and  
12 several accolades within the department and from other  
13 agencies and citizens for his professionalism and  
14 expertise; and

15           WHEREAS Corporal Hall has tirelessly served the  
16 Detroit Police Department, the people of Detroit, and its  
17 neighboring communities, for 26 years. He has served the  
18 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of the City of  
19 Detroit with loyalty, professionalism, integrity, and  
20 dedication, and is widely respected throughout the law  
21 enforcement community as the consummate professional.

22           NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

23           That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
24 speaking on behalf of the citizens of the great City of  
25 Detroit, recognizes and honors the lifelong contribution

1 and commitment to excellence in public service of  
2 Corporal John Hall. His display of courage and unwavering  
3 community spirit has improved the quality of life for the  
4 citizens of Detroit. We wish you all the best in your  
5 future endeavors. We thank and congratulate you, Corporal  
6 John Hall. I move that this resolution be adopted into  
7 our archives.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Pressley to  
10 adopt the resolution, second by Commissioner Banks. Any  
11 discussion? All in favor, say, aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
14 carried. I would like to recognize that Captain Jamar  
15 Rickett is present. Stand, and thank you for your  
16 service.

17 But he doesn't like us doing resolutions for the  
18 police and stuff, but, you know I think that your service  
19 to the citizens of the City of Detroit, deserves  
20 recognition. We thank you immensely for all the years  
21 that you have served and we appreciate the work that you  
22 have done, and look forward to hearing good things  
23 because you look like a young man, you know? And whatever  
24 you do in life, we pray and wish you Godspeed. Yes, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can I have the opportunity -



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. I was going to do that.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. Anyone else have  
4 anything to say before we do give him an opportunity

5 CAPTAIN RICKETT: Through the Chair, honorable board.  
6 I just want to share my gratitude thankfully not only to  
7 you, but the citizens of Detroit for allowing me to serve  
8 and protect, try to uplift in everything that I do  
9 throughout my career. I am humbly, humbly, thankful and  
10 grateful for this resolution. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, and God bless you.  
12 Let's go to the Chief of Police Report.

13 DC HAYES: Good afternoon to this honorable body and  
14 those in attendance. I'd like to provide the Chief's  
15 report as relates to a violent crime. I just want to  
16 share a couple of our categories and talk about the work  
17 that's being done, not only by the police department, but  
18 certainly with our community and, and the stakeholders  
19 that all have bought in to making this a safer city. Our  
20 homicides, we are down 13%. Year to date, last year we  
21 had 8; this year we are at 7. Robberies. Last year we had  
22 59, this year we're at 58. A 13% reduction for the  
23 homicides, 2% reduction for the robberies; and  
24 carjackings. We are down 25%. Last year to date, we had  
25 8, this year we have 6. We have seen an uptick in our

1 non-fatal shootings. This time last year we had 29. This  
2 year we are at 32. A small number. So, any deviation  
3 would show a large change. But we continue to work and  
4 drive this number down and continue the success that  
5 we've certainly accomplished in these previous two years.  
6 Calls for service. I really want to highlight the mental  
7 health calls for service. We continue to see an uptick,  
8 but that's okay, because those that have the confidence  
9 to call us to get the help that are in a mental crisis.  
10 And we are certainly answering that call. And the result  
11 is certainly our theory that we can drive these numbers,  
12 these violent numbers down as we saw what the crime. And  
13 just to talk about where our numbers are. Year to date,  
14 calls for service to have a, a mental health nexus,  
15 whether it be mental, nonviolent, mental violent, armed  
16 mental, violent, non-armed suicide and progress, or the  
17 threat of suicide.

18       This year we have answered 889 calls for service;  
19 last year we were at 745. So, we've had an additional 144  
20 calls just in this first month. But again, with our  
21 partnerships, we're able to address those and get the  
22 help that they need through our mental health  
23 correspondence and our several partners. So, the work  
24 continues talking about our narcotics overdoses, a  
25 reduction, which is good, whether it's a one down or drug

1 overdose or drug OD. Last year to date, we were at 232.  
2 This year we were at 230. So, we will certainly take  
3 those two. Those are lives that have been saved, and are  
4 here with their families and get the help that they need.  
5 Just to talk about a few significant incidents. One is a  
6 triple shooting that occurred on January 15<sup>th</sup>, at 10:30  
7 PM. Officers received a ShotSpotter alert to the 10,000  
8 block of Ferguson for several shots fired which was later  
9 updated by dispatch to --- once dispatch got the call, it  
10 was a shooting in progress. Officers arrived at the scene  
11 in 2 minutes to 10:32, and observed 2 victims shot.  
12 Victim 1, suffered multiple gunshot wounds and was  
13 pronounced deceased on the scene. Victim 2 was  
14 transported to the local hospital because they too  
15 sustained a gunshot wound. The officers received an  
16 update that there was a third victim who arrived at the  
17 hospital, also suffering from a gunshot wound. It was  
18 confirmed that, again, this third victim was involved in  
19 this incident. That's how we got to 3 people shot. Victim  
20 2 was in temporary serious condition, and victim 3 was in  
21 critical condition.

