1855-56 - Construction of 134 Labrosse

1860s - Plank sidewalks in Corktown

1861 - William Murphy, stone mason resides at corner Eighth and Labrosse

1893 - May, Fire Box #144 installed at Eighth and Labrosse

1905 - Used as boarding house

1914 - Jan. 31; Fire caused by careless use of matches. Loss \$524, insurance \$1,300

1973 - Sold to Polish Brothers

1975 - Sold to Louis Deming