22 We then turned this investigation over to the  
23 Homicide Task Force who began to work. The detectives  
24 thus far were able to determine that the victims were  
25 shot by multiple suspects who fled the scene in a white

1 sedan. This is an open investigation, so we are asking  
2 anyone with information, contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800  
3 SPEAKUP, or detroitrewards.tv. Another event I want to  
4 talk about is a fatal shooting that happened on January  
5 16th at 7:20 PM where officers were dispatched to the  
6 10,000 block of West 8 Mile to investigate a fatal  
7 shooting. Officers arrived at the location and observed  
8 the victims sitting in the driver's seat of a Ford Escape  
9 suffering from a gunshot wound. When the medics arrived  
10 at the scene, the injuries were incompatible with life,  
11 and the victim was pronounced deceased. The suspect who  
12 was the boyfriend of the victim was arrested at the scene  
13 by the officers, and they were able to determine that the  
14 suspect shot the victim at that very location.

15 On January 17th, 2025, detectives of the Homicide  
16 Section submitted a warrant to the Wayne County  
17 Prosecutor's Office. And then that warrant was approved  
18 on January 19th, where the suspect was charged; was  
19 arraigned and arranged in 36 District Court on the  
20 following charges, homicide first degree, premeditated;  
21 weapons concealed carry; weapons felony firearms, and the  
22 suspect is being held at d Wayne County jail without  
23 bond. We did have an officer involved shooting on  
24 Saturday, January 18th just before midnight in the 8th  
25 Precinct where officers were on routine patrol in the

1 area West 7 Mile and 4, where they observed 4 males  
2 walking in the area with a youthful appearance, after  
3 curfew hours. The officers approached individuals to  
4 investigate, at which point one of the suspects, a male  
5 wearing a ski mask, walked away from the group into the  
6 alley, disregarding the officer's command to stop.

7 The officers approached the subject to investigate  
8 and observe that the suspect was armed with an assault  
9 rifle. Officers fired shots at the suspect, striking him  
10 two times. The victim was conveyed to a local hospital,  
11 and enlisted in temporary serious condition. The weapon  
12 was recovered at the scene. This juvenile offender and  
13 others at the scene were investigated. And well, the  
14 other juveniles that were at the scene, excuse me, were  
15 released to their parents. And as with all police  
16 shootings, this is being investigated by the Michigan  
17 State Police. And with the commitment from the chief  
18 again, within the timeline presented, there will be the  
19 public presentation or the public debrief; the video done  
20 showing, I guess detailing or describing this incident.  
21 Excuse me, I am at a loss for words. The last incident we  
22 want to talk about happened on Tuesday, January 21st 2:25  
23 PM, where officers were dispatched to 477 Michigan Avenue  
24 at the McNamara Federal Building.

25 Officers arrived at the scene and observed a subject

1 who had already been placed in custody by the federal  
2 police. They spoke to the federal officers who stated  
3 that the above suspect exited the white van in front of  
4 the location, and began to fire several rounds in the air  
5 and then throw the weapon down on the street. DPD  
6 conveyed the suspect to the DDC. However, due to the  
7 federal partners actually making the arrest, we assisted  
8 in the transport. This is under investigation. What I can  
9 share with you is that the individual does suffer from  
10 mental illness, has a history, a documented history of  
11 mental illness, and was under a court order not to be in  
12 possession of a firearm. So, again, with that in federal  
13 investigation the individual can get the help that he  
14 needs that was responsible for the firearm discharge at  
15 the federal building.

16 In closing, just a few things and in our commitment  
17 to reach out to the community, talk to the community our  
18 command officers at the precinct, to make sure that the  
19 community and those in their precincts know who they are.  
20 The 4th Precinct conducted coffee with the cop at the  
21 Vamonos Healthy Eatery in the 4th Precinct where they  
22 were able to talk to the command and the 4th Precinct  
23 NPOs. In addition to the 3 that we mentioned that were  
24 retiring with the resolution, there was another event at  
25 the 11th Precinct for Corporal Steven Jackson, who, sir,

1 had a 39-year career with the police department. And then  
2 lastly, tomorrow, at Second Ebenezer Church at 10:30 AM,  
3 we will be graduating 39 student police officers who will  
4 then be voted to the rank of, instead of student police  
5 officers to police officers as they can do the work ---  
6 the Lord's work, as I've heard this board often mentioned  
7 in serving this community here in the City of Detroit.  
8 Mr. Chair, that is the Chief's Report, and I will gladly  
9 answer any questions that I can. Yes, sir. Commissioner  
10 Banks

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Blessings to you and your  
12 household, Deputy Chief. I'd like to know --- well, first  
13 of all before I get started, I want to acknowledge the  
14 Vice Chair, Liberty and Commissioner Dewaelsche for the  
15 great awards that you achieved. That was at the Fox when  
16 you got that award. That's a great award that was  
17 presented to you by Hugh Perkins. Great award that you  
18 got too, from the City of Detroit, the Spirit of Detroit  
19 Award, you know, right?

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: No. Testimonial resolution.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, I thought it was Spirit of  
22 Detroit. I'm sorry about that. But anyway, it was a great  
23 award.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: It was. Thank you so much,  
25 sir.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You are quite welcome. And then  
2 also, Deputy Chief, when did that happen? The guy was  
3 shooting at the houses because I want to ask you a little  
4 bit about another situation. It may be that situation  
5 there, Deputy Chief. Do you know what area? I mean, what  
6 day? I'm sorry, what day?

7 DC HAYES: If I may ask through the Chair. Just for  
8 clarification, you said someone was shooting at the  
9 house?

10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Did you mention someone was  
11 shooting? The guy was shooting that mentally ill guy, and  
12 he was shooting at some houses?

13 DC HAYES: Through the, through the Chair, that was  
14 at the federal building, the McNamara building right here  
15 downtown. And that happened, please forgive me. I believe  
16 that was Tuesday, January 21st at 2:25 in the afternoon.  
17 That was right here. COMMISSIONER BANKS: That was right  
18 here at the McNamara building.

19 DC HAYES: Yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Well, Deputy Chief, I have  
21 a case here of Jermaine McKnight, shot and killed on  
22 November 26th. The family is saying that DPD hasn't got  
23 back to them. And any information such as what evidence  
24 was collected, who they talked to, and why the warrant  
25 was denied. The warrant was denied by Prosecutor Kym



1 Worthy. The shooting had many witnesses. The killer was  
2 even shooting at houses with kids in it. And the young  
3 man that was killed was Jermaine McKnight, Deputy Chief,  
4 can you please look into that? Malik Shabazz, the  
5 honorable Malik Shabazz contacted me and he said,  
6 Prophet, I mean, he said, Commissioner Banks, would you  
7 look into this case for me? And, you know, Malik has put  
8 his life on the line for this city, so I want to be able  
9 to help his brother. So, we sent the family to me. I  
10 released him to give the family my phone number and  
11 everything. So, they contacted me, and this family is in  
12 pain. They want to know why the gentleman was released in  
13 3 days. And can you please look into Deputy Chief, if you  
14 could please?

15 DC HAYES: Through the Chair. Yes, sir. I have  
16 Lieutenant Sharon McClure from Chief's Neighborhood  
17 Liaison who's present at the conclusion of the meeting.  
18 We will get those specifics from you Commissioner Banks  
19 and we will certainly update the family.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I appreciate that.

21 DC HAYES: Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Appreciate it.

23 DC HAYES: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. Commissioner Pressley.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair.

1 Deputy Chief, my question is relative to the Chief's  
2 report. It's kind of thin, at least the documentation  
3 that we received. I just recall that we used to get a  
4 ShotSpotter's report, Facial Recognition report; that  
5 hasn't been in our packet for at least a few months now.  
6 Maybe even longer than that. And so, I don't know whether  
7 or not there's a rationale for that or whether or not we  
8 were maybe trying to perfect the data that was being  
9 provided to us. But again, you know, I think that it's  
10 important that we kind of have that level of information,  
11 particularly around the technological uses that are being  
12 employed by the Detroit Police Department.

13 DC HAYES: Absolutely. Through the Chair, I see those  
14 documents being generated. I am not sure where the  
15 breakdown is. I will bring that to resolution at the  
16 conclusion of this meeting, and we will make sure that  
17 those documents are submitted to this body and that you  
18 have them at your disposal to disseminate among the board  
19 how you see fit, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Are you done?

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I  
25 just wanted to add to that. We had a budget meeting this

1 week and committed. And we did ask about the ShotSpotter  
2 reports, and why we were not getting those and how often,  
3 you know, we would be getting them. And Commander Parish  
4 did say that there was a glitch, I believe in the  
5 software that produces a report or something to that  
6 effect, and that he would also check into that and make  
7 sure that we get caught up. I think it's happened for  
8 about a year or several months anyways, that we haven't  
9 received that report. So, they are working on it. I just  
10 wanted to let you know that, commissioner. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Absolutely. Actually, you  
12 are mandated by policy to get us those reports; and we  
13 expect those reports to get to us expeditiously. The  
14 software has been fixed from our understanding from what  
15 Commander Parish was telling us. But it's absolutely  
16 unequivocally clear that by policy that we are to get  
17 those reports monthly. And it is vitally important that  
18 the community have this information. And we were assured  
19 that we would get those reports. And so hopefully, by  
20 tomorrow that we have those reports.

21 DC HAYES: Yes, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair. And in the same  
24 vein, and it is more directed towards us, you know,  
25 obviously there's a lot of moving parts to the work that

1 we do, and I know that it's very difficult for us to, you  
2 know, follow up on everything. And so, I don't know if  
3 there's a special working group that we can create,  
4 because again, there's been a lot of conversations that  
5 this board has had with the department, but we haven't  
6 really been able to follow up on that. And I'm mentioning  
7 that because of what Commissioner Banks said. And not  
8 knowing the particular details of that incident, but  
9 again, it has been an issue with several families saying  
10 that they hadn't been reached out to, from DPD to get  
11 follow up on cases. And, you know, at the transition of  
12 the Chiefs you know, that was a discussion point about  
13 how we would improve that level of communication. And  
14 again, you know, finding ways that we can get timely  
15 feedback to ensure that those things are happening.  
16 Because again, you know, I think that the community has  
17 an expectation that we are on top of these things.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. You must have been reading  
19 my note that I was like --- COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Man,  
20 we would like that.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. And because we said last  
22 week that the staff is to get us follow up information on  
23 these various requests. So, we expect staff to get that  
24 to us expeditiously as well, to make sure that the follow  
25 up on these issues are done and they're done properly,

1 because this is not verbal gymnastics, we are not here,  
2 you know, to play games with anyone. But we are here to  
3 get answers for the citizens of the City of Detroit. And  
4 so, all of us have to maximize our potential to  
5 Commissioner Banks question. I was in the office with  
6 Captain Thirkill from Homicide and Special Units and a  
7 family member who has been impacted by homicide and  
8 Captain Thirkill is very, very responsive to our request.  
9 So, when we have those types of issues we can get that to  
10 Captain Thirkill, and I'll give you his cell number after  
11 this meeting, because he has met with a number of  
12 families. He has been following up very thoroughly on  
13 those requests and has been proactive in that space as  
14 well.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair, Commissioner  
16 Pressley, good job, man. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Great job.  
17 Yeah. Yep. Alright, are there any more questions? There  
18 being no more questions, let's go to oral communications.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, you have 4 speakers in the  
20 room. We are going to start back with Minister Eric  
21 Blount, Ms. Fredia Butler and Ms. Williams.

22 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

24 MINISTER BLOUNT: And assistant chief, I choose to  
25 believe that the vast majority of police officers are

1 honest, hardworking people. It is how we don't deal with  
2 the bad ones that makes this whole situation very  
3 dangerous. And so, I'll ask for a moment of silence. This  
4 moment of silence is for all honest police officers who  
5 have been attacked, injured, and yes, one killed. And yet  
6 this week, their attackers from January 6th have all been  
7 pardoned. I knew you weren't going to say anything, so I  
8 thought I better say it.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen, can't get it together.

10 MINISTER BLOUNT: Getting it together is very  
11 difficult, brother.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I know, man. I know.

13 MINISTER BLOUNT: These recognition words have  
14 nothing to do with police officers' misconduct. No  
15 disrespect brother, if he's still here. But it is all  
16 about police officer misconduct and there's enough to go  
17 around. We don't need to talk about crime and everything  
18 else. Talking about everything else, you're in rare form  
19 Chairperson. We brought up this guy from car insurance,  
20 and had nothing to do with police officer misconduct. So,  
21 I don't even want to guess what it is you are really  
22 trying to do here, but it is not protecting the citizens.  
23 These recognition awards could have been given by the  
24 board of water commissioners. You could give one to a dog  
25 catcher. We just don't know what's next, but people are

1 hurting, and this game, this sickness has got to stop.  
2 The reports on ShotSpotter and Facial Recognition, they  
3 stopped because the data showed the embarrassing part of  
4 it all. Facial Recognition does nothing but catch black  
5 men doing something. ShotSpotter collects thousands of  
6 shots and very little evidence is ever recovered

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: At last, amen.

8 MINISTER BLOUNT: Goodbye.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Goodbye.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: May I?

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: I strongly disagree with the  
15 minister in reference to his statement about the role of  
16 this board. I've been a part of this board since 1974.  
17 I've been elected part of this board since 1914 (SIC) and  
18 he doesn't really understand our mission at all.  
19 Unfortunate, but he's consistent, making only a statement  
20 about how we only deal with discipline matters. That is a  
21 very small --- he needs to read the charter mandate. It  
22 is clear of our role that we serve this community, we do  
23 it honorable and fairly and openly. And so, that's  
24 misleading. I just want to state that for the record.  
25 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Thank you.

2 MS. WILLIAMS: Good afternoon. Through the Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, you are not heard yet?  
4 Thank you. To your point. This is what we do on a weekly  
5 basis for the citizens of the City of Detroit, you know.  
6 When we get these folders; these are not mystery folders,  
7 but these are citizen complaints that we have to go  
8 through every single week. And we get tons of these. And  
9 I'm very, very appreciative of all of the team that plays  
10 the role in making this happen, and all our investigators  
11 who are doing an amazing job. And I doubt --- Amen. Hey,  
12 thank you. And take a look at our dashboard. You know,  
13 our dashboard is a salified dashboard and judge us on  
14 that. Yeah. Thank you. You may be heard.

15 MS. WILLIAMS: Good afternoon. Through the Chair.  
16 This is for you Willie Bell. When Akbar was the chief  
17 investigator. If I'm clear, this started 4 years ago. All  
18 the complaints I have had. So, backdoor dealings,  
19 transparency, accountability. I've been talking about  
20 homeless people for a mighty long time. It's been two  
21 years since I've been coming here. And I have a COCR code  
22 79379. Chief Warfield, I'm going to make sure you get  
23 this information concerning these officers that live in  
24 these facilities. I have somebody that can validate what  
25 I'm saying about officers that are in these facilities



1 and they are getting housing vouchers also. That's not  
2 acceptable, a housing navigator. We are going to talk  
3 about transparency, when you guys are sitting up here at  
4 this table talking about mental illness and all this,  
5 when I see phones out, when you want to record me hacking  
6 into my devices, and you are so quick to talk about  
7 mental illness.

8       So, when the paperwork comes down in the city  
9 concerning corrupt officers, then we are going to talk  
10 about that too. You all give badges to officers who do  
11 not deserve to get badges, who should get psych  
12 evaluations? Okay. I have an officer that continues to  
13 antagonize me and this is the same officer who threatened  
14 my life. And like I said, I do not care who he was  
15 related to or who he is related to. It is not acceptable,  
16 like I said before, there are a lot of good officers out  
17 here, but then we are going to talk about the bad ones  
18 too, who like to swipe, hack into the machines, steal the  
19 dollar stores, the casinos. I could go down the list of  
20 all this big corruption in this group. So, every time I  
21 come in here, somebody wants to get into my devices, make  
22 it make sense. It was started in 1974 because of Coleman  
23 Young, because of the corruption of the Detroit Police  
24 Department, lieutenant. Thank you. Have a great day.

25       CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair.  
2 Have we ever had anybody; I know she's been talking about  
3 this for a little while now. Have we ever had anybody  
4 look into her situation? She's up here consistently?

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well absolutely. You know, the  
6 way we look into anything is through citizen complaints.  
7 And that has been vetted, you know, through citizen  
8 complaints. Excuse me, me, I'm sorry. She has filed  
9 numerous citizen complaints, right? And they have been  
10 answered.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Okay. Alright. Alright.  
12 All right.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Let's get a point of  
14 order please. Thank you. You may be heard.

15 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon, commissioners. First, I  
16 must state at the board meeting.

17 January 16th, you acted as if you didn't know about  
18 the 2nd Precinct not having a commander. I have given you  
19 a second copy of my letter dated December 10th, 2024 when  
20 I wrote about our concerns. We have had 7 commanders, and  
21 I believe Commander Ryan Conner doesn't want to be at the  
22 2nd Precinct. I haven't met him. Commander Ryan Conner  
23 has and is disrespecting our communities by not attending  
24 our meetings and introducing himself as commander. He  
25 should be placed somewhere else. After watching the

1 inauguration, we have some dark days ahead. I hope we  
2 will speak up and stand up and do something. We are not  
3 powerless people. A commissioner spoke about your  
4 responsibilities, but after listening to citizens, it  
5 seems, and I believe you are listening to someone else.  
6 Please stand up and do what is right. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

8 DC HAYES: Mr. Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

10 DC HAYES: If I may, if I can ask Lieutenant McClure  
11 to get with Ms. Butler. I am not sure where the breakdown  
12 is. I've seen Commander Connor from the 2nd Precinct, who  
13 is extremely visible. So, she will be at that next  
14 meeting. So, if we can just get those particulars you  
15 will see Commander Connor at your next meeting.

16 And the person that made the complaint last week,  
17 they were able to talk to him that same day. And then I  
18 know that they did go to the 2nd Precinct and meet  
19 because I was talking to them on the phone or the other  
20 community leader who wanted them to come to the meeting.  
21 So, I talked to her on the phone on the way there and  
22 after she finished the meeting with the commander, you  
23 know, so, I believe the ball is rolling, but any more you  
24 can add to it, let's add to it. You know anything. And  
25 the next speaker.

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, we're going to go into  
2 Zoom and that will be Ms. Parnell.

3 MS. PARNELL: Good afternoon. Can you hear me? Chair  
4 Woods, and Commissioner Moore. I appreciate you  
5 contacting the commission, the commander. He called me  
6 right back. I had a meeting with him the very next day.  
7 He said he was going to be at the next meeting, and he's  
8 going to be helping us at the 2nd Precinct. Now, I hope  
9 it's true because all we want is someone that's going to  
10 help us. He seemed to be okay. You know, he wanted to  
11 take me to lunch. I'm not hungry. What I'm hungry for is  
12 help in the community and I appreciate everybody that  
13 helped me out because he jumped dead on the phone within  
14 a half an hour he was calling me. And then we met on  
15 Friday. I talked to Chair Woods twice. So, let's work  
16 together. That's all I have to say. Let's work together.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, ma'am. Next speaker.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, our next speaker will be  
20 Ruben Crowley. After Ruben Crowley, former Commissioner  
21 William Davis, and Mr. Scotty Bowman.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

23 MR. CROWLEY: Yeah. To everyone within the sound of  
24 my voice, everyone in the room. And this situation with  
25 Kaneisha Coleman, DPD case, 20-112. I just talked to two

1 investigators in the Homicide Unit, and one of them hung  
2 up the phone on me when I expressed to them that there  
3 was a 7½ to 10-minute time period where this individual  
4 was dropped off at the McDonald's where she worked. But  
5 before the person that dropped her off, got to her  
6 grandmother's house after dropping her off, there was an  
7 incoming phone call to her grandmother's phone stating  
8 that Kaneisha Coleman had been shot or shot herself.

9       Except, there's one major, major, major problem with  
10 that. It doesn't seem to be an incoming call or text  
11 coming to this individual's device indicating that  
12 Kaniesha shot herself. And I've been dealing with this  
13 situation through 5 Chairmen on the Board of Police  
14 Commissioners, Willie Bell, Jim Holley, Daniel Ferguson,  
15 QuanTez Pressley, and Darryl Woods. And now Darryl Woods  
16 is passing matters on to the Vice Chair, Tamara Liberty  
17 Smith. I've explained to her in detail extensively. And I  
18 got a 40-year reputation around Detroit, in and around  
19 Detroit of being a standup 100. I don't have any reason  
20 to put anything on anybody that they don't deserve. And  
21 Nene wants what she wants. Nene wants what she wants.

22       CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next caller.

23       MR. DAVIS: Hello. Can I be heard?

24       CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, sir.

25       MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying

1 that recently on Monday NAN, the Michigan NAN had an  
2 outstanding event, the Martin Luther King Dream Keeper  
3 Award. We gave out 6 awards, and one of them was to Todd  
4 Bettison, Detroit Interim Chief, and there was an  
5 outstanding event perhaps some of you all could attend.  
6 Also, today I mentioned the board's Chairperson Woods'  
7 name at the City Council. And we were talking about a  
8 contractor who was about to give Goch and Sons. And I  
9 mentioned the fact that we still have a lot of problems  
10 in the city with some towers, and more people actively  
11 involved. And some of you may or may not know. I speak  
12 before the City Council almost 4 days a week on different  
13 issues. But, you know, we need to be more proactive in  
14 what's going on in the city.

15 We need to recognize outstanding individuals, and we  
16 need to also recognize when we have some individuals and  
17 some companies that's not doing good work for our people.  
18 So perhaps you all could be a little bit more push and  
19 see what's going on. Perhaps you all also need to be  
20 doing a little bit more at community meetings. I know  
21 like Commissioner Moore and Commissioner Burton; they've  
22 had community meetings. I think more commissioners should  
23 have community meetings. I think more people should know  
24 who the police commissioners are. You know, be it the  
25 elected ones at the districts or the others that are

1 appointed. But you know, the Board of Police  
2 Commissioners should interact more with the community,  
3 and hopefully, you all will. You all have a nice day.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Any more callers?

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Scotty Bowman.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, Mr. Bowman.

7 MR. BOWMAN: Hello, honorable board. I'm speaking in  
8 a number of hats. I am the founder of Detroit Residence  
9 Advancing Civilian Oversight. I'm a treasurer of my  
10 community advisory council, but I'm not really speaking  
11 on behalf of them right now. I'm also --- DRACO is a  
12 member group. I'm participating with the Coalition for  
13 Police Transparency and Accountability. On the  
14 transparency issue, I would really love to see something  
15 that codifies more transparency in the revealing of body-  
16 worn camera video, as well as any other surveillance  
17 video under the control of the Detroit Police. And that  
18 should be instantly available upon request. I mean, or as  
19 quickly as physically possible for the commissioners,  
20 especially since they're the oversight organization. And  
21 anything that does not jeopardize an investigation, I  
22 mean, really needs to be visible by the public at large.  
23 The other matter is, of course, we have this continued  
24 matter of officer involved shootings and especially the  
25 most recent issue being the death of Sherman Butler.

1 Yeah, sure, the shooter was actually a sheriff deputy, I  
2 mean a bailiff, but working under the county, not with  
3 DPD. However, DPD was present. Detroit police officers  
4 were involved in this situation. Their conduct needs to  
5 be investigated. We also need to investigate other  
6 suspicious deaths or why maybe the officers are not  
7 investigating suspicious deaths, such as the homicide of  
8 Kaneisha Coleman that Mr. Crowley brought up earlier.  
9 Thank you and have a wonderful afternoon.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Let's go  
11 to the board secretary. So, we are at unfinished  
12 business. So, what is the pleasure of the board to item  
13 number 6, or unfinished business?

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move to closed session  
17 pursuant to Section 8(a) of the Open Meetings Act, MCL  
18 15.28, excuse me, MCL 15.268(a). The department's request  
19 for the board to consider administrative leave without  
20 payable with medical benefits for Police Officer Donovan  
21 Donehue, Badge 693, assigned to the 12th Precinct.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
24 Pressley to go into closed session. Second by  
25 Commissioner Banks. Any discussion? All in favor say,



1 aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
4 carried. This is a 2½ minute recess.

5 (Whereupon the Board Entered into Closed Session)

6 Today is the 23rd of January, and it's 4:22 PM. The  
7 Board of Police Commissioners meeting is called back to  
8 order.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Present.

12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Present.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burden is excused.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter is excused.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Ricardo Moore is excused.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez is excused.

18 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Present.

20 MS. GARNIER: 7 present, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of the  
22 board?

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Back in open session.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, we're back in open session.

25 Is there any motion? Mic for the police? Commissioner,

1 thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: I move that we accept the Chief's  
3 recommendation to suspend Officer Donehue without pay.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Bell  
6 to suspend Officer Donahue without pay, and supported by  
7 Commissioner Dewaelsche. No discussion.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No discussion.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. There is discussion?

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes, there is discussion.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. And so, make sure we are  
12 very, very careful in the discussion. Go ahead.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Be careful in the discussion.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This is a case that is pending  
16 in criminal court

17 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point order. That information  
18 is privileged information.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Pardon me?

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It's privilege information.  
21 No content that was shared in closed session should be  
22 shared in open session.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Then we'll just deal  
24 with the facts of the matter. The point of the matter is  
25 that I think that suspending an officer without pay,

1 prior to there being a conclusion of any other matter  
2 involving the officer is inappropriate for the following  
3 reasons. B) When you say suspend without pay, but with  
4 medical benefits, that's meaningless because you can't  
5 pay the copay for the medical benefits unless you have an  
6 income. This decision affects, not only the officer, but  
7 any child or any other dependents that he may have or  
8 actually that his spouse, I'm not sure if there was a  
9 spouse, but in any event, that he may have.

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. You can be  
11 very mindful of what you share. Again, none of these  
12 details are being privileged to the public.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me. The suspension  
14 without pay is a draconian remedy. Quite frankly, that  
15 could force a person into criminal activity, or criminal  
16 behavior. If you don't have an income, you cannot pay for  
17 your medical benefits and you cannot pay for the medical  
18 benefits of your dependents. This matter is one that is  
19 being addressed in another forum. That is that that is a  
20 factual forum in which there will be sworn testimonies.  
21 We should wait until we get the information from that  
22 forum in order to address this issue. This matter was, as  
23 I understand it, charged in ---

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order; point of  
25 order.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A poor point of order. The  
2 probation that it is enclosed --- COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY:  
3 Point of order. Mr. Chair, can I be acknowledged so that  
4 I can help my clinical colleague understand what can be  
5 shared

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Point of order. Go ahead.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Alright. So, under new  
8 business, the only thing that is publicly aware of the  
9 public right, is that there is an officer who is being  
10 requested for the department. I have been recognized by  
11 the Chair. I'm trying to prevent this war from liability.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Any charge in the matter of  
13 public information in the state of Michigan by any police  
14 department. It is public information. So, it is not any  
15 point of order. It is not confidential information.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It is confidential information.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm saying to you, if you've  
18 been charged with a crime anywhere, you, it is ---

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Again, you are disposing that  
20 they don't know what has happened at all. Commissioner,  
21 you have now given them information that allows you to  
22 discover that when they should not have known that.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Point of order for that.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm not out of order for that. I  
25 disagree 100% because you can just go online and look it

1 up.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, we have an attorney here.  
3 Can we get a legal opinion from our attorney about what  
4 should be shared out of closed session?

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Back to the point.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You are out of order on this.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm not out of order.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Pressley had the  
9 floor. Now the attorney is giving us legal guidance on  
10 this.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He knows what I'm saying is  
12 true.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Listen.

14 ATTORNEY GOSS: Commissioners, whatever is discussed  
15 in closed session cannot be brought all up into open  
16 session. So, any information that you receive in a closed  
17 session, we cannot discuss it because of the closed  
18 matter.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I understand that. But a  
20 suspension without pay is a very, very serious  
21 allegation. And it's one that we've been asked to opine  
22 on as a body, and we are analyzing that and addressing  
23 that. My position is that a suspension without pay,  
24 without anything else other than a memorandum from the  
25 department, does not give us that right to do that

1 because of the draconian implications of that to the  
2 officer. We have a vested interest in our officers. We  
3 train them, we invest tremendous amounts of money in  
4 them. And until there is an actual determination that an  
5 officer has violated any law or principle, I don't think  
6 it is an appropriate remedy, because it affects not only  
7 the officer, but their family and everything else. You  
8 can drive a person into criminal behavior by ---

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Commissioner Bell.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I do want to state  
11 to our learned commissioner, she'd been consistent to  
12 take that position. This is a matter of record, so we  
13 don't need to hear you. We know how you are going to  
14 roll; how you are going to handle this matter. You're  
15 being consistent.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And we know how you will.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. This is not a personal  
18 attack. This is not personal, but ---

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He just made it personal. I  
20 didn't make it personal.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. All right. If there's no  
22 further discussion, I'll call the roll. Call on me last.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Yes.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - No.

25 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Yes.  
2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.  
3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter is excused.  
4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore is excused.  
5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez is excused.  
6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.  
7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche: - Yes.  
8 MS. GARNIER: 5 Yay votes.  
9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You didn't call me.  
10 MS. GARNIER: I'm sorry. I am so sorry.  
11 MS. GARNIER: Thank you board for your patience.  
12 Commissioner Woods?  
13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.  
14 MS. GARNIER: 6 Yay votes, 1 No vote.  
15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. The motion passes. What is  
16 the pleasure of the board?  
17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I move that we go back into  
18 closed session. I mean ---  
19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Closed session.  
20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair?  
21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.  
22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move that we go into closed

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
4 Pressley, second by Commissioner Banks. Any discussion?  
5 All in favor say, aye.

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Opposed? The motion is carried.  
8 This is a 1½ minute recess.

9 (Whereupon the Board Entered into Closed Session)

10 Today is Thursday January 23rd, 4:47 PM. The Board  
11 of Police Commission is called back to order. Please,  
12 call the roll.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Present.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present, District  
17 3.

18 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Present.

19 NS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter is excused.

21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore is excused.

22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez is excused.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Present.

25 MS. GARNIER: 7 present, sir.



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move that we postpone new  
3 business item A until the next meeting.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
6 Pressley to postpone new business A until the next  
7 meeting. It is supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any  
8 discussion? All in favor say, aye.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any one opposed? The motion is  
11 carried. Commissioner Dewaelsche?

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes. Thank you. Mr. Chair.  
13 Under new business, I wanted to report back to the  
14 commission that our contracted staffing company, TJA  
15 Staffing Inc., has come up, as provided us with what we  
16 requested. And that is 5 candidates for the chief of  
17 police position. And I'd like to list those names. Todd  
18 Bettison, Interim Police Chief from Detroit. Joel  
19 Fitzgerald, Chief of Police and Emergency Management from  
20 Denver, Colorado. Vernon Coakley, Junior, Chief of  
21 Police, retired from Kalamazoo, Michigan. Joshua Wallace,  
22 Commander, Chicago Police Department, Chicago, Illinois.  
23 Allan Fear Chief of Police, Lamar, Colorado. And I'd like  
24 to make a motion that we accept these 5 candidates.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
2 Dewaelsche, second by Commissioner Bernard.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. Can we give  
4 it a full motion, because I think that for the state to  
5 accept him ---

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes. I'm sorry. Let me  
7 correct that motion. I would like to ask the Board of  
8 Police Commissioners to accept these 5 candidates to be  
9 interviewed for the police chief's position. They are  
10 recommended by the search committee as we requested. And  
11 the candidates will be interviewed during the next  
12 meeting of the Board of Police Commissioner on Thursday,  
13 January 30<sup>th</sup>, at 3:00 PM. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
16 Dewaelsche to interview the 5 candidates; to accept those  
17 5 candidates to be interviewed on January the 30th at  
18 3:00 PM and it is second by Commissioner Bernard. Any  
19 discussion? All in favor say aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Anyone opposed? The motion is  
21 carried. What's the pleasure of the board?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Motion to adjourn.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
24 Bernard to adjourn.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by ---

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, I still had some new  
3 business.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. I apologize.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No problem. No problem. You  
6 know, I want to piggyback off of Commissioner Bernard,  
7 last week when we were talking about the 30/32 officers  
8 who were taken off the streets due to the fact that they  
9 were not certified. We know that that lies on Director  
10 Patillo. Now, can we get some type of suspension or some  
11 type of disciplinary action for Director Patillo?

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let me see if I can interject. We  
13 don't know that right now.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: But she's over there though.  
15 She's over the officers.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No. There is an investigation  
17 going on there, and when that investigation is concluded,  
18 then we can see who exactly was responsible for X, Y, and  
19 Z, and whoever is responsible and did wrong, then I'm  
20 ready to do whatever we need to do to be able to hold  
21 anyone accountable for that. But at this point, it is an  
22 investigation going on, and it's not determined that she  
23 was the person responsible for that.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I apologize.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Not a problem.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I apologize to you and her. I  
2 repent for my error.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen. Yes, ma'am.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, the head of HR  
5 is responsible for human resources. That means people, it  
6 means certifying that they are qualified, and with  
7 respect to the position that they are seeking. This sort  
8 of massive if you will, miscalculation or mistake is not  
9 excusable in any business or any industry in the world.  
10 If I'm the head of a trucking company and I put 32 people  
11 on the road who are not certified with CPLs or whatever  
12 they're called then that falls on me. That is what it is.  
13 I understand that you want to continue an investigation,  
14 that's fine. But there is no doubt about who's  
15 responsible for human resources hiring and  
16 certifications.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, these are not funds.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: In response to my brother.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: These were not hirings. These  
20 were officers coming back as after -- . Let me finish.  
21 And some of this predates her. She wasn't even around  
22 when this happened, you know? And so that's why I said  
23 there's different nuances to this situation. And the  
24 investigation continues. And when that investigation is  
25 completed, we will deal with what we need to deal with

1 openly and transparently.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Now, through the Chair ---

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That is just so preposterous.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Now, if she's  
5 correct, I'm getting ready to come right back at it. I'll  
6 reopen it if she's correct.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Is she correct about what?

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What she said, if HR is  
9 responsible.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, there are different nuances  
11 to this. It is HR and Training. There are lots of things,  
12 different nuances to it. You can't swing in the air, you  
13 know, or at a ghost, you have to have facts. And then  
14 when you put somebody's name out there in public, and  
15 said that they did X, Y, and Z, I think you better be  
16 very, very careful because ---

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We understand that ---

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You become liable, you know  
19 because that is, we want to get the facts out there and  
20 then the truth out there. And in the investigation, we  
21 demand it to be open and transparent. And so, I'm with  
22 you guys on the investigation part of it, but you don't  
23 want to do anything to anybody prematurely.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I get that now, through the  
25 Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I mentioned to you. I mean, you  
3 mentioned that she may not be the one over that. And when  
4 you said that, I apologized, I repented to you and I  
5 repented to her. I left it alone. Well, when Commissioner  
6 Bernard, you know, she's an attorney, so I respect her  
7 knowledge. You know, I confided in her a lot on this  
8 board. When she goes forward; she's a wise woman. She's  
9 an attorney. So, I respect that. And when she came back  
10 with that, I thought maybe, you know, it's accurate. So,  
11 you know ---

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I don't want to belabor the  
13 moment, you know, but ---

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Well, just --

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: An investigation is an  
16 investigation. Have you seen the results of any  
17 investigation?

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Do you know who's being  
20 investigated?

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: The ---

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What's been investigated? Do you  
23 know what they are looking into? So, these are vitally  
24 important questions that we need answers to, and we  
25 demand answers.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right. But I'll leave alone  
2 until the investigation comes back. I'm through with it  
3 until the investigation comes back on who's in charge or  
4 whatever. So, I'm through.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair ---

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I agree with you  
8 that there should be an investigation.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move for an adjournment.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL Second.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Pardon me, I was speaking.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY I was recognized, you were  
13 not.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I was recognized.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: No, you were not. Point of  
16 order.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: She was speaking though, she was  
18 speaking.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. I was  
20 recognized.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I was recognized; point of  
22 order before you. So bottom line is this ---

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. There has  
24 been a motion that has been seconded on the floor.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Motion made by Commissioner

1 Pressley to adjourn and second by Commissioner Bell.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I will not be disrespected.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: By Commissioner Bell. Any  
4 discussion?

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I want to say this. She was  
6 right in the --- I'm not backing ---

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You want to talk in the  
8 discussion; you can talk in the discussion.

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm not saying I'm backing her,  
10 but she was in the middle --- COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY:  
11 Point of order. There's a motion ---

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: And we'd let that go through.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It's been second. Now is the  
14 discussion you wanted to discuss. Discuss.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The discussion was on. Okay.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'll do it.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Finish our discussion.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Back to the point. We cannot  
19 let our personal ---

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. Her comments  
21 are not germane. A motion that is made, which is a motion  
22 to adjourn.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Okay. All right. That's  
24 true. We have to go by Robert Rules. All in favor say,  
25 aye.



1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We have to go.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
4 carried.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Nonsense.

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
